### 80,000-95,000 Bales Predicted

## \$12-\$15 Million Cotton Crop Estimated For Bailey County

Gin yards were crammed with cotton trailers and highways were busy as Bailey County farmers continued to harvest the white fluffy crop this week.

With over half the crop left in the fields Wednesday, the weather held clear and bright, though cold, to allow cotton producers to continue the harvest.

An estimated 36,048 bales had been weighed in at Bailey County gins Wednesday.

This is less than half the 80,000 bales County Agent J. K. Adams predicts for the crop this season. He had originally predicted a record yield of 90,000 bales, but recent bad weather caused him to alter his forecast.

Plains Cotton Growers and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange, however, still predict 95,000 bales in Bailey County.

This is their final estimate of the season, which is usually an accurate barometer of the actual production.

The value of the cotton crop already harvested in the county amounts to \$5,767,680.

Value of the total crop is estimated at \$12,800,000 if we use the county agent's estimate and 13,300,000 figuring from the estimate of the Plains Cotton Growers and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange.

In the South Plains area, over 1 million bales were registered Saturday. For the 23-county area, the estimate total yield was pegged at 2,285,500 bales. Value of the crop was set at \$388 million, including \$343 million for the lint and \$45 million for the seed.

Production costs are reportedly down from previous years, while production is up. Less expense for irrigation and insecticides contributed to lower production costs. Wider use of mechanical harvesting also brought down the unit labor costs in gathering the crop.

If the present South Plains estimate materializes, the 1958 record of 2,025,433 bales would be smashed. The 1960 crop of 1,942,787 bales was second largest in history.

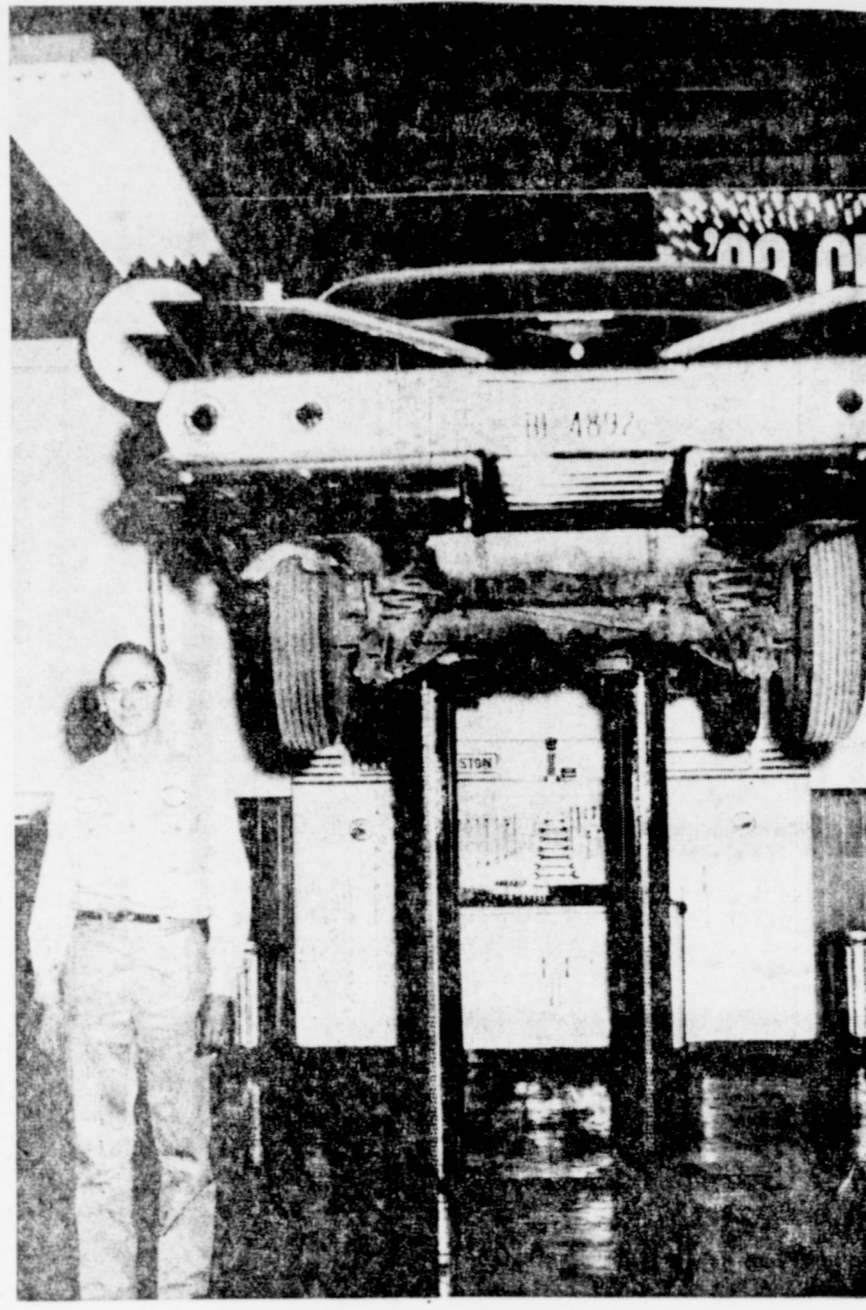

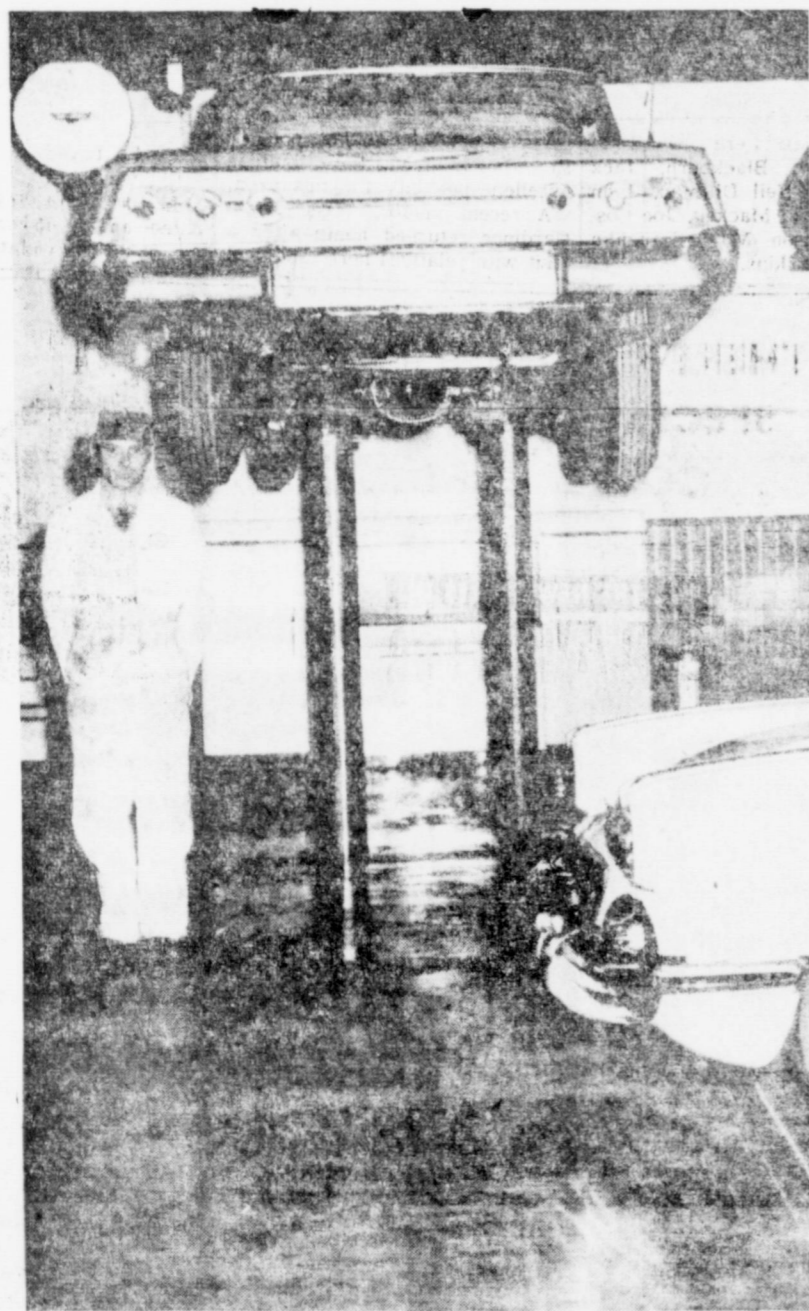

The German visitor will arrive in Muleshoe Saturday evening for the Sunday engagement at the local church. Wazelbuck was born in Breslan, Germany, on April 11, 1927. He was member in the Hitlerjugend (Youth for Hitler) and was enlisted to become a Navy officer. After the war while working in a refugee camp, he read in a newspaper an article written by American brethren working with the Church of Christ in Frankfurt. He writes Mr. Grigg of Muleshoe that "as a result of the newspaper article, I attended the Bible Training school there for three years. In 1949 I was converted by the Otis Gatewood and Roy Palmer." Gatewood was read in Levelland and his relatives who live in Lamb-Bailey counties area. His sister, a former resident of Muleshoe, Mrs. John Garrett, is now a resident of Earth. Wazelbuck is in this country speaking in behalf of his work in Stuttgart. And is on tour of the States until the first of February. Grigg met Wazelbuck in Germany in 1955 and they became acquaintances since that time seven years ago. He has come by the invitation of the Church of Christ here through Grigg. ## Mail Now, Says Postmaster

Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate on his 1961 "Mail Early For Christmas" Campaign, postmaster Senn Slemmons said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting Christmas."

The Post Office Department plans to expand its facilities and to provide extra help during the Christmas rush, but in the final analysis, if you'll follow these three simple rules, you can be certain not to disappoint friends and loved ones — Christmas Day — wrap your Christmas gifts securely, be sure they are addressed clearly and correctly and mail all your gifts and cards early.

Postmaster Slemmons said, "I hate to see folks take chances on

mailing poorly wrapped packages. "Despite careful handling every year, too many packages break open in transit and too often we have to puzzle over names and addresses which are incomplete or simply cannot be read at all. "If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the Post Office before attempting to mail them," the Postmaster warns.

Limit on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package from. As an extra precaution against loss, Postmaster Slemmons advised placing both your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

If you use Christmas stickers or seals, put them on the BACK of packages so that they will not conflict with the address on the front.

Make sure that correct postage is firmly affixed to each card and package.

When mailing gifts, it's a good

idea to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label to prevent defacing it in transit.

And always be sure, of course, to include the recipients full name, street address, city, zone and state.

Because the entire Christmas mailing period is primarily a battle against time, "Do it now" is the slogan from here on in.

Don't put off your Christmas mailings while you still have ample time because this means that dreaded pile-ups will occur at the Post Office, causing us as the holiday approaches.

The postmaster asks the cooperation of all business firms to delay circulars and catalogs until after December 25, to keep the mails clear for the Christmas rush.

Postmaster Slemmons said he is most appreciative of the interest and cooperation shown by the mailing public so far, and reminds us that all mail going long distances should be sent by December 10.

Christmas packages for local delivery should be mailed not later than December 15, and be sure to mail your Christmas cards for nearby destinations at least a week before Christmas.
