# **Voting polls open Saturday for school, city, hospital elections**

Election polls will open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday, May 9 for several school, city and hospital elections in Lynn County. City and school boards at Tahoka and O'Donnell, Wilson ISD, and Lynn County Hospital District all have contested races for voters to consider in elections on May 9. Both New Home and Wilson city municipalities are cancelling their elections due to uncontested races, and New Home ISD will have their trustee election in November in conjunction with the general election.

Early voting for all elections ended Tuesday.

In Tahoka, voters may mark ballots on May 9 at the Life Enrichment Center at 1717 Main Street, where there will be ballots for Lynn County Hospital District, City of Tahoka, and Tahoka ISD elections. Hospital District ballots will also be available at other polling locations in the county, including New Home City Hall, O'Donnell High School Commons Area, and the Mercantile (Green Building) in Wilson. O'Donnell City and School elections will also be conducted at the OHS Commons Area, and the Wilson ISD election will be at the Green Building in Wilson.

The mayoral race has drawn four candidates for the City of Tahoka, and two council seats have contested races as well. Incumbent Mayor Mike Mensch is joined by challengers John

### OISD Board calls special meeting for superintendent issue

O'Donnell Independent School District Board of Trustees have called a special meeting tonight (Thursday) to consider a separation agreement with OISD Superintendent Rodney Schneider. The board will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the OISD Board Room.

Agenda items include consulting with an attorney regarding a possible separation agreement with the superintendent, and also listed is "possible action regarding separation agreement with superintendent." Additionally, the agenda lists consideration and possible action regarding the process for appointing an interim superintendent for the school district.

Baker, Rusty Cook and Carlos Moralez for the at-large position that leads the city council. There are three candidates for the District 1 council seat, including incumbent Rudy Fuentes and candidates Johnny Rosas and Roger Locke Jr. The District 3 seat has incumbent Amy Preston and challenger Gail Quisenberry on the ballot.

Three candidates have filed for two at-large seats on the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees. Incumbent John Hawthorne and candidates Leighton Knox Jr. and Cathy Box are vying for the two positions.

Four candidates, including two incumbents, are seeking three positions on the Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors. Incumbents Jerry Ford and Jannis Horwood have filed, as well as candidates Victoria Baker and Nancy Guilliams. Directors terms are for three years.

In O'Donnell, there are four candidates for two positions with the OISD Board of Trustees, and four candidates for three city positions. Incumbent Sharmye Jonas and candidates Cameron Childress, Monty Hancock and Wayne Barton have filed for two seats on the OISD Board of Trustees. In the City of O'Donnell election, the three council members whose terms are expiring have all filed for reelection, including Paul Houston, Roger Doss and Harry Howell, and one other candidate has joined the race, Wayne Mott.

There are four candidates for two positions on the Wilson ISD board of trustees, but three of the candidates are write-in candidates. The only name listed on the ballot will be Oscar Ortega, an incumbent who filed for re-election. There will be blank lines on the ballot for voters to write-in the names of any of the three write-in candidates who officially filed, including Danny Mendez, April Moore and Daniel Clark.

Uncontested races for the City of Wilson and City of New Home positions allowed their elections to be cancelled and to declare their candidates elected. Helen Stephenson, Servando Benavidez and Dennis Moore will serve on the Wilson City Council. Mayor Steve Lisemby will serve another term for the City of New Home and David Gandy and John Edwards will serve on the council.

# Four are arrested on indictments

Four persons indicted by a Lynn County grand jury last week have been arrested on the charges, including a convicted arsonist from Lubbock and a Slaton man who was the principal person involved in a tense standoff with officers at a home in Slaton following a burglary in Southland.

Jerry Wayne Adams, 68, of Lubbock, who was observed starting a fire on the south side of Tahoka in February, was indicted for arson. He is being held in Lynn County jail with bond set at \$500,000.

Christopher Lee James, 19, of Slaton, was indicted for burglary of a habitation.

Others indicted included Richard Andrew Garcia, 20, of Tahoka, charged with unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon, and Steven Medel, 25, of Tahoka, charged with two counts of forgery

This week, sheriff's officers were investigating a burglary May 2 of a barn northeast of Wilson, owned by Phillip Munoz. Stolen were a Honda 4-wheeler, two saddles and a saddle pad, with the missing items valued at a total of \$1500.


Sheriff's officers also arrested an O'Donnell man for making an abusive call to 9-1-1 early Tuesday.

Tahoka Police arrested an 18-yearold Odessa male on an outstanding warrant for criminal mischief and failure to appear, from Midland County.

Dispatchers at the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. answered 248 calls during April, including 115 for the county, 82 for City of Tahoka, 13 for O'Donnell, 33 ambulance calls and six fire alarms

# Tahoka FBC Team to serve in mission field in Guatemala

A team of 14 members from First Baptist Church of Tahoka will be traveling to Chichicastenango, Guatemala August 1-7. The team consists of Richard and Carole Harbison, Dan and Donna Stone, Gary and Betty Stennett, Daniel and Tiffanie Garvin, Drew and Shelly Stone, Brad and Kim Hammonds, Lynn Lankford, and Judy Sanders. Courtney Stennett, formerly of Tahoka, serves as a full-time missionary in Chichicastenango, a town in the El Quiche department of Guatemala known for its traditional Maya Indian

All area residents are invited to a Pancake Supper and Dessert Silent Auction this Thursday, May 7 from 6-8 p.m. at the Tahoka Housing Authority center, to help raise funds for the trip. Minimum donation is \$5 per plate. The silent auction will end at 7:30 p.m. All proceeds will go toward the mission trip.

"The team will be entering into the community of Chichicastenango with the sole purpose of being a servant of Jesus Christ. In a village where the spiritual bondage runs deep, where drunkenness is rampant, idol worship is on every corner, this group of 14 will enter into a foreign land to show the love of Jesus Christ. Caring for one another is not part of the culture in this society. By traveling thousands of miles to help those in need, many eyes are open to the love Jesus has to offer everyone," said Courtney Stennett.

The team from Tahoka will be joining with Pray America, Manos de Jesus Ministry, when they arrive in Guatemala City and then drive three hours to Chichicastenango. The team

will assist in the feeding programs through one of Pray America's many projects. Pray America has three feeding stations wthat are set up to minister to and feed widows, their children, and orphans in the area. The program feeds approximately 2,500 people a week. Families from the surrounding village will travel by foot, possibly even barefoot, to receive the message and the meal. The message consists of scripture readings from the Bible, prayer, and praise and worship. The meal is a well balanced meal consisting of a meat, vegetables, some type of carbohydrate, and tamales. The team will be assisting in the delivery of the meals as well as spending quality time with the many women and children that attend these programs on a weekly basis.

Another project the team will be assisting with is building homes for widows and their children or grandchildren. In the early 90's there was a civil war in the country leaving approximately 75,000 widows in Guatemala.

"The team will spend the day building a home, praying with the family and playing with the children. Once the house is complete, one of the team members will hand over the lock and key to this special lady as a gift from Jesus Christ. One house cost \$1300 and the team hopes to raise enough money to build 3-4 houses while they are in Chichicastenango," explained

Pray America also provides pure water to three villages around Chichicastenango. With the help of Water Missions International, they are able to provide fresh water to thousands of families. "Again, families will travel hours sometimes twice a day by foot to receive this gift. Here the team will be able to



# to improve rooms

Lynn County Hospital is continuing to improve its patient rooms, renovating a room at a time, with some already completed, hospital administrator Jim Morris advised board members at a meeting of the directors in the hospital cafeteria last Thursday evening.

Morris also said that ten new hospital beds have been ordered. Morris also noted that he had been in contact with health officials regarding the status of the current outbreak of swine flu, now called H1-N1. He noted that as of that date. there had been 109 confirmed cases in the United States, with 26 of those in Texas.

The board approved medical staff reappointments for 17 Lubbock doctors who consult or otherwise serve the local hospital.

Board vice-president Billy Tomlinson presided in the absence of board president Jerry Ford. Other members present were Cal Huffaker, Virginia Griffing, Frances Truehart and Dalton Wood. Also absent wasmember Jannis Horwood.

# Wild Hogs: No Indication of Flu Danger

You may catch the flu from your sick hunting buddy, but there's no evidence that you will catch it from domestic or wild hogs, according to the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). There is no evidence that the new strain of H1N1 influenza is in domestic or wild hogs. This disease is being spread from person to person.

'We are prepared to test hogs, if a human/animal disease link is identified. To date, there has been no indication that swine are involved," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas state veterinarian and head of the TAHC, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "We are participating on all calls with health and emergency officials, are monitoring the situation, and are consulting with local officials, but so far, there is no indication of animal-tohuman disease spread."

"Several hunters have asked about the safety of hunting wild hogs," said Dr. Hillman, "To repeat, there is no evidence that wild hogs are involved in this flu outbreak. Always, however, we advise wild hog hunters to protect themselves against potential exposure to swine brucellosis, a totally different disease that is not related in any way to the flu. We know from test results that about 10 percent of wild hogs carry swine brucellosis, a bacterial disease."

"When processing or butchering a wild hog, hunters should protect themselves against the blood and bodily fluids of wild hogs," he said. "When the wild hog meat is cooked, any swine brucellosis bacteria is destroyed by the heat."

Trappers who catch wild hogs and owners of domestic swine also should practice good biosecurity to prevent spreading the flu to pigs. "Don't get around swine if you become ill, and avoid having visitors near your pigs," said Dr. Hillman. "Have someone else feed the animals if you become ill with flu-like symptoms. Notify your health department or the TAHC so your pigs can be monitored for disease. Also, as a basic biosecurity measure, you should always wash your hands after handling animals."

Dr. Hillman said wild hog trappers and domestic swine owners should call their veterinarian if their swine develop a sudden onset of respiratory illness. The nearest TAHC area office or TAHC headquarters also should be notified so testing can be conducted according to the flu response protocol. The TAHC headquarters may be reached at 800-550-8242.







In the wake of the events surrounding the cases of Swine Influenza/North American Influenza that have been identified nationally and internationally South Plains Public Health District would like to proactively provide you with information on the disease. We want to reassure the citizens in our communities that plans are in place and have been activated to monitor the situation and we are working with our partners in the local hospitals, clinics, schools, law enforcement and other public health departments to be ready to respond if needed.

**KEY FACTS ABOUT** SWINE INFLUENZA (SWINE FLU)

What is Swine Influenza? Swine Influenza (swine flu) is a respiratory disease of pigs caused by type A influenza virus that regularly causes outbreaks of influenza in pigs. Swine flu viruses cause high levels of illness and low death rates in pigs. Swine influenza viruses may circulate among swine through out the year, but most outbreaks occur during the late fall and winter months similar to outbreaks in humans. The classical swine flu virus (an influenza type A H1N1 virus) was first isolated from a pig in 1930.

How many swine flu viruses are there? Like all influenza viruses, swine flu viruses change constantly. Pigs can be infected by avian influenza and human influenza viruses as well as swine influenza viruses. When influenza viruses from different species infect pigs, the viruses can reassort (i.e. swap genes) and new viruses that are a mix of swine, human and/or avian influenza viruses can emerge. Over the years, different variations of swine flu viruses have emerged. At this time, there are four main influenza type A virus subtypes that have been isolated in pigs: H1N1, H1N2, H3N2, and H3N1. However, most of the recently isolated influenza viruses from pigs have been H1N1 viruses.

# **SWINE FLU IN HUMANS**

Can humans catch swine flu? Swine flu viruses do not normally infect humans. However, sporadic human infections with swine flu have occurred. Most commonly, these cases occur in persons with direct exposure to pigs (e.g. children near pigs at a fair or workers in the swine industry). In addition, there have been documented cases of one person spreading swine flu to others. For example, an outbreak of apparent swine flu infection in pigs in Wisconsin in 1988 resulted in multiple human infections, and, although no community outbreak resulted, there was antibody evidence of virus transmission from the patient to health care workers who had close contact with the patient.

How common is swine flu infection in humans? In the past, CDC received reports of approximately one human swine influenza virus infection every one to two years in the U.S., but from December 2005 through February 2009, 12 cases of human infection with swine influenza have been reported.

What are the symptoms of swine flu in humans? The symptoms of swine flu in people are expected to be similar to the symptoms of regular human seasonal influenza and include fever, lethargy, lack of appetite and coughing. Some people with swine flu also have reported runny nose, sore throat, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea.

Can people catch swine flu from eating pork? No. Swine influenza viruses are not transmitted by food. You can not get swine influenza from eating pork or pork products. Eating properly handled and cooked pork and pork products is safe. Cooking pork to an internal temperature of 160°F kills the swine flu virus as it does other bacteria and viruses. How does swine flu spread? Influenza viruses can be directly transmitted from pigs to people and from people to pigs. Human infection with flu viruses from pigs are most likely to occur when people are in close proximity to infected pigs, such as in pig barns and livestock exhibits housing pigs at fairs. Human-to-human transmission of swine flu can also occur. This is thought to occur in the same way as seasonal flu occurs in people, which is mainly person-to-person transmission through coughing or sneezing of people infected with the influenza virus. People may become infected by touching something with flu viruses on it and then touching their mouth

What do we know about human-to-human spread of swine flu? In September 1988, a previously healthy 32-yearold pregnant woman was hospitalized for pneumonia and died 8 days later. A swine H1N1 flu virus was detected. Four days before getting sick, the patient visited a county fair swine exhibition where there was widespread influenza-like illness among the swine.

In follow-up studies, 76% of swine exhibitors tested had antibody evidence of swine flu infection but no serious illnesses were detected among this group. Additional studies suggest that one to three health care personnel who had contact with the patient developed mild influenza-like illnesses with antibody evidence of swine flu infection.

How can human infections with swine influenza be diagnosed? To diagnose swine influenza A infection, a respiratory specimen would generally need to be collected within the first 4 to 5 days of illness (when an infected person is most likely to be shedding virus). However, some persons, especially children, may shed virus for 10 days or longer. Identification as a swine flu influenza A virus requires sending the specimen to CDC for laboratory testing.

What medications are available to treat swine flu infections in humans? There are four different antiviral drugs that are licensed for use in the US for the treatment of influenza: amantadine, rimantadine, oseltamivir and zanamivir. While most swine influenza viruses have been susceptible to all four drugs, the most recent seven swine influenza viruses isolated from humans are resistant to amantadine and rimantadine. At this time, CDC recommends the use of oseltamivir or zanamivir for the treatment and/or prevention of infection with swine influenza viruses. More information on treatment recommendations can be

What other examples of swine flu outbreaks are there? Probably the most well known is an outbreak of swine flu among soldiers in Fort Dix, New Jersey in 1976. The virus caused disease with x-ray evidence of pneumonia in at least 4 soldiers and 1 death; all of these patients had previously been healthy. The virus was transmitted to close contacts in a basic training environment, with limited transmission outside the basic training group. The virus is thought to have circulated for a month and disappeared. The source of the virus, the exact time of its introduction into Fort Dix, and factors limiting its spread and duration are unknown. The Fort Dix outbreak may have been caused by introduction of an animal virus into a stressed human population in close contact in crowded facilities during the winter. The swine influenza A virus collected from a Fort Dix soldier was named A/ New Jersey/76 (Hsw1N1).

Is the H1N1 swine flu virus the same as human H1N1 viruses? No. The H1N1 swine flu viruses are antigenically very different from human H1N1 viruses and, therefore, vaccines for human seasonal flu would not provide protection from H1N1 swine flu viruses.

# **SWINE FLU IN PIGS**

How does swine flu spread among pigs? Swine flu viruses are thought to be spread mostly through close contact among pigs and possibly from contaminated objects moving between infected and uninfected pigs. Herds with continuous swine flu infections and herds that are vaccinated against swine flu may have sporadic disease, or may show only mild or no symptoms of

What are signs of swine flu in pigs? Signs of swine flu in pigs can include sudden onset of fever, depression, coughing (bark ing), discharge from the nose or eyes, sneezing, breathing difficulties, eye redness or inflammation, and going off feed. How common is swine flu among pigs? H1N1 and H3N2 swine flu viruses are endemic among pig populations in the United States and something that the industry deals with routinely: Outbreaks among pigs normally occur in colder weather months (late fall and winter) and sometimes with the introduction of new pigs into susceptible herds. Studies have shown that the swine flu H1N1 is common throughout pig populations worldwide, with 25 percent of animals showing antibody evidence of infection. In the U.S. studies have shown that 30 percent of the pig population has antibody evidence of having had H1N1 infection. More specifically, 51 percent of pigs in the north-central U.S. have been shown to have antibody evidence of infection with swine H1N1. Human infections with swine flu H1N1 viruses are rare. There is currently no way to differentiate antibody produced in response to flu vaccination in pigs from antibody made in re-

While H1N1 swine viruses have been known to circulate among pig populations since at least 1930, H3N2 influenza viruses did not begin circulating among US pigs until 1998. The H3N2 viruses initially were introduced into the pig population from humans. The current swine flu H3N2 viruses are closely related to human

sponse to pig infections with swine H1N1 influenza.

Is there a vaccine for swine flu? Vaccines are available to be given to pigs to prevent swine influenza. There is no vaccine to protect humans from swine flu. The seasonal influenza vaccine will likely help provide partial protection against swine H3N2, but not swine H1N1 viruses.


