Sixty-five Homemaking I girls of Muleshoe modeled garments that they made at school for their home sewing experience in a program Tuesday night.

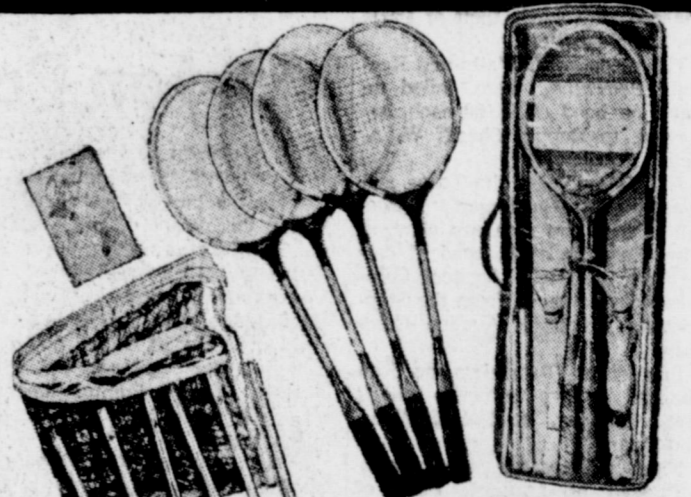
Garments suitable for play-time, casual wear, date or dress-up were modeled. Also children's garments that their sisters made were shown.
