

Local Church Sends 1600 Bibles In "Operation Worship" Campaign

First Baptist Church of Tahoka to participate in an Operation Worship campaign to distribute Bibles to soldiers, sending 1600 Bibles for the program this week.

Operation Worship is a national not-for-profit ministry whose mission is to enrich the spiritual lives of military personnel. Operation Worship will distribute copies of the Operation Worship Bible, a special edition of the New Living Translation (NLT), to troops serving in the United States military.

"What better impact can you have on a soldier than to provide them with the Word of God," said Jeff Hilliard, cofounder of Operation Worship. "No matter how we feel about the war, our soldiers need our support. There is nothing more satisfying than being able to write a message of encouragement in a Bible and forwarding it to an activeduty soldier!"

The original goal of Operation Worship was to distribute 100,000 Bibles in the 100 days of summer to military personnel serving in difficult areas around the world. That goal was met within the first forty days and

the goal has now been increased to has joined with other churches and 200,000 Bibles. Operation Worship has individuals across the United States partnered with the Christian Booksellers Association, K-LOVE Radio Network, and Tyndale House Publishers to enable customers of Christian bookstores to provide the Operation Worship Bibles.

Richard Harbison, pastor of First Baptist Church in Tahoka, said, "When I heardaboutthistremendousopportunity to place the word of God in the hands of men and women serving our country in war zones, I knew we needed to be a part of this effort. Our original goal for First Baptist Church was 1000 Bibles but we quickly exceeded that amount. By the end of the campaign our church had purchased 1600 Bibles," he said.

"Each Bible has a word of encouragement written in the front. Studies show that people are most open to the word of God in times of crisis or in times of change. These young men and women are facing the most stressful situations of their lives and we feel privileged to be able to place the word of hope in their hands," added the pastor.

New Home ISD Sets Tax Rate

New Home Independent School District Board of Trustees approved their 2008-09 budget and set a new tax rate for the district, slightly lower than the previous year's property tax rate. The new tax rate will be \$1.24780, lower by about a penny from last year's \$1.25668 due to a slightly lower I&S rate for paying bonded indebtedness in the district.

The rate includes \$1.17 tax rate for Maintenance and Operating (M&O), and \$0.7780 tax rate for Interest and Sinking (I&S).

Suspect In Custody: Sex Assault Reported

A suspect in the Aug. 21 sexual assault of a woman living north of Tahoka has been arrested and is in jail, Lynn County sheriff's officers reported this week. Charges in the assault have not been filed, pending the return of DNA evidence obtained in the case.

The suspect was arrested the same day as the attack, however, after the victim, the mother of two young children, named the suspect she said she recognized when he broke into her home early that morning.

The woman said the man broke into the residence about 7 a.m. just after her husband had left for work, leaving her there with the children. She was treated at Lynn County Hospital for a neck injury and other bruises which she said occurred when she was dragged by her hair. She did escape after the attack and ran to a neighbor's home to call

In other law enforcement activity during the last week, police arrested an 18-year-old Tahoka youth on a warrant for burglary of a vehicle, and a 106th district grand jury returned several indictments, including one of burglary of a habitation against Lucas Gutierrez, 27, of Tahoka.

Jail population totaled 45 this week, after 13 persons were arrested, on these charges: assault/family violence, DWI plus false report to a police officer, application to revoke probation on DWI, APR on furnishing alcohol to a minor, failure to appear on theft by check charges, DWI third or more, possession of dangerous drugs, bond surrender on theft in Bailey County, driving while license suspended and possession of controlled substance.

During August dispatchers processed 316 calls, including 147 for the city, 128 for the county, 18 for O'Donnell, 18 ambulance calls and five fire alarms



GIVE YOUR CHLD HEALTHY SELF-ESTEEM

healthy self-esteem is a child's armor against the challenges of the world, according to Dr. David Sheslow of KidHealth.org. Kids who feel good about themselves seem to have an easier time handling conflicts and resisting negative pressures. These kids are realistic and generally optimistic and enjoy life more.

What Is Self-Esteen

Self-esteem is the collection of beliefs or feelings we "self-perceptions." How we define ourselves influences motivations, attitudes, and behaviors and affects our emotional adjustment.

With the beginning of as parents we need to be aware of how the added pressures will work on our children's self esteem. We need to make an extra effort to help keep their esteem healthy. How can you participate in promoting healthy self-esteem in your children?

These tips can make a big difference:

very sensitive to parents' words. Remember to praise your child not only for a job well done, but also for effort. But be truthful. instead of outcome.

by Julia Allen Nurture your own self-esteem, and your child will have a great role model. If you're excessively harsh on yourself, pessimistic, or unrealistic about your abilities and limitations, your child may

eventually mirror you.

Identify and redirect your child's inaccurate beliefs. It's important for parents to identify kids' irrational beliefs about themselves, whether they're about perfection, attractiveness, year reunion for Sept. 19-20. ability, or anything else. 

Hospital Capturing Lost Revenues

Lynn County Hospital District is now capturing revenues from procedures and services that are now billable under CMS guidelines, although a statement in last week's Lynn County News article attributed the savings to "a change in addressing a longtime omission in billing procedures," Hospital Administrator Jim Morris explained this week.

"It is a restructuring of the hospital's services provided by the hospital district," he said, noting that the implication in last week's article was that the billing department had made mistakes, or omissions in billing procedures.

The statement in the News article last week said, "The board of CMS policies and regulations noted that Morris had saved the

hospital about \$100,000 this year by addressing a longtime omission in billing procedures."

"That is a misunderstanding," Morris told The News this week. 'We had a review conducted by an outside firm that updated our charge master in comparison to other hospitals comparable to our size, scope and location. This actually has nothing to do with our billing department, who are experienced and efficient at what they do, and actually go above and beyond to do their jobs well," he

He added that this is an ongoing quarterly review due to the ever-changing environment and not a billing issue






