



AUSTIN--Six new public lakes, 819 miles of new highways and 18 new safety rest progressed while the jail fac- Texas Highway Department's colorful 1967 Official State Highway Map.

Before the year is out, about one million copies of the map will be distributed throughout the world, inviting Texan and out-of-state visitor alike to "Discover Texas, America's Fun-tier,'

All the new lakes are accessible to the public via the 67-thousand-mile Texas highway system.

Largest of the new reservoirs is Lake Meredith on the Canadian River in the Panhandle. Others are Lake Arrowhead. Fin Creek Reservoir, White River Lake, Bardwell and Somerville Reservoirs.

The new map shows 115 additional miles of Interstate highways, added since last year. More than 1,700 miles of these superb new highways are in service now.


#### **Rodney Blackwood** Is Commissioned







#### Farm Bureau News...



#### LEGISLATIVE REPRESENTATION

**OBJECTIVES:** 

- 1. To represent farmers and ranchers at state and national level.
- 2. To execute policies adopted by membership at state and national level.
- 3. To keep membership informed of status of impending legislation affecting agriculture.
- 4. Coordinate activities of membership in executing policies.

In keeping with the Farm Bureau Objectives listed above, we bring the following issures to your attention. Governor John Connally addressed a joint session of the Texas Legislature on Thursday, February 2, to outline his recommendations on sources of new tax dollars to finance his budget recommendations for fiscal year 1968-69. One recommendation was repeal of the Colson-Briscoe Act which allocates \$30 million each biennium to Farm-to-Market Roads. This would seriously deplete the available funds and almost completely eliminate the Farm-to-Market Road program.

The following bills of vital interest to farmers have introduced to the legislature and referred

I. S.B. 82 by Bernal, Wilson, Mauzy and others, a bill to establish a minimum wage of one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) an hour for each hour and all hours worked during each work week is set for hearing before the Senate Committee on Labor and Management Relations on Wednesday, March 15, 7:00 p.m. in the Senate Chamber. This bill applies to farm labor.

II. H.B. 457 by D. Jones, authorizing producers of any agricultural commodity to conduct a referendum for the purpose of determining whether or not to levy an assessment upon themselves by a 70te of two-thirds of such producers to finance programs of research, education and promotion was introduced in the House of Representatives and referred to the House Committee on Agriculture. This bill further provides that the assessment shall not be more than one percent of the market value of each commodity; provides for collection of such assessments by processors, and a remittance by processors to the secretary-treasurer of each commodity producers' board; provides for a refund to producers on request if application is made within 60 days after date of payment; and provides that any assessment shall be terminated by a simple majority vote of producers in a referendum held upon the petition of 10 percent of the producers participating in the program.
