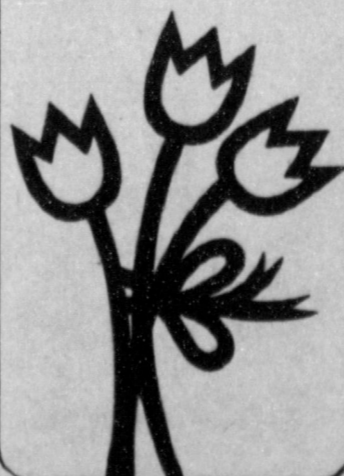
The Rev. C. Middleton Schindler, Lubbock, will be guest minister at the First Presbyterian Church next Sunday morning.

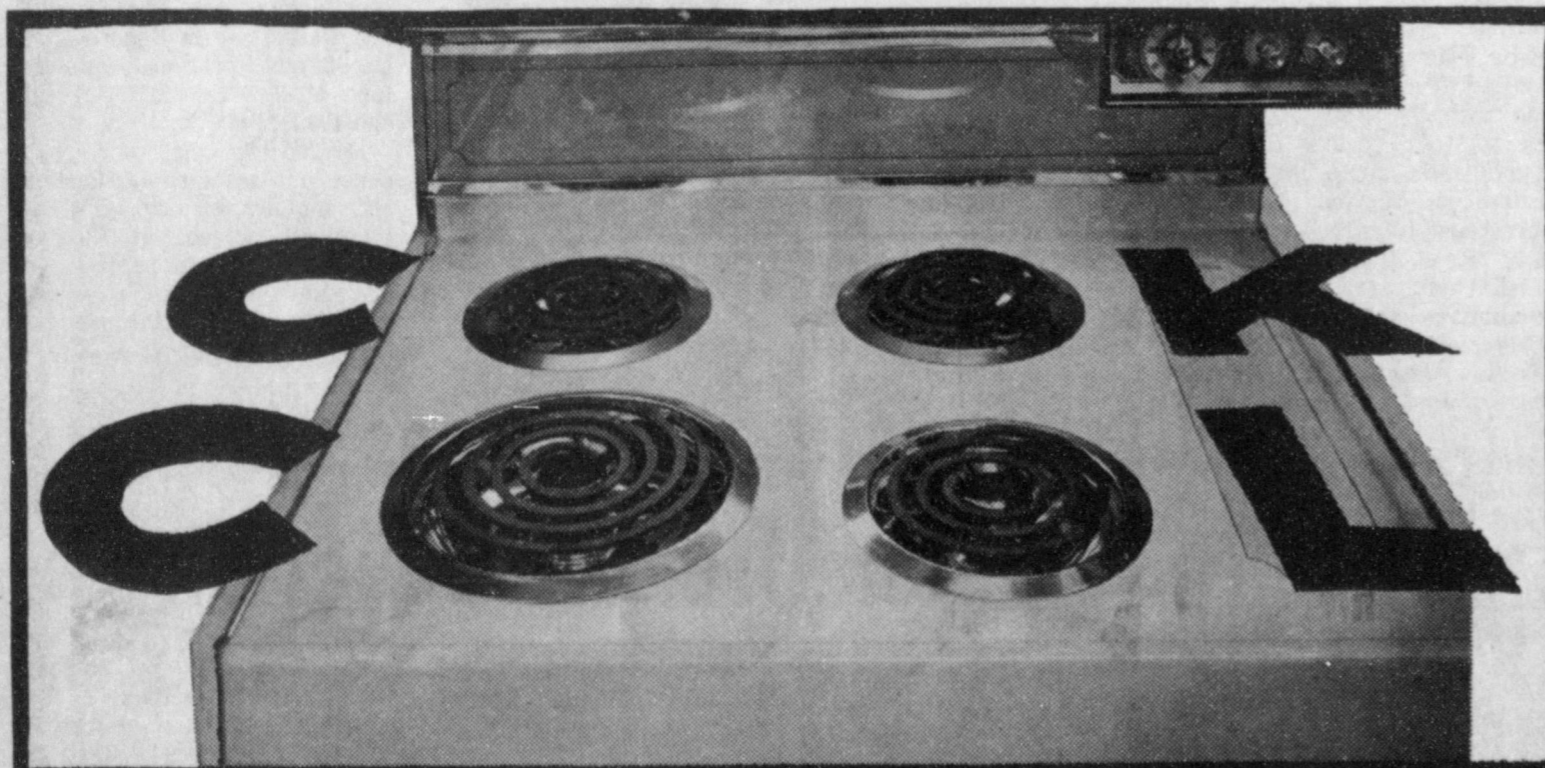

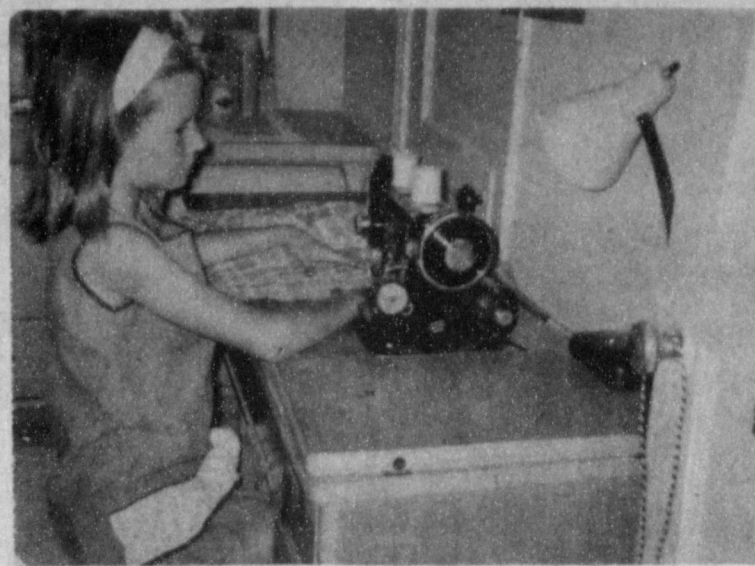

Kitchen Carpeting Saves Nerves

COLEGE STATION, July 18 --Carpeting in the kitchen isn't just a status symbol. It can be a nerve saver, too, says Mrs. Jane Berry, Extension housing and home furnishing specialist with Texas A&M University.

The specialist explains that carpeting soaks up kitchen noises that come with everyday work and automation. Noises are softened and nervous tension is eased.

Curtains are another noise softener, she says. The more cloth, folds and pleats, the better the sound absorption.

Wood cupboards will absorb more sound than metal. Acoustical tile both on the ceiling and under the upper cupboards also helps. Asbestos liners under the stainless steel sinks will muffle sounds from the metal. Kitchen equipment should be sound tested before purchase. Some dishwashers, food disposals and exhaust fans make twice as much noise as others. Insulation also helps to reduce noise. Some manufacturers are using insulation in equipment where it has never been used before.

Planned placing of closets around the work area can be a natural sound barrier for the rest of the house.

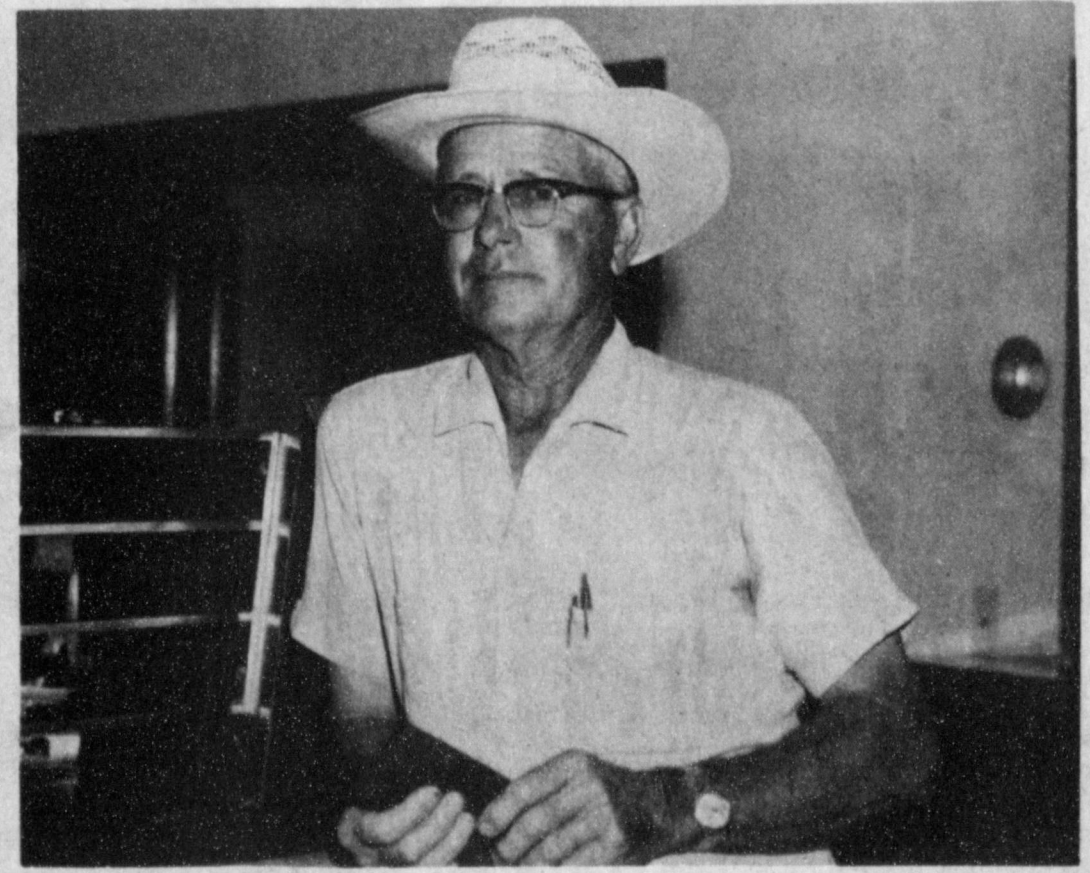
