FIRE DESTROYS HOME - A fiery blaze destroyed Frances Flores' brick home in Tahoka last Wednesday afternoon, as Tahoka Volunteer Firefighters fought to douse the flames and keep the fire from damaging neighboring homes on South 5th Street. Ruled accidental, the fire quickly consumed the home and its contents, as well as the garage and car parked inside. No one was injured in the fire. Mrs. Flores lived in the home with her daughter and three grandchildren, and reportedly did not have homeowners insurance. A fund for the family has been established at First National Bank of Tahoka, and a benefit dinner will be held this Sunday at St. Jude's Catholic Church for the family.

Sponsors, Donations Needed Now For "Christmas For Kids" Program

With only two weeks left before Christmas, sponsors and donations are desperately needed for the Lynn County "Christmas For Kids" program, a volunteer non-profit program which ensures that needy children in the county have a Christmas gift to open on Christmas Day. Already, there are 169 children on the list, with only 35 "adopted" to provide gifts for, and \$656 in contributions and a few toys donated as of Tuesday after-

Figuring \$25 to spend on each child, the donations are far short of the \$4,225 needed for 169 children. Lynn County Treasurer Janet Porterfield, who heads up the program, says she's not sure why donations have been slower to come in this year, or why there are less "adoptions" from area businesses, groups and individuals, but she adds that time is growing short.

"If someone is planning to adopt a child, or a family of children, to provide gifts for this Christmas, we need to know now," she said. For those who aren't adopted, Mrs. Porterfield and others go Christmas shopping with the donated funds, and try to provide each child with one garment of clothing and two small

Lynn County Courtroom is turned in to "Santa's Workshop" with a frenzy of activity, where volunteers meet to match gifts with children, and then, of course, the flurry of paper, scissors, tape and ribbons as the packages are wrapped. For 169 children, each with three packages, that's about 507 packages to wrap ... give or take a box or two.

Mrs. Porterfield says they'll take all the help they can get, whether volunteers want to wrap packages (call 998-4055 and she'll tell you when to come), donate gift wrapping paper (they need all they can get!), scotch tape, batteries (mostly size AA or 9-volt for some of the toys), or donations of new clothes (for any size child, male or female, up to age 14), or new or like-new toys. Money, of course, is always appreciated -

and all of it goes for the children. Mrs. Porterfield is still taking applications until Dec. 15 from families who want their children to be provided for, and she works closely with the Dept. of Human Services to determine that the children are truly

Last year, the program provided gifts for 217 children in Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell. due to the generosity of many businesses, organizations, Sunday School After the gifts are purchased, the classes, families, and individuals who

contributed to the program.

Some organizations provide annual fund-raisers for the "Christmas For Kids" program, such as the Christmas "Parade of Homes" tour sponsored by the Tahoka High School Student Council. The home tour will be held this Sunday evening, Dec. 14, from 7-9:30 p.m., with proceeds to benefit both the "Christmas For Kids" program and the Lynn County Prison Ministry. A \$5 donation per person will be asked, and tickets can be bought at the first home visited. There are seven homes on the tour this year (see advertisement inside this edition for a complete list), and refreshments will be served at each home.

The Wilson Lions Club also helps with the program, collecting money and new, unwrapped toys which they bring to Mrs. Porterfield at the Lynn County Courthouse.

Employees in five different departments at Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative have adopted five families of children to provide gifts for this Christmas, and many of the area Sunday School classes often adopt families of children in the program.

However, he did say that the fire apparently began in the northeast corner of the southeast bedroom, next to the garage. The garage burned completely down to the ground, and the house was reportedly totaled from fire, smoke and water damage.

Mrs. Flores said that nothing was salvageable from the home, and that her car, which was parked in the garage, was also burned beyond re-

Allegedly, the family did not have insurance on the home or con-

Living in the home were Mrs. Flores; her daughter Edna McKean; and grandchildren, Pedro Sepeda, a Tahoka Middle School student: Apolonia Sepeda, an elementary student here; and J.B. Sepeda, a Tahoka High School student.

A "Sepeda Family" fund was established immediately for cash donations for the family at First National Bank of Tahoka, as well as the "Frances Flores Fire Fund" at Plains National Bank in Lubbock, and the family reportedly received clothing vouchers from the Red Cross for their immediate clothing needs.

Donations of clothing were also being accepted at Tahoka Middle School for the entire family, and students and staff at all three campuses at Tahoka I.S.D. have been involved in the clothing drive.

Lynn County Commissioners roved several agenda items at nday's Commissioners Court meeting, including moving Voting Box 12 from Chancy's Service Station to the Lynn County Showbarn in all future elections. The request for the change allegedly came from the business owner, and all commission ers voted unanimously to move the voting box to the showbarn.

In other business, bids were opened for the sale of two trucks from Precinct 1, with the bid for the 1977 Chevrolet 5-yard dump truck accepted from Will Meyers of Lubbock for \$2,012, and a bid from Western Truck Parts Company of Lubbock was accepted for \$3,100 for the 1984 GMC.

Virginia Zavala was approved as the election judge for Voting Box 14, approved unanimously by the court, and line item budget transfers were approved. Commissioner Sandy Cox also informed the court of the possibility of a purchase of a used pickup.

The court was informed that signs for Dixie Lane (County Road O, which is the first county road off Hwy. 380 going towards Brownfield) have been approved, and will soon be posted beneath the county road signs.



A publication called Postal Life in its latest issue sent to postal workers points out that it is natural to feel a little blue during the holiday season. "In fact, because expectations of happiness are high, many people often feel disappointed, depressed, stressed or lonely. . . The number of people who seek professional help significantly increases during the holidays."

Not only during the holidays, I would say, but also after any big anticipated event has actually taken place, such as a wedding, a long-awaited party or graduation from high school or college, people often feel a major let-down of unexplained depression.

I even remember when I was a lot younger and single (yes. I can remember being single), I would sometimes feel depressed after going out on the first date with someone I really liked. Of course, I probably wasn't as depressed as she was.

Anyway, Postal Life writer Sage Cohen said this: "There are many reasons why the holiday season can be difficult. Often money is tight, time is short, seeing relatives and friends can be stressful and distance from or loss of friends or family can be particularly painful."

The article has some suggestions for coping with the holiday blues. Take care of yourself, exercise, watch your diet, get plenty of rest and do things you enjoy to relax. Spend time with people you enjoy; if you don't have friends or family nearby, go to a community or religious event. Also:

Volunteer your time; donate a few hours to help bring cheer to others. Keep holiday entertaining simple.

One other thing the story suggested was that if you really feel bad, have had a major life change such as divorce, diagnosed illness or recent death of a loved one, you should call a certain US Postal Service 800 number.

I guess the depressing thing about that is the fact that if you don't work for the post office, the people on the other end of the line aren't going to help you.

Maps Depict 1995 Ground Water Conditions In 15 Counties COA

To keep area residents informed of ground water availability, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock has just published its hydrologic atlas series, which has been updated to reflect 1995 ground water conditions.

Atlases are now available for Bailey, Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn, and Parmer Counties, as well as parts of Armstrong, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hockley, Lamb, Potter, and Randall Counties lying within the Water District boundaries.

"The hydrologic atlases have been updated every five years since their original publication in 1981. We have revised the 1990 atlases to include new water-table elevation and saturated thickness maps depicting ground water conditions as of 1995. This revision helps enhance the estimation of ground water availability within each of the counties served by the Water District," said Don McReynolds, Technical Division Director.

Each hydrologic atlas features a specific county and contains maps depicting the elevation of the land surface, the elevation of the base of the Ogallala Formation, the elevation of the water table, and the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Formation within that county. The atlas packet also contains an informative booklet discussing the Ogallala Formation and explaining the use of the maps contained in the atlas.

By reviewing the information contained in the maps, irrigators can determine how deep they need to drill to reach water and how deep they would have to go to complete a well to the bottom of the water-bearing formation.

To update the original maps, technical division personnel used water-level measurement data taken in the Water District's network of 1,209 privately-owned water wells, as well as supplemental measurements in other wells.

For the updated 1995 maps, wells were measured at a density of one well per one square mile whenever possible.

Persons residing in or owning land within the High Plains Water District service area may obtain copies of the 1995 hydrologic atlases free of charge from the Water District office in Lubbock.



City of Wilson officials have reported that on several occasions water meter lids have been found to be off the meters or not in the proper position. This can create a freeze-up problem during the cold weather. If the meter freezes and breaks due to the meter lid being off or not in the proper position, it will be replaced at the property owner's cost. Property owners are urged to make sure that the meter lids are in place. In addition, when cold weather is predicted, it is recommended that residents stuff the inside of the meter box with crumpled newspapers. This will held insulate the meter from some of the cold.

Someone has been messing with the city dog traps which are occasionally set at various locations on a random basis. The bait is being stolen and the traps are sprung. City officials point out that messing with these traps is a crime and when

cone is caught, they will be prosited. Pet owners are reminded that there is a city ordinance requiring pets to be inside the owners fenced property or or a leash or line.



1) Shake inhaler to mix thoroughly, 2) breathe deeply a few times, then exhale as deeply as possible 3) Inhale slowly and, at the same momen you start to do so, activate the inhaler, 4) continue the slow, deep inhalation to pull the medication as deeply as possible into

5) hold your breath for 5-10 seconds before
