Polls Open Tuesday For General Election

Voting poll locations in Lynn County will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7 for voting in the General Election. Early voting has been underway since Oct. 23 and continues this week through Friday, Nov. 3, during normal business hours at the Lynn County Courthouse As of Tuesday morning. 247 voters had cast ballots during early voting. All voters should bring their voter registration cards when voting. Voters will mark paper ballots either by hand by filling in an oval space next to the candidate of their choice, or by feeding the ballot into an electronic voting machine which will mark the voter's choices on the ballot. If voting electronically, a voter marks their choices by a touch-screen system that is easy to understand and offers directions in a step-by-step method. The marked ballot is then printed out for the voter, who will then hand-feed their marked ballot into an M100 ballot tabulator, which electronically counts all votes. Election officials will be available to assist anyone to help them use the new electronic system. Voting will be conducted at eight locations throughout the county, although some voting boxes (Draw, Grassland, Hackberry, New Moore, Lakeview, and North Lynn County) are being consolidated with other boxes for this election. See a complete list of voting locations below.

County positions on the ballot include Lynn County Judge, with H.G. Franklin seeking re-election; District Clerk, Sandra Laws seeking re-election; County Clerk, Susan Tipton seeking re-election; County Treasurer, Pam Miller running unopposed; Justice of Peace Pct. 1. Ginger Henry running unopposed; Justice of Peace Pct. 4, Ed Follis seeking re-election; County Commissioner Pct. 2, Mike Braddock seeking re-election; County Commissioner Pct. 4, Brad Hammonds running unopposed. A write-in candidate has also filed for the position of Lynn County Attorney, Donnis Scott, who is already serving in that position after being appointed by county commissioners to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Brian Kingston. There is a contested race for District Judge, 106th Judicial District, with incumbent Judge Carter Schildknecht seeking re-election on the Republican ticket, and challenger James J. Napper running on the Democratic ticket. The 106th Judicial District is comprised of Lynn, Garza, Gaines and Dawson counties. Contested races are also on the ballot for U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative District 19, State Representative District 85, Governor, and others. A list of four declared write-in candidates will be posted at voting polls. To vote for a write-in candidate, a voter must ' write in the name of the candidate on the line provided and fill in the oval provided to the left of the line.

Flu Shots Available At Friday Health Fair

Flu shots and a variety of health tests and information, and even an opportunity to learn how to perform CPR at a quick training session, will be offered this Friday, Nov. 3 at a County-Wide Adult Health Fair at The Center for Housing and Community Development, located at 1400 Ave. K in Tahoka. Flu shots will be available at a cost of \$15, but all other health testing will be offered at no charge, including bone density tests, hemoglobin, blood pressure and oxygen saturation level tests, and glucose and cholesterol tests.

Lynn County Jail Passes Annual Test

Lynn County jail was given full accreditation rating after the annual inspection last week by a representative of the Texas Jail Standards Commission, Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported this week.

Sheriff's officers and Tahoka Police handled mostly routine cases during the last week, primarily incidents related to traffic violations and liquor law violations.

Six persons were jailed during the last week in Lynn County, bringing the total jail population early this week to 41, including 14 held for Garza County. two for Gaines and one for Lubbock.

Two persons were arrested for driving while intoxicated, third offense or more, with one of these also charged with having no drivers license. Others were jailed for driving while license suspended, Potter County warrant, driving while license was invalid, and possession of marijuana and another controlled substance. During the month of October, dispatchers at Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. processed 236 calls, including 113 for the county, 93 for City of Tahoka, 16 ambulance calls, two fire alarms and 12 calls for O'Donnell Police Dept.





SEEMS TO ME that about the only people who don't have cell phones to use every day are the people who are locked up inside cells, where you would think these things originated. Well, let me back off that statement just a bit. A lot of older people don't have cell phones. Most of these don't have computers, either, and some have just now accepted the idea of using TV sets and microwave ovens.

Cell phones, like computers, are a mixed blessing. They are handy when you get used to having one with you all the time, and they're good for staying in contact with friends and family. But they often are misused, as by drivers who pay no attention to their driving while talking on the phone, and people who have phones ringing all the time in public places such as restaurants, meetings and even in church.

Your phone rings in church because you forgot to turn it off. You dash back to the foyer and whisper "Hello?" and you hear, "This is God. If you don't want to listen to the preacher, please turn off your phone so others can concentrate in My house."

Kids as well as adults use their phones constantly. I was standing in line at Furr's Cafeteria once when the person just behind me called someone at the front of the line to let them know they were back there. High school and college students do a lot of calling and also a lot of text messaging to each other, right in the classroom. Susie at the front of the room feels her phone vibrating and cautiously looks at the message from Mary Jo at the rear of the room: "What's the answer to No. 4? You know, the question about when was the War of 1812?"

Along with the convenience of having a cell phone comes some problems, like having to replace it sometimes (your provider then offers you a big discount on the price of a phone, but you have to sign up for a new plan or extend the one you have for the next 11 years). I had to pay full price of a hundred bucks on one of mine which quit working while I was on a trip far from home. All I did was accidentally drop it into the toilet.

I went out to the Lynn County jail and learned that the people locked up in cells out there mostly don't have phones. I thought that was where the name came from.









Buildogs' Gamble Pays Off

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The Tahoka Bulldogs rolled the dice and came up big winners with a 22-21 victory over Post Friday night. Having seen Post score a touchdown in their overtime possession, the Bulldogs knew what they had to do, and Lance Murphy scored from the 1-yard line to set up the dramatic finish.

Rather than settle for the extra point try that would have tied the game again, Tahoka head coach Jay Hellums decided to go for the win. Lance Murphy scampered into the end zone on a play best described as "student body left" made famous at USC. With the 2-point conversion the Bulldogs broke out with a grand celebration enjoyed by their fans.

The Bulldogs improved their season record to 5-3 and notched their first district win.

Post dropped to 1-2 in district played QB two years ago and his and 2and 6 for the season. It was Tahoka's first victory over Post in a varsity football game in 14 years; the last time was a 16-12 win in 1992

The Dogs broke out fast in the first quarter. Ja-vaen (Jay) Tillman tight-roped the right sideline for a touchdown from 11 yards out and added the kick to put Tahoka up 7-0. The highlight of the drive was a 30-yard run by QB Damon Moore. The Bulldogs added to their lead seconds later when Josh Hawthorne stripped the ball from a Post ball carrier and dashed 38 yards for the score. With Tillman's extra

point, Tahoka was up 14-0. Post proved to be a worthy adversary as the Antelopes came fighting back. In a surprise move, the Antelopes moved Wilson Cash to QB from his normal halfback position. Cash had

experience paid off as he tossed 3 touchdown passes to DJ Baiza. The first one was from 5 yards out and the second was from 11 yards, tying the score 14-14 at the half with extra points by Blake Nichols and Zach Sanchez.


There was no scoring in the second half so Tahoka played their second overtime in school history. (The first was against Seagraves a few years back.)

Post was on offense first in overtime and scored with Cash hitting Baiza for the hat trick and the 6 points. That, plus the extra point put Post up by 7.

Tahoka answered, though, as Lance Murphy, subbing for Tillman, who was injured early in the third period, scored a touchdown, setting up the exciting two-point try.

Tillman gained 81 yards in 16 carries despite playing in just three quarters. Moore, also gained 81 yards rushing, including a 49-yard gain, and Murphy carried 11 times for 40 yards. Britt Wuensche gained 26 yards in 11 carries, and also caught a pass of 29 yards. Tahoka's other pass completion was a 28-yard throw from Moore to Daniel Baker. Moore, Hawthorne and Baker all did well on defense, as did Kyle Preston, who recovered a fumble.

John 13 (Foot Washing: An act of love, humbling, obedience, example.)

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A previous advertisement reflecting the expenses of Judge Carter Schildknecht's office was misleading. First, the budget is the responsibility of the County Judge and Commissioners Court. They establish the boundaries on expenditures.

A comparison to Judge Hansard's expenditures may not be fair. During his final year in office, his health forced him to retire, and the expenditures of his office did not reflect a full year.

The County's District Court budget for Judge Hansard's final year in office (September 30, 2001) was \$349,201. The budget for Judge Schildknecht's office for the year just ended was \$386,692, reflecting an annual growth of 2.15%. Judge Schildknecht's actual expenditures for this year ended September 30, 2006 was \$320,321, which was \$66,371 **under** budget.

Laws have changed, expenditures and budgets have increased, but this office's expenses were \$28,880 under the approved budget amount from five years earlier.

The \$40,000 remodeling project mentioned in the ad was not for the District Judge's office. There was a \$40,353.74 courtroom remodeling project during the year ended September 30, 2004 nearly three years after Judge Schildknecht took office. This cost was for remodeling and updating the courtroom, the jury room and surrounding areas. The Commissioners Court is charged with maintaining Capital Infrastructure. This remodeling project was authorized by them and paid out of the General Fund as a normal cost of maintaining the Dawson County Courthouse. It was not an expense of the District Judge, nor should it have been.

I obtained this information from Public Records within the Dawson County Courthouse.




