Sue Darsey Wins Bailey County Spelling Bee

Sue Darsey, 12 year-old Muleshoe Junior high school student was winner of the annual Bailey County Spelling Bee held Monday, 2 p.m. in Muleshoe high school auditorium. It was her first time to enter the Bee.

First runnerup, Babs Haire missed the word "abbot" which Sue spelled, then cinched the Bee with the following word "abbreviation."

The battle for the title was a hard fought one. Veteran pronouncer Fred Johnson went through the first list of words to eliminate the contestants down to the two. . . then Babs tripped up on the first word in the intermediate list.

Sue is the daughter of Mrs. Dan Darsey and a member of the choir, Folksingers and the Junior High band.

Babs Haire, 13 year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Haire and a member of the Junior High band.

Third in the match was Denette Mann, 11 year-old daughter of Franklin Mann. She

left the speller line-up when she missed the word "imaginary," a word she knew how to spell, but became confused.

Much credit to the success of the Bailey County Spelling Bee sponsored by the Muleshoe Journal goes to Fred Johnson, Johnson has a natural gift of coaxing the contestants into a relaxed state to give them a much better chance at the first place slot. Johnson has pronounced for the Journal's Bee each year, with the exception of one, since it began here some 13 years ago. He fully explains all rules to the participants and for added measure, assures them that to lose in good spirits is as important as winning.

The judges are also due much credit toward making the Bee a success. They listen attentively while the child spells and makes fair decisions on the accuracy of the spelling. This year's judges were Robert Hooten, Muleshoe Motor Company; Robert Alford, First National Bank, and John Shelton, Muleshoe State Bank.

Sue Darsey was presented a \$15. Journal check by director of the Bee, Doris Kinser of the Muleshoe Journal. A 7.50 check went to Babs Haire and third place winner Denette Mann received a check for \$2.50. The winners were also given Avalanche-Journal Paper Mate Pins, blue ribbons for all participating school first place winners and white ribbons went to all who entered the Bee.

School winners from Muleshoe Junior high were Sue Darsey, Babs Haire and Cathy Watson; Richland Hills school winners were Denette Mann, Glenda Harlin and Jan Hughes; DeShazo, Rojello Puente, Jeanie Putman, Lorena Hufford and David Hardgrove.

The Bailey County winner will go to Lubbock April 29 where she will be a contestant in the Regional Spelling Bee sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and be eligible as a National Bee candidate.

Sue stated "I am excited, happy and very surprised at

winning the Spelling Bee, I sure want to try hard for the Regional Bee and hope I get to make the Washington trip."

Winner of the Regional Bee

will receive an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. for the National Spelling Bee in June plus many added attractions.

Water For Efficiency

"As irrigation water becomes more scarce it will be necessary for the user to try and obtain the greatest efficiency he can," says SCS officials. It has been found by experiment stations and others that pre-planting irrigation returns the greatest amount of production per acre per inch of water applied than any other irrigation. That does not mean that summer irrigation will not return a profit, but not as pre-planting irrigation.

It has been found that pre-planting irrigation may be applied at any time after the previous crop is harvested. About the top six inches will dry out, but the deep moisture will stay

in the soil profile until it is extracted by plant growth. However, the soil will always dry out as deep as it is stirred and for this reason pre-planting cultivation should be made as shallow as possible in order to conserve the moisture. One should be made as shallow as possible in order to conserve the moisture. One heavy pre-planting irrigation is recommended over two light irrigations because it is more efficient. About one acre inch of water may be lost to evaporation, the eliminations of one of these irrigations result in saving in water and labor.

Accident Takes Life of Emmitt Smith

A pickup-tractor accident at 2:30 p.m. Monday took the life of a long-time Bailey County resident, Emmitt Marvin Smith, 54. The accident occurred 5 miles south of Muleshoe.

Services were held Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. in the Chapel of the Chimes at Singleton Funeral Home.

Rev. Walter Lacey pastor of the Longview Baptist Church, assisted by the Rev. Don Murray, Muleshoe First Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery under direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

Smith was a member of the Longview Baptist Church. He was born October 3, 1912, at Rocky, Okla. He had lived here for the past 20 years.

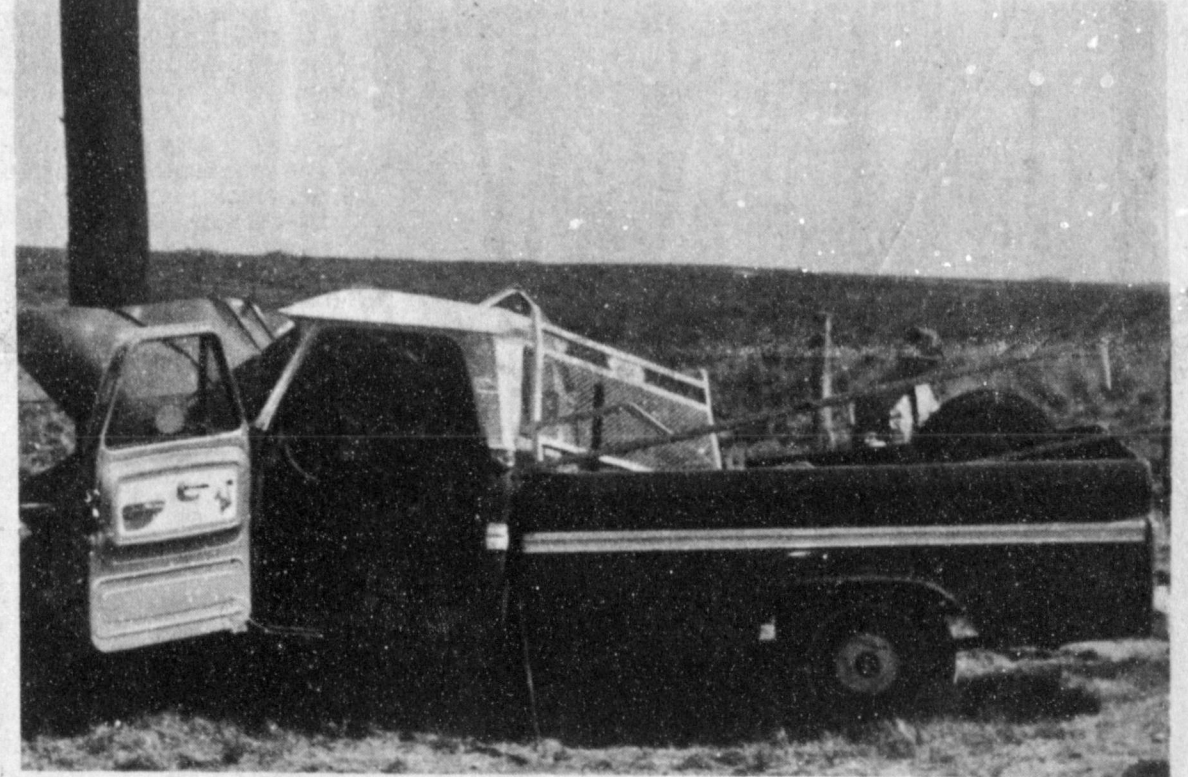
He was killed when his pick-

up side-swiped a tractor and crashed into an electric power pole. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Joe D. Vaughn.

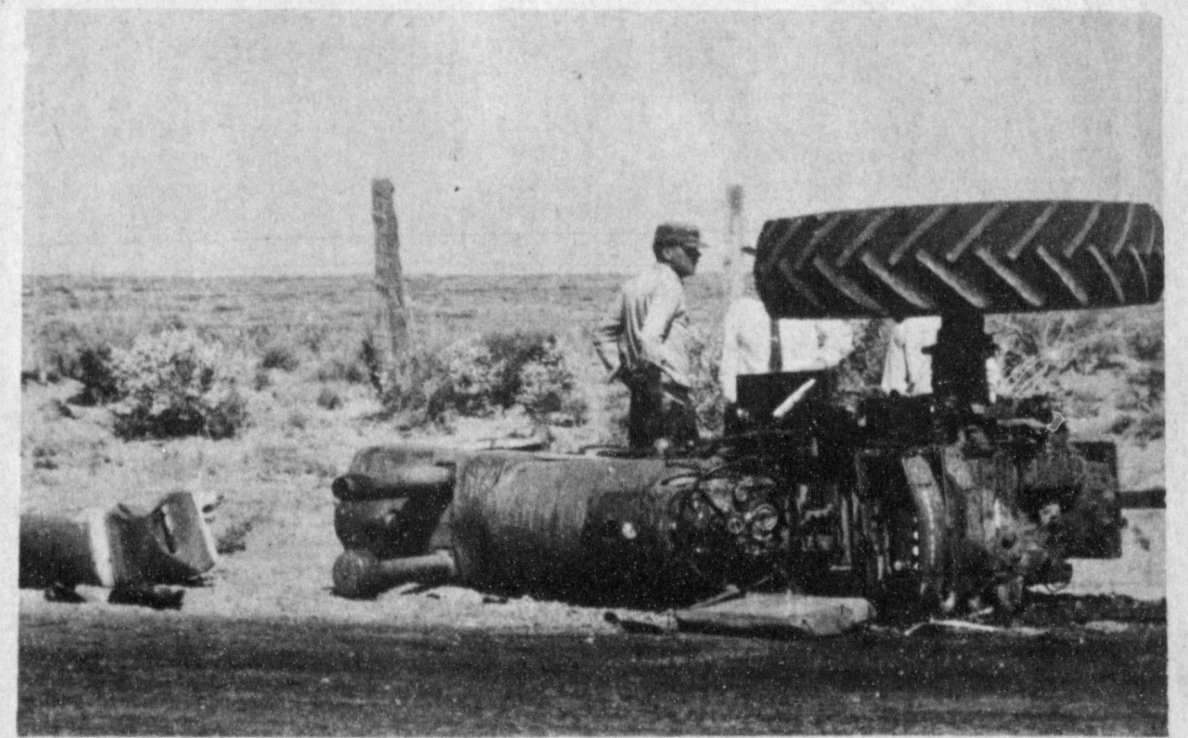
The tractor was being driven by Leo Martinez, Star Route, Sudan, Martinez, was admitted to West Plains Hospital where his condition is listed as "fair." He was thrown clear of the tractor when it overturned following the crash and received back injuries.

Highway Patrolman Freddie Jack said Smith, alone in his pickup, was traveling north and as he approached the tractor from the rear, apparently clipped it as he passed and skidded some 300 feet before his pickup slammed into the pole.

Senate Approves Proposal

Mrs. James (Betty) Jennings attended the recent Austin Legislative meeting as a Muleshoe TSTA representative. She reports that the TSTA proposal received a unanimous vote by Senate roll call.

Highlights of the meeting before the committee were reported by Mrs. Jennings as being most interesting and educational.

Texas' minimum salary program for teachers is not a minimum "but a farce--a sub-standard program which is a disgrace to the great State of Texas," a Texas State Teachers Association leader told the Senate Education Committee here tonight.

The comment came from Dr. Joe B. McNiel, school superintendent at Wichita Falls, during a committee hearing on a teacher salary bill supported by TSTA.

The bill is sponsored by Senator A. M. Aikin, Jr. and would raise the minimum salary schedule for new teachers with bachelor degrees to \$5,004.

Overall, the bill proposes average teacher pay increases of \$775 annually. The program would require a state appropriation of \$170 million to finance the program two years. Local school districts would add about \$17 million per year as

Industry and the Small Town Dilemma

The small town today is a victim of circumstances. It was born in response to a need, a need which is fast passing. No longer must a market center be within ten miles to serve farmers--they can jump into a car and in thirty minutes be as many miles away to shop in stores of their choice. The result is a shifting of trade to those towns that have grown enough to support modern stores. The other towns wither, at least relatively, - some even

pass out of the picture. Unfortunately, towns do not die overnight; rather, they suffer a lingering decay over several generations. Vacant buildings become conspicuous while their neighbors appear dilapidated and tired looking. Taxes must rise in order to maintain civic functions, taxes which become increasingly burdensome. Paradoxically, property values must be kept rising but tax paying ability falls. Young

people leave as soon as possible to seek more attractive livings.

Is it inevitable that this dire prophecy must come true? It appears inevitable that some small towns will ultimately pass into the limbo of the unknown but not all. The survivors will be those that provide for a community? Although it is impossible to trace every dollar of increased personal income there are several groups that are definitely

benefitted. With 338 more people living in the community it is obvious that more groceries will be sold. Homes will be needed and, if newly built, will increase building material sales and demand for more carpenters. Automobile dealers can expect to sell additional cars, which of course, will increase service station, garage and accessory demands. Clothing and dry goods stores should experience increased sales while

banks deposits increase. It thus appears that nearly all business establishments in the community are benefited.

One additional thought should be noted in passing: one industry attracts others. Frequently supporting industries find opportunity and locate near the original industry. In any case, the original industry demonstrates the suitability of the community from an industrial point of view, thus

making it easier to attract other nonrelated enterprises. The first step is hard but, once accomplished, forward movement becomes easier.

Some of the economic benefits of small industry in the small town can be readily demonstrated. Extensive research has indicated, for example, that an industry employing 100 workers will mean:

338 More People, 117 More Households, 55 More School

Children, \$749,000 More Personal Income a Year, \$343,000 More Bank Deposits, 107 More Passenger Cars Registered, 174 More Workers Employed, 4 More Retail Establishments and \$457,000 More Retail Sales Per Year.

Who benefits from increased business activity in increased community income.

During recent years many small towns in Texas have secured industry, in fact,

there are relatively few small towns that do not have one or more industries.

Small town industrial enterprises normally employ relatively few workers. Small industries are considered highly desirable in the small town because they fit readily into the economy of the area. If the industries are of varied types the town is particularly fortunate; economic changes do not affect all equally and greater stability is achieved.

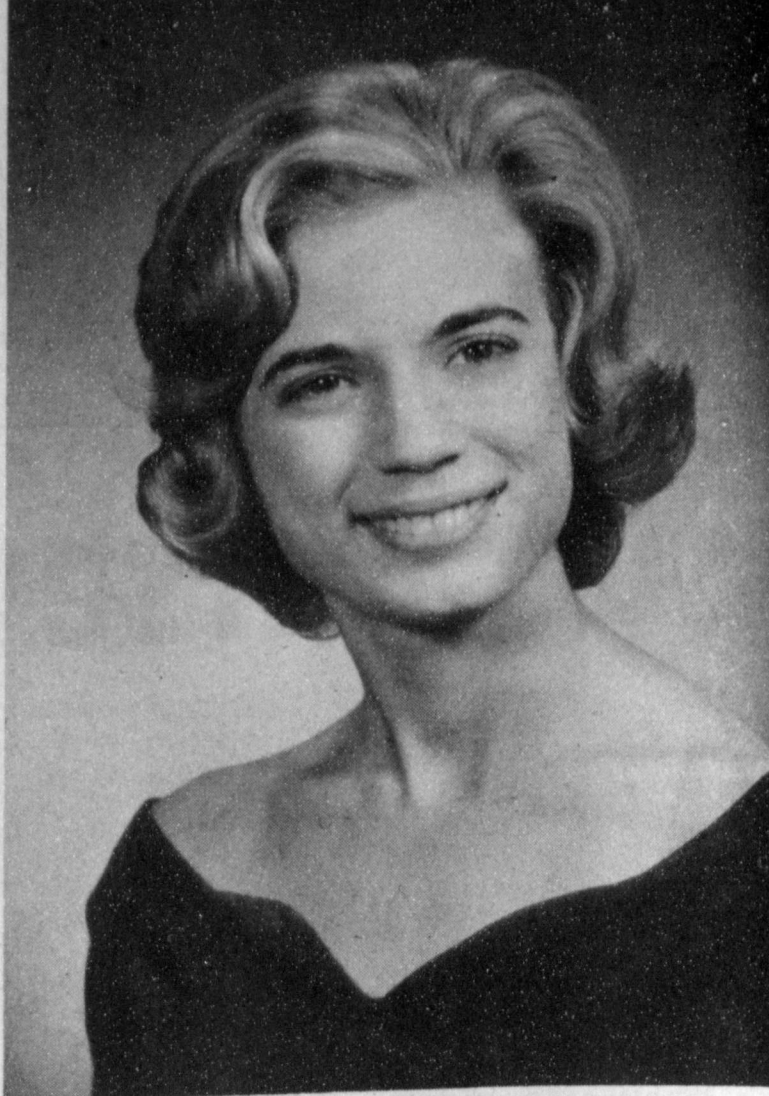
Approximately seventy-five educators from West Texas attended this one day conference.

4-H CLUB NEWS

A new emphasis has been added to one of the oldest programs for 4-H Club members. The 45-year old national 4-H Home Economics program this year features consumer education, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

The reason for introducing the consumer section in the program is because of the need for more guidance in this field in view of the tremendous buying power of American teenagers, a committee spokesman says.

By 1970 teenagers will spend from \$21 to \$30 billion. This compares to \$11 billion spent in 1963.

In less than three years, it is estimated that more than one-fifth of the total U. S. population will be between 10 and 19 years of age. The purchasing power of this young generation will exceed anything in the past.

Today approximately 1.3 million 4-H youths are engaged in home economics projects involving some purchasing. Most of the members are girls, but with the emphasis on consumer education 4-H leaders expect more boys to participate.

Their reasoning is that boys buy clothing, grooming aids, food, furnishings for their rooms, record players, records, televisions and radios. Girl members buy the same things plus small appliances, sewing and interior decoration items. The importance of being an informed shopper is further underscored by the fact that today's teens will suddenly become tomorrow's homemakers.

Club members who highlight consumer emphasis in their projects will be rewarded by Montgomery Ward, the program sponsor.

Awards are six national \$500 scholarships, a trip to the National Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner, and honor medals for four top members in the county. Winners are named by the Cooperative Extension Services which directs all 4-H programs.

To help 4-H leaders and members carry out program goals, the National 4-H Service Committee has published a brochure entitled "4-H Home Economics with Emphasis on Consumer Education."

This educational aid will show 4-H girls and boys, who contribute a sizeable sum to the nation's economy, how they can get the most for their dollars.

Among things to do are (1) become familiar with stores in the community (2) examine quality of merchandise and service (3) check brands, labels, utility (4) compare impulse buying versus planned buying. The young consumers also are urged to study ads, take advantage of seasonal sales, and learn about cash, credit and installment buying.

their share of the salary improvements.

McNiel, who is chairman of TSTA's Legislative Committee, said that the present beginning teacher salary of \$4,104 under the Minimum Foundation Program "will not attract even the minimum number of teachers we need for the schools of Texas."

He referred to the teacher shortage and tied this directly to the state teacher salary schedule.

"The inherent danger is that many schools cannot supplement their salary schedule and for them the Minimum Foundation is a farce," declared McNiel. "It is not a minimum but a substandard program which is a disgrace to the great state of Texas."

McNeill said a "state with the heritage of Texas can maintain (an adequate teacher salary scale), an adequate foundation upon which to build an educational program, not just on the national average, but above, Texas have never been average-- this is no time to start," he said.

TSTA President Sam M. Anderson, of Big Spring, told the Senate committee that 11,000 teachers who completed the school year in May, 1966 did not return to the classroom in September.

"Furthermore, we learned that more than 4,200 of the young men and women who had graduated from colleges and universities in the spring of 1966 fully prepared to teach accepted employment in other states or in fields other than teaching," said Anderson.

"We began school in Texas this year with an actual shortage of more than 1,200 teachers and with some 5,000 others who would not have been working had capable replacements been available."

Anderson said if the state cannot provide inducements this year to relieve the shortage it will be "much worse in the Fall of 1967 than it was in 1966 --and the children of this state will pay a severe penalty."

Another witness, Mrs. A. T. Leveridge, Jr., chairman of Legislation and Citizenship for the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, appeared in support of the TSTA bill and said on behalf of the 798,000 members of PTA in Texas, "I urge you to pass legislation that will provide adequate teacher compensation. . . We support additional teacher pay on behalf of the boys and girls of Texas' schools, who will ultimately benefit from this legislation."

The witnesses before the Senate Education Committee had strong moral support present in the Capitol in the form of an estimated 1,000 teacher leaders from every part of Texas who thronged Austin to visit with their legislators and make known to them the degree of support in the state for improved financial support for Texas public schools.

Lovett Ledger of Copperas Cove, member of the Legis-

lative Committee of the Texas Association of School Boards, told the Senate group that TASB has recently completed a survey of school board members across the state on various proposed education legislation.

Ledger said that the survey shows Texas school board members heavily in favor of the TSTA proposal.

Muleshoe area soils, or mixed land as it is better known, will hold from 1.5" to 2.0" of water per foot of depth, and the sandy soils in this area will hold from 1.0" to 1.5" of water per foot of depth. How we apply irrigation water is a factor because different soils require different methods of application for best irrigation water efficiency.
