



he citizens of the town were ordinary people, most of them working hard to make a living and going about their lives in the usual day-to-day. fashion, living life the way humans do. Until, one day, a stranger came to town. It was the afternoon of Halloween, on Oct. 31.

They had seen strangers before, of course, and at first no one seemed to notice that this stranger was different from any that had passed through before. He entered town from the south, walking down Main Street, peering into the businesses he passed as he strolled along - the lawyer's office, the drug store, the newspaper office, and yes, the courthouse that was centered on the downtown square.



Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session


Monday morning at the Lynn County Courthouse to consider a routine business agenda, but also heard from a citizen who was unhappy with the condition of a county road.

Perry Haney addressed the court to express his opinion about the condition of County Road 22 and FF, citing state statutes about annual road reports and accusing Commissioner Keith Wied of lying when he said that the road was "one of the better roads in his precinct." Haney claimed that the road had been in extremely poor condition for the past 10 years.

Wied said that the road could be graded.

"You are ruining this road!" Haney told Wied. "Somebody is going to get hurt on this road, and if it is my family you can be sure I will be coming after you," Haney warned commissioners.

Commissioner Larry Durham commented that weather issues had prevented any progress on road repairs, saying,



"We can get them graded, but have not had any opportunity to place new materials before the next rain comes."

County Judge Mike Braddock informed Haney that he had been allowed more than the allotted five minutes to address the court, and Haney left the meeting.

In other business, commissioners approved four resolutions - one to apply for the Round IX grant funds from the Texas Historic Commission Courthouse Preservation program for the courthouse restoration project;

resolution proclaiming Noa vember as Home Care Hospice Month; a resolution to submit for a \$6,000 grant for victim notification services through the county's Victim Assistance office; and a resolution for \$8,000 in grant funds for the county's indigent defense program.

Judge Braddock informed commissioners that this year the legislature had approved \$20 million in funds for the THC Courthouse Preservation Program, and said he would represent Lynn County in Austin in March; when the THC grant board will meet to consider appointing the funds to applicants.

"We have a very good person at THC that is our liaison, and we are hopeful that Lynn County will have a good chance to get these funds in Round IX," said the judge.

Commissioners discussed a proposal from District Attorney Michael Munk to use Chapter 59 funds (funds collected through seizures) for the benefit of the DA's office staff, as bonus pay. No action was taken on this issue.

Monthly bills were approved, and commissioners adjourned at 10:10 a.m. Commissioners Wied, Don Blair and Larry Durham were present, as well as other county officials.




