Lynn Leads State In Cotton! Rain Shuts Down Harvest Again On Record Crop

Wet weather has once again shut down the cotton harvest in Lynn County, much to the anxiety of producers who have planted record acres of cotton this year — not only for the county but also, according to the local county agent, the highest number of cotton acres in any county in the state.

"This year we planted 295,179 acres of cotton — the most of any county in Texas — with 217,835 acres of dryland and 77,344 acres of irrigated cotton," said Bryan Reynolds, Lynn County Extension Agent. "With twice the normal rainfall this year, the potential for a large crop is very good. Last week, the USDA crop report was increased one million bales from October. All predictions are that the 2004 crop will be the largest in history with an estimate of 22.5 million bales for the United States. Texas is projected to produce 7.7 million bales of the 2004 crop," he added.

Getting the nearly 300,000 acres of cotton out of the fields in the county, however, is the biggest problem for producers right now, as day after day of steady drizzle continues to plague the harvest.


"No field activity has been seen since last Friday," said Reynolds. "With the forecast calling for more rain through Thursday, I doubt we will see any strippers back in the field until next week," he predicted.

The rain has created several problems for cotton growers. First, being put off the field and not being able to harvest will likely prolong harvest until well after the first of the year. Secondly, with so many more acres of the cotton being planted to picker-type varieties, the effects of this wet weather pulling out the cotton from the boll, with a result that growers are seeing a decrease in yield. Third, with more exposure to wet weather each day, cotton producers may see some quality problems. Also, gins are not able to pick up modules in many places, due to the wet saturated conditions.

Yields before this latest weather event were extremely good, with many dryland reports of one to two bales per acre being seen in Lynn County. Irrigated cotton is yielding two to three bales per acre with some fields even yielding close to four bales per acre, Reynolds said.

Last year's cotton crop was also a good year. "The official report was released Nov. 1 for the 2003 crop, and Lynn County ranked fourth in Texas with 198,800 bales produced on 279,400 acres," said Reynolds.

"Lynn County consistently plants more acres of cotton than Florida, South Carolina, Virginia, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arizona, and New Mexico," he noted. "Cotton is king here and, as always, our producers are faced with another unique situation with this year's crop," said the county agent.

Public Meeting Tonight To Address City Dump Site

A public meeting will be held at 7 p.m. tonight (Thursday) at the Life Enrichment Center in Tahoka to hear public comments on the City of Tahoka's proposal for a Municipal Solid Waste Project. Anyone is welcome to attend the meeting, which will be conducted by Texas Commission on Environmental Quality representatives.

The City is proposing to reestablish a city dump site adjacent to the location of the county dump grounds, where currently all items are deposited in containers and hauled off. Several years ago, before Environmental Protection Agency standards shut down the city/county dump, all waste was deposited in the ground and covered up. EPA standards have since been relaxed for cities under certain populations, and city officials are considering reopening the dumpgrounds under new EPA rules, which they believe would save residents money in the long run for waste collection.

This hearing is required by the city as part of the permit application phase through TCEQ. All interested citizens are invited to attend.

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



Hot Check Writers Can Avoid Arrest During Nov. 18-23 "Grace Period" Here

Have you written a hot check, and received a letter from the Lynn County Attorney's office ordering you to pay? If so, you may be one of 74 hot check writers who are soon going to be arrested - unless you pay up during a "grace period" being offered here, Nov. 18-23.

"The Lynn County Attorney's office is offering a six-day period that will allow hot check writers to come to the Lynn County Courthouse to pay out and get their names taken off the arrest list. Those who don't take advantage of this grace period will run the risk of being arrested at their home or place of employment after Dec. 1.

Hot checks - writing a check for which insufficient funds are available - can get a person in a lot of hot water, according to Linda Mensch, office manager for the County Attorney's office at the Lynn County Courthouse.

"When a person writes a hot check and gets a letter from the county attorney's office - really when they get that first letter from the merchant - they need to take care of it. It just gets bigger and bigger from there, and more consequences are added," said Mensch.

She explained that when a merchant gets a check back for insufficient funds, the merchant then sends a certified letter to the check writer. The check writer then has ten days to go to the merchant and pick up the check and pay for the face value of the check plus fees, or the matter will be sent to the County Attorney's office.

"If the certified letter comes back to the merchant, or after 10 days have passed and there is no payment to the merchant, then it is brought to the County Attorney's office," Mensch said, adding that the check writer's refusal to pick up the certified letter in the mail is no excuse. "The 10-day period still applies, whether or not the check writer picks up the mail," she said.

The County Attorney (CA) then

sends another letter through regular mail service, which advises the check writer that they have 20 days to pay. This time, another \$30 is added in fees, with \$15 going to the merchant and \$15 going to the CA's office to fund the Hot Check program.

"If the check writer calls the County Attorney's office, we will give them an opportunity to pay the total amount, or an opportunity to agree to a payment plan," Mensch explained.

If, however, the check writer does not call the CA's office or pay out within 20 days, then the file becomes a criminal case and a warrant is filed on the check writer for an arrest. At this point, the fees really add up, with a \$400 fine plus court costs added to the face value of the hot check.

"Someone who writes a hot check for \$25 that doesn't take care of it by this point, can end up paying hundreds of dollars, and going to jail for it," said Mensch.

Once a warrant is filed with the Sheriff's Office, the defendant must pay the total amount (no payment plans offered), or must bond out and be placed on the county docket to come before the court.

She added that another advantage of paying out or agreeing to a payment plan before a warrant for arrest is filed is that the misdemeanor charge of "Theft By Check" is reduced to "Issuance Of A Bad Check," which is a Class C misdemeanor and a lower offense than "Theft By Check."

"These people need to remember that when they fill out job applications, they will have to note a misdemeanor charge of Theft By Check," Mensch said.

The Lynn County Attorney's office here handles an average of 10-15 cases per month for hot checks written. If the hot check is under \$20 it is sent to the Justice of Peace office for processing. The 74 files for

warrants currently held by the CA's office are for hot checks written to Lynn County merchants, not necessarily written by Lynn County residents. Many other files are in the process of being handled, and could end up in the "arrest warrant" phase if not paid out by the check writers.

"Avoid arrest by going to the Lynn County Attorney's Office at the Courthouse, Nov. 18-23," said Mensch. "Our phone number is 806-561-5286, and office hours are 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The bottom line for hot check writers is: pay out while you can. It will only cost you more money, plus jail time, if you don't.

TISD Audit Approved

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met Nov. 11 for a regular monthly meeting, approving as presented the financial audit prepared by Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert & Moss for the 2003-04 school year, and other approving other routine business.

Waiver requests for staff development days and for the first day of school instruction were approved by trustees, and Superintendent Jimmy Parker was appointed as the district's representative for the Regional Advisory Committee of Education Service Center Region 17. Several school policies were reviewed to send to TASB for updating.

No resignations or employee positions were considered.

The next regular board meeting was set for Dec. 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Earth Team Volunteers Join World Water Monitoring Day

Recently USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Earth Team Volunteers across Texas joined America's Clean Water Foundation and the International Water Association to test water quality in their watersheds. Annually the event will be known as World Water Monitoring Day.

The data collected will help improve understanding about the quality of water throughout the world. World Water Monitoring Day will serve as a yearly anniversary for watershed leaders, educators, and trained volunteers to help others better understand how the actions of individuals impact everyone.

To accomplish this important task, NRCS will be using its cadre of Earth Team Volunteers to test several water quality parameters at locations across Texas. Locally Jack Scott, a Lynn County producer and Earth Team Volunteer with the Lynn County NRCS office, will be assisting in the effort. These volunteers will collect and submit data from four key tests: dissolved oxygen, pH, turbidity/clarity, and temperature. While monitoring is a continuous process, never before has such an evaluation been scheduled to occur on one day all across the world.

"Every day, NRCS conservationists throughout Texas help conserve our precious soil and water re-

sources. Cropping systems, grazing management, nutrient management, and irrigation are all part of NRCS efforts to protect water quality," said Dr. Larry D. Butler, NRCS state conservationist in Texas. "People throughout the world depend on clean, fresh water as their source of life. No matter who you are or where you live, clean, pure water is essential for drinking, hygiene, agriculture, commerce, and recreation," said Butler.

According to Paul Reiter, Executive Director of the International Water Association, "Here is an opportunity for people to adopt a local waterway and sample and report on its quality year after year. Using Earth Team volunteers who have an interest in tracking water quality in their community is an excellent example of citizen involvement. These volunteers can then share that information with the world by registering their monitoring location and data on the web."

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


