


Easter Eggstravaganzal

Three different hunting grounds will be marked off for different age groups to





WO OF MY TRUSTED electronic tools quit working last week, and as this was being written last weekend, neither of them had been fixed. We just use them like telephones—no texting, we don't use the cameras, don't want phones that go on the internet, play tunes, games, movies and TV shows, make coffee and vacuum the living room, although those last two would be handy. We just want to be able to call up anyone we want, and to receive calls from all of my wife's many friends (and both of mine).

Anyway, it was a pain when the phones stopped working last week. But it was worse when our internet and e-mail bombed, because we couldn't even phone the internet provider to report the problem.

With no phone or e-mail or any other way of immediate communication with anyone, I considered building a big fire in my front yard and sending up smoke signals. But with no Indian ancestry, I wouldn't know how to do that either. I think one puff of smoke means "I've got a fire going here," or maybe it means "Help!"







A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes. It doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the 65 or older or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling for 65 and older or disabled homeowners. The age 65 or older homeowners school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling to a new home.

If you're a disabled veteran who receives from the Veterans Affairs (VA)—(1) 100 percent disability compensation due to a service connected disability and (2) a rating of 100 percent disabled or a determination of individual unemployability, you are entitled to an exemption from taxation of the total appraised value of your resident homestead.

Do I have to apply each year? No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2012, you won't need to reapply for 2013 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home-or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2013. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.



The Ira Bulldogs handed the Tahoka Bulldogs its first district baseball loss last Thursday afternoon in Tahoka. They pounded out 11 hits and played nearly flawless defense en route to a 13-4 victory.



"Fake Weed" and "Fake Cocaine":

Dangerous new high can damage nervous systems, cause death

provided by VOICES Community Coalitions, a not-for-profit coalition of Lubbock, Hockley, Crosby, Terry, Lynn and Hale Counties

There have been a growing number of area Head Shops and Smoke Shops opening which sell legal stuff with illegal effects. Such things as Synthetic Weed and Synthetic Cocaine are being sold to youth. These two substances are said to be "potpourri" and "bath salt" but are really illegal substances camouflaged as legal. They contain dangerous chemicals sprayed on them like MDPV, JWH-018 and others.

According to an article published by Roland Macher, Tod W. Burke, PhD., and Stephen S. Owens, PhD., they wrote that in 2011 the U.S. Department of Administration (DEA) placed five synthetic chemicals including "cannabicyclohexanol" a drug that has the same affect but worse than marijuana as illegal. These products are used to coat the herbs and then sell them under fictitious names like K-2, Spice, Mr. Nice Guy, Genie and others. Fake Weed is sold as incense in smoke shops, the internet and stores where you can find incense. The high is similar to marijuana but does not last as long so the user seeks to maintain their high by consuming more and more without knowing the side effects.

The effects of these chemicals and illegal substances such as Bath Salts, act as a psychoactive drug with properties which produce stimulants. They act on the norepinephrine dopamine reuptake inhibitors and are central nervous systems stimulants. They last 3-4 hours and longer depending on how much is being used. The risks to a person's physical body include cerebral vascular accidents (CVS) or strokes, coma, death, decrease in appetite, heavy sweating, dizziness, elevated blood pressure, headaches, tachycardia, kidney failure, heart attacks, seizures, shortness of breath, and swelling of the brain. The risks to the mental health of a person include: agitation, anxiety, auditory and visual hallucinations, euphoria, extreme paranoid

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timberland!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, wildlife managers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the productivity value of their land rather than on market value. This means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district before May 1 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2013 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it before May 1. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.



This application was submitted to the TCEQ on January 22, 2013. The application will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, TCEQ Lubbock regional office, and the United States Post Office, 819 Doak, O'Donnell, Lynn County, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exist, is available for public review in the Lubbock regional office of the TCEQ.

The executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. In addition to the renewal, this permitting action includes the incorporation of the following authorizations or changes to authorized facilities related to this permit: alterations, amendments, and permits by rule. An amendment application that is not subject to public notice or an opportunity for a contested case hearing is also being reviewed. The reasons for any changes or incorporations, to the extent they are included in the renewed permit, may include the enhancement of operational control at the plant or enforceability of the permit. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments, or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. You may request a contested case hearing. 
