Traffic Mishaps Reported Here

Two traffic accidents reported in the City of Tahoka during the last week resulted in no injuries to any persons involved.

Last Saturday at the west access road to U.S. 87 and Lockwood a 2002 Dodge Stratus and a 1984 Chevrolet pickup collided in a construction area. Driver of the car was Cynthia Gregoire, 35, of Lewiston, ME. Driver of the pickup was Kathy Virginia Shelton, 44, of Tahoka.

Early Voting **Continues Here**

Early voting continues through April 30 for area city and school and Lynn County Hospital District elections, which are scheduled for May 4. Several elections in the county have been cancelled due to unopposed candidates, but the City of Tahoka, City of O'Donnell, O'Donnell ISD, and Lynn County Hospital District will have elections with contested races. All Wilson and New Home city and school elections have been cancelled, as well as the Tahoka ISD trustee election.

Early voting is being conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's Office in the Courthouse for the Lynn County Hospital District and City of Tahoka elections, at O'Donnell City Hall for the O'Donnell City election, and at O'Donnell ISD Tax Office for the O'Donnell ISD election.

If Follis chooses to run in the November election, he must be appointed by the local Democratic or Republican parties, or may run as an independent candidate. according to county officials.

Lynn County Commissioners met in emergency session last Tuesday to make the appointment, with all four commissioners voting unanimously in the decision. Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning. discussing moving the office of Pct. 4 Justice of Peace from the late Judge Noland's home to the Commissioner Precinct 3 building in O'Donnell. located just west of the John Deere house. Official documents and other Justice of Peace paraphernalia was in the process of being moved, and Judge Follis is organizing his office there. The phone number for the Pct. 4 Justice of Peace office in O'Donnell is 428-3711.

Lynn County has one other Justice of the Peace, Judge Terri Walker,
