

Traffic Accident, Thefts, **Vandalism Lead Reports**

Reports of activities by law enforcement agencies in Lynn County during the last week were headed up by thefts and criminal mischief cases, plus an accident in which an 18-yearold man was injured after jumping onto the trunk of a moving car and later falling off as the car turned a corner.

The victim, Eric Montez of Tahoka, was not treated for the injury, described as "non-incapacitating". Driver of the 1993 Mercury which turned onto the 1600-block of S. 8th St. Monday was Veronica Herebia, 16, of Tahoka.

City of Wilson employee Roy Isham reported to the sheriff's office that windows valued at \$66 were broken at a city booster pump house last Thursday or Friday.

A deputy found an abandoned 1975 Ford pickup with the stereo missing 13 miles north of Tahoka on US 87 Saturday. The pickup, owned by Manuel Mendoza of Idalou, had been reported stolen in Lubbock.

A Lubbock newspaper dispenser

near the Wagon Wheel cafe at New Home was damaged when someone broke it open Sunday.

A white 18-foot utility trailer valued at more than \$1000 was reported stolen from a location about 3.5 miles northeast of Tahoka between Jan. 1 and Jan. 5. Owner Brad Hammonds said the trailer is a car hauler with ramps.

A Tahoka woman, 22, reported being struck by her boyfriend, a 23year-old Tahoka man, and told police she would press charges.

Prisoner Is **Found Dead** In Jail Here

James Henry Montez, 20, of O'Donnell was found hanging in a cell at Lynn County jail about a half hour after he was booked into the jail on New Year's Day. He was pronounced dead at Lynn County Hospi-

According to a Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. spokesman, Montez was booked into the jail about 2:30 a.m. Thursday and was placed into a cell while another prisoner was being booked. After the other prisoner was booked, officers found Montez hanging from the bars of his cell at 3:10 a.m. A deputy said Montez used his jail clothing to hang himself.

The man had been charged with public intoxication, a Class C misdemeanor which normally involves only an overnight stay in jail plus a fine.


Bring Christmas Trees To City Warehouse

Janitorial Service Fees Approved

Tahoka City Council met in a routine session Monday evening, with three of five council members present, including Jay Dee House, Ray Box and John Chapa Jr. The council approved a monthly fee increase of \$75 for city janitorial services, raising the monthly fee from \$325 to \$400 for cleaning twice weekly of the Life Enrichment Center, City Hall and

Police Department offices. Police Chief Steve Chance gave a report on the police department activities during the month. Monthly bills were approved as presented.

Absent from the meeting were council members Amy Preston and Rudy Tejeda Jr. Mayor Mike Mensch presided.

Police, Sheriff's Calls Listed For December

Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. reported 271 phone calls were received in December, including 128 for sheriff's officers. In addition, 29 calls were taken for EMS ambulance, 9 for fires, 87 for the city of Tahoka and 18 for the city of O'Donnell.

Tahoka Police Dept. activities for the month of December also were reported by Chief Steve Chance. The department cleared 19 criminal cases, with four left active and two inactive, for a 74 per cent clearance rate, he said. Twenty-five criminal reports were taken.

Ninety-six calls were dispatched. There were 73 traffic stops, 140 other calls of service. City patrol cars were driven 3,280 miles in December. From the 73 traffic stops, 56 citations were issued, including 38 for speed-

Offenses investigated included three assaults, four for violation of city ordinances, two thefts, two burglaries, one driving while intoxicated, two vandalism and 11 miscellaneous. There were six arrests, including three for public intoxication. Four traffic accidents were investigated.

The total value of property stolen in the city in December was listed at \$3,590.15.

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



New Boll Weevil Eradication Zone Designated

Agriculture Commissioner Rick
Perry has finalized the designation of
the Southern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone to allow cotton
growers to tailor future eradication
efforts on a more localized scale for
growers with similar planting practices and problems. Perry also appointed Don Parrish, a Yoakum
County grower who farms in Yoakum
and Terry counties, to represent the
zone on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Direc-

This new Southern High Plains zone, created from a larger 19-county area, consists of about 850,000 acres of cotton in five counties: Andrews, Gaines, Yoakum and portions of Lynn and Terry counties.

If cotton producers indicate a need, TDA will set a referendum in 1998 for growers and crop-sharing landowners in the new zone to vote on whether or not to participate in an eradication program and approve a maximum assessment. A directors election also will be conducted during the referendum.

TDA is accepting comment through Jan. 5, 1998 on whether to establish a similar zone in Dawson, Ector, Howard, Martin and parts of Midland and Borden counties.

Lynn County Frozen Under Snow, Sub-Zero Temperature

Lynn County shivered under a coat of ice and snow accompanied by eight below zero temperature reading here Thursday morning, the coldest minimum in about 13 years.

Snow began falling here early Wednesday morning and continued until about mid-afternoon, leaving an approximate five inches on the ground...

Coldest temperature readings on the South Plains was in January, 1947 when the mercury fell to nine degrees below zero. Other comparative temperatures in Tahoka the past six years include a two above zero on November 24, 1955 and again on Jan. 4, 1959. On Dec. 29, 1954 the reading stood at seven degrees above zero in Tahoka and on Nov. 23, 1957, eight degrees above zero... - Feb. 26, 1960

Tahoka People Witnessed Crash Of B-58 Experimental Plane Saturday

Three members of a Tahoka family witnessed the crash Saturday at about 6:00 p.m. of the B-58 Convair Hustler, said to be the fastest plane in the world, east of Slaton.

Mrs. Graham Tyler, her daughter Iris and son John were driving on the highway from Post to Kalgary en route to Spur.

The sky was clouding up and lightning began to flash. Suddenly, John exclaimed, "oh look! That lightning!"

Iris said she saw what appeared to be a bomb exploding. In another half second, Mrs. Tyler saw a flash that astounded her, and she exclaimed, "It was an oil well."

The angry cloud of fire mushroomed slowly.

"It was several miles away." Mrs. Tyler said. "A

"It was several miles away," Mrs. Tyler said, "And struck at the fool of a hill." An odd thing about it was that the fire in the cloud burned out and that was all. Nothing else was burning, and only a large cloud of black smoke was left."

... The family wondered what they had seen. That evening on the news they heard about the crash of the B-58 and they knew.

Monday morning, Mr. Tyler called Reece Airforce Base and told the officer in charge colonel Wright, that his son John had seen the crash He told the officer that John had seen what looked like a flash of lightening strike the ground and then the explosion.

Since John saw the plane before it crashed and it looked like lightening, it could have been on fire before it had hit the ground. That could be a clue as to what caused the death of three men, the total destruction of the fastest plane in the world and the failure of a test flight

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

High Plains Cotton Crop Dashes Home A Winner

Like a runner who has trouble getting out of the starting blocks, the 1997 cotton crop on the Texas High Plains had area producers anxious early in the season. But steady strides and a late season "kick" brought home a winner at the finish line.

By Christmas, the yield for the 25-county area around Lubbock was nearing three million bales of good quality lint. While slightly under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's estimate of 3.5 million bales, growers and ginners were pleased at the outcome of a hectic season.

"For such a cool, wet, windy start, we're really surprised how well the crop turned out," said Dr. Randy Boman, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here. With ginning not to be completed until mid-January, many area crop watchers are predicting a final yield of some 3.25 million bales. The area's five-year seasonal average is 2.7 million bales, according to USDA.

Bad weather with below normal temperatures wiped out some 250,000 acres of the 3.5 million which were planted in the area called "the world's biggest cotton patch." Area growers harvested an estimated 3.25 million

The yields could have been even better, except for heavy losses to insect pests, said Dr. James Leser, cotton entomologist with the Extension Service here. A survey conducted annually for the Beltwide Cotton Conferences showed that insects teamed up to reduce area yields by 18.4 percent.

"The boll weevil accounted for 74 percent of this yield loss, with over 50 percent of the loss occurring late in the growing season," Leser said. In spite of spending more than \$36 million to combat the boll weevil, producers still lost yield valued at \$148 million, he reported.

The quality of the crop is good, said Wendell Wilbanks, manager of the USDA cotton classing office at Lubbock. Of the more than 2.3 million bales already classed there before Christmas, the lint was averaging 33.81 in length, micronair of 38.39, and strength of 29.19 grams per tex. Color was good and 80 percent of the samples had leaf grades of 1-4, with an average of 3.48.

"Percentage-wise, the leaf doesn't look bad," Wilbanks said, "although the 20 percent that had (grades) 5-7 think it is terrible." Buyers discount bales with high leaf con-

Wet, cold weather in April, May and June put the '97'crop well behind schedule. But July conditions were closer to normal, Boman reflected. "After July 4, our 'summer syndrome' set in, the plants recovered well and we had good growth," he said. "But south and east of Lubbock we began to get moisture stress by the end of

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
"We had wet weather root systems in a lot of places. The very rapid change of soil moisture put some fields into a tailspin, particularly in western Dawson and eastern Gaines counties. We did get rain in late August, but it was late for some fields." Less than half the area cotton acreage has supplemental irrigation.

"By September, we were all concerned about the potential for maturing the crop" because of fewer heat units than average during the season and the ever-present threat of an early freeze on the High Plains, Boman said. But September temperatures were 3.5 degrees above normal and the nights were warmer than usual.

"That really turned the cotton around, especially where we had good moisture going into September," the Extension Service agronomist said. "By the end of the season our total heat units were back to normal."

A killing freeze didn't occur over much of the Texas High Plains until the last week of October.


