Some 1,800 firemen are taking the courses there under Mr. and Mrs. James Pugh, 300 instructors. Represented Betty and Cindy of Sacramento, are 15 foreign countries and 30 states. Approximately 500 Texas fire departments are represented at the school.

Each city who has two firemen and a fire marshall who satisfactorily completes this course, will receive a five percent insurance credit on Key Rate. In explaination, Fire Chief Earl Ladd said that city residents would benefit through this five percent discount in rate on their policies.

## Kitchen Carpeting Saves Nerves

COLEGE STATION, July 18 --Carpeting in the kitchen isn't just a status symbol. It can be a nerve saver, too, says Mrs. Jane Berry, Extension housing and home furnishing specialist with Texas A&M University.

The specialist explains that carpeting soaks up kitchen noises that come with everyday work and automation. Noises are softened and nervous tension is eased.

Curtains are another noise softener, she says. The more cloth, folds and pleats, the better the sound absorption.


Wood cupboards will absorb more sound than metal. Acoustical tile both on the ceiling and under the upper cupboards also helps. Asbestos liners under the stainless steel sinks will muffle sounds from the metal.

Kitchen equipment should be sound tested before purchase. Some dishwashers, food disposals and exhaust fans make twice as much noise as others. Insulation also helps to reduce noise. Some manufacturers are using insulation in in equipment where it has never been used before.

Planned placing of closets around the work area can be a natural sound barrier for the rest of the house.

definately that a serious midge infestation will occur. However, conditions exist which make this possibility and a warning to this effect is in order.

"Producers who have late planted sorghum are urged to watch early heading fields in their local areas for midge activity. The observance of midge activity in early heading sorghum is a good indication that nearby fields of later heading sorghum may sugger economic damage. The midge control recommendations

should be studied so that insecticides can be applied properly, should control be necessary," Rummel concluded. Thrips populations are still
