**February Weather
Warmer Than Normal**

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of February was much warmer and drier than normal according to the National Weather Service in Lubbock. In fact, it was the third warmest February on record since 1914.

Temperatures averaged 7.3 degrees above normal and ranged from 5.6 degrees above normal at Lamesa to 8.9 degrees above normal at Brownfield. The highest temperature reported during the month was 87 degrees at Jayton and Spur on Feb. 15.

Precipitation averaged 0.40 inches below normal and ranged from 0.69 inches below normal at Abernathy to 0.30 inches above normal at Tahoka.

Tahoka's average temperature was 51.7 degrees with total precipitation of 1.01 inches.

**DHS Announces
New Community
Partnership Initiative**

The Texas Department of Human Services (DHS) announced plans to seek proposals from community organizations to help low-income Texans. The ultimate goal of the initiative is to increase the quality of life among welfare recipients, and those who are at risk of becoming welfare recipients. DHS will fund community groups with up to \$250,000 each.

Community organizations may provide services directly, or through contracts and arrangements with public entities, schools, non-profit organizations, faith-based organizations or other community organizations. Services can include assistance with housing, utilities, clothing, vehicle repairs, educational assistance for youth, adult literacy and English as a Second Language.

Funding for this initiative comes from \$7 million in funds earmarked for these projects in House Bill 1, which was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor last year. In 1999, DHS funded 16 community projects. This year, DHS will award approximately \$2,870,000 to community organizations. Several other Lynn County youngsters had a good showing at the annual stock show, which was held Feb. 18 through March 5.

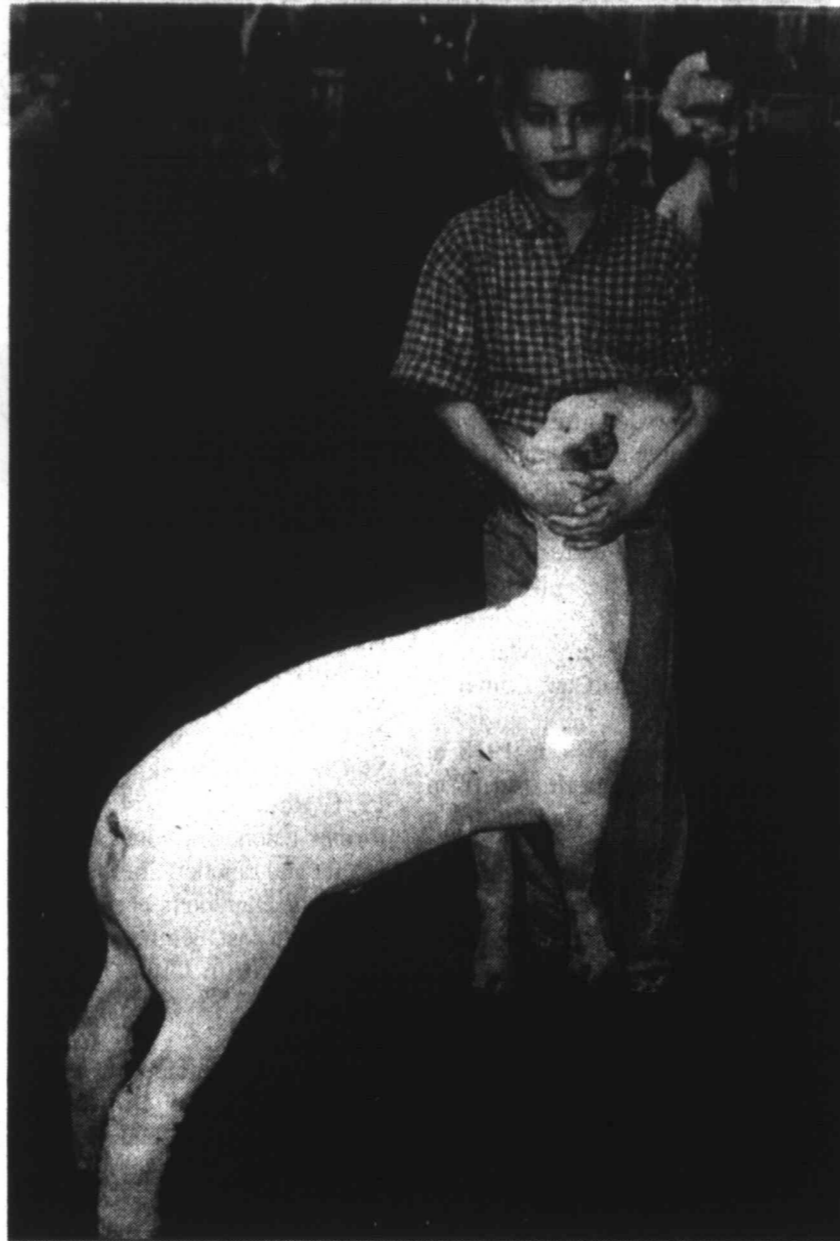

O'Donnell Gin Manager Receives Award From Statewide Council

The Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council (TACC) recently named Edgar L. "Junior" Follis as its Cooperative Ginner of the Year at the organization's annual meeting in Fort Worth. Follis, general manager of Farmers Cooperative Association in O'Donnell, received the honor for his dedication and efforts on behalf of the cotton and cooperative industries.

Follis began his cooperative career at New Home Coop Gin in 1959. He later worked at Rio Hondo Coop before taking the position of office manager/bookkeeper at Farmers Cooperative Association in O'Donnell in 1979. He attained his current position as the cooperative's general manager 11 years later.

During Follis' tenure as manager, the coop frequently has been in the top five or 10 largest gins in the state, competing with several other independent gins in the area. The operation consists of two offices and three gin plants.

"Follis' involvement in Texas cooperatives goes back many, many years, and he has not been a bystander but has been involved every step of the way," said Van May, president and CEO of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association (PCCA). "In fact, he is not only involved with his local coop, which is very successful, but also regularly involves himself with matters of the regionals."

Follis' service extends beyond his cooperative. He has spent the past

several years working with John Deere supporting educational programs for farmers such as increasing awareness of machine preparation and maintenance. He also provides producer-awareness programs for his members on topics including boll weevil and seed varieties.

"I have noticed that he always wants to learn and educate himself before he makes a decision," says Ron Harkey, president and general manager of Farmers Cooperative Compress in Lubbock. "I see him at most TACC conferences, ginner's conventions and industry-related meetings — taking an active part and being involved."

In the community of O'Donnell, Follis has served as Rotary Club president, taught Sunday school at First Baptist Church for the past 10 years, is involved in the Masonic Lodge and is a supporter of various other community causes and activities.

His other leadership positions include being involved in or serving on the board of PYCO Industries, Farmers Cooperative Compress, Triangle Cooperative Services, the Texas Cotton Ginners Association and Consolidated Bearing and Supply Company.

Along with his extensive work and service, Follis enjoys making time for his family — his wife Shirley, eight children, 16 grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

NAP Benefits May Be Available For Producers

Dry winter weather in the Panhandle, South Plains and North Central areas of the state is causing major losses of grazing from small grain crops of wheat, oats, barley, rye and triticale. Grazing is severely damaged or lost on an estimated 2.5 to 3 million acres, according to information from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Losses of small grain forage production may be eligible for compensation from the Noninsured Crop Disaster Program (NAP) offered by USDA's Farm Service Agency. Implementation of NAP and determinations of producer eligibility depend heavily on information reported by producers.

"Producers must understand that destroying small grain acreage, or making other use of it prior to inspection by FSA, could jeopardize their eligibility for a NAP payment for the grazing loss," said Wayland Shurley, State Executive Director of the Texas FSA. "We want producers to benefit from the NAP program, but we need their help."

Producers who believe they qualify for NAP benefits for loss of small grain forage production in the fall and winter months must notify FSA no later than 15 days after the FCIC pull off date. FSA must have an opportunity to inspect acreage to verify damage to the small grain forage.

Federal crop insurance policies on wheat and oats provide protection against loss of grain production in these areas of the state. Late last week, crop insurance industry officials discussed the possibility of releasing small grain acreage that is no longer in dormancy, even though the established pull off dates were still a week or so away. In some areas, the outlook for grain production is bleak. As a result, much of the acreage could be released in the next few weeks. Release of acreage by crop insurance companies means producers can make other use of the land. Farmers need to remember, however, that release of their insured small grain crop by the crop insurance industry does not mean their forage acreage can be destroyed without affecting the potential eligibility for NAP benefits.

In areas where high winds cause potential erosion problems, producers who request and receive permission from the crop insurance companies to perform emergency tillage must also notify FSA prior to destroying crop acreage to avoid jeopardizing their eligibility for NAP assistance.

Producers needing more information about NAP should contact FSA at the local USDA Service Center.

C. Todd Lockaby of Tahoka has been appointed to the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) Board of Directors. He will fill the unexpired term of Ray Mason and will represent Zone 2 of the district. Lockaby is a graduate of Tahoka High School and Texas Tech University. He and his wife Kristi have three children, Morgan, Madison, and Brit.

As one of five persons serving on the district board of directors, Lockaby will be responsible for overseeing district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district laws.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Unlike most legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain.

The purpose of the Lynn County SWCD, headquartered in Tahoka, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch land within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers in conservation matters. 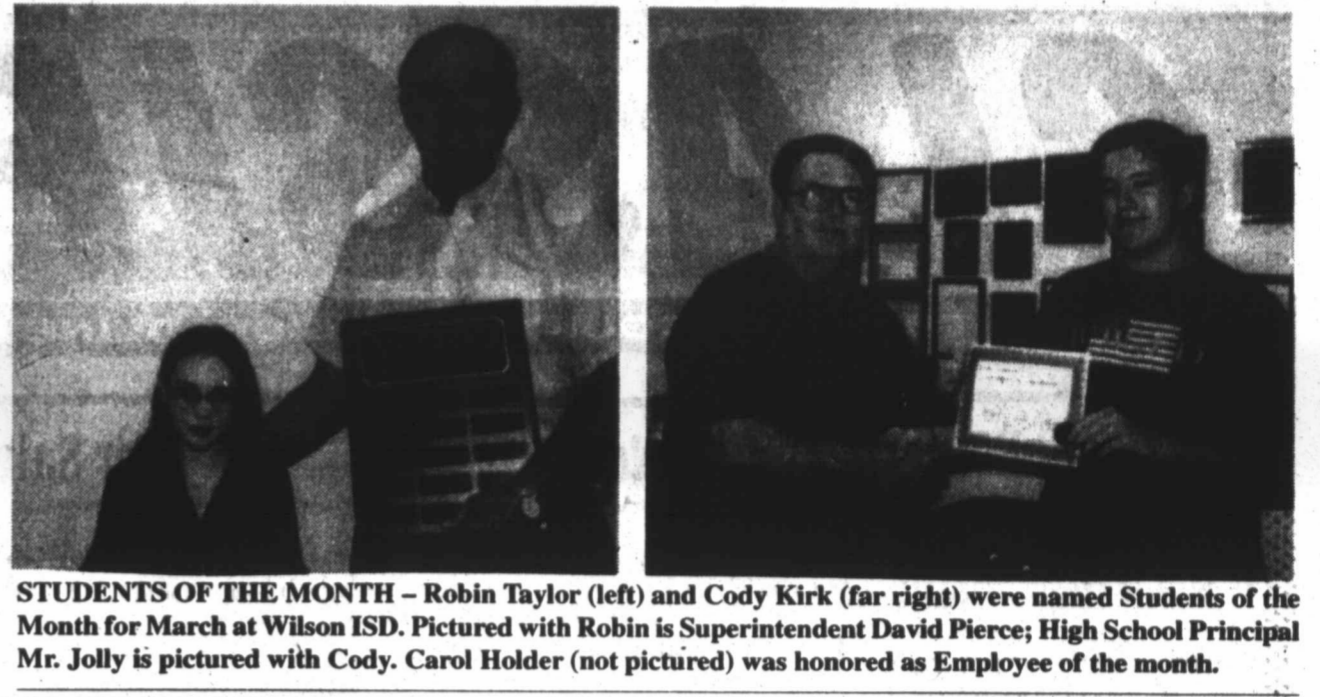

NOTICE OF PROPOSED INCREASE IN ENVIRONS GAS RATES AND SERVICE CHARGES

On March 8, 2000 Energas Company filed a proposal with the Railroad Commission of Texas to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated area ("Environs") surrounding the sixty-seven West Texas Cities listed below. The Company proposes to change its environs rates to the same level as the Company is proposing for the sixty-seven West Texas cities in the Company's pending Appeal at the Railroad Commission. The environs rates will not change until the rates inside the sixty-seven West Texas Cities change. The Railroad Commission may delay the proposed effective date for up to 150 days. The proposed changes will affect all classes of environs tariff customers including Residential, Commercial, Public Authority, Small Industrial and Air Conditioning customers. There are approximately 22,275 Environs customers in the sixty-seven West Texas Cities. The proposed changes in environs rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$1.0 million or 8.5%, adjusted for normal weather. The change is a "major change" under state law in the environs of Lubbock and Odessa. The new environs rates will not exceed 115% of the average of all rates for similar services of all municipalities served by Energas in the same county.

Energas proposes to restructure its gas rates to moderate bill variability during the heating season, to increase its revenues from gas service by increasing the customer charges and lower pricing blocks and to increase its charges for miscellaneous services such as reconnecting gas services following nonpayment. The Company also proposes changes to its Gas Cost Adjustment ("GCA") Clause to collect all of the gas cost and related taxes instead of just the difference between actual gas cost and a base cost of gas in the base rates.
