

## **Courthouse restoration project** could begin as early as February

#### by JUANELL JONES

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning at the county courthouse, hearing information about the courthouse restoration/renovation project from the architectural firm involved in the venture. In the projected timeline, actual work on the project could begin in February 2017.

Dana Compton and Carl Komatsu, representing Komatsu Architects, presented some updated information on the projected costs of the courthouse renovation project, noting that the total project cost is currently estimated at \$8,381,181.

'We have sent revised construction estimates, as we have a little better idea at this time of what this project will actually cost," Compton said, adding that the Texas Historical Commission has indicated that the plan should include a certain percentage of contingency funds in the budget. "Contingency matters

because there are a lot of unknown circumstances in these types of projects," she explained.

The project will include a 24-month construction period, and county officials expect to have a contractor for the project by January. Actual work on the restoration project could begin as early as February 2017, according to information presented by Ms. Compton.

County officials were to meet Wednesday afternoon with representatives from the Texas Historical Commission (which provided \$4.8 million in grant funds for the project), Komatsu and Specialized Public Finance, Inc. to discuss the financial options for funding the county's portion of the project.

A MYSTERIOUS skull with huge eye sockets and fanged teeth, that has left scientists flummoxed, may have belonged to an allen, it is claimed.

. The strange skeleton head. described as 50 per cent bigger than a standard sized version, wasy found by Danish contractors replacing old sewage pipes workers on Sealand Island (in Denmark)

The workers were digging out the 100-year-old pipes when they found the skull under a building that once belonged to a butcher, it is alleged.

**Experts at a Veterinary** College in Copenhagen, who examined the find, concluded: "Although resembling a mammal, certain features make it impossible to fit the animal into Linnaean taxonomy."

The scientists could not link it to any known species on Earth.

Subsequent carbon dating of the skull at the University of Copenhagen's Niels Bohr Institute for the sciences. determined it was about 800 years old - which only added to the mystery as it was found within pipes of just a century old

The skull was found in 2007 but it was not looked at by scientists until 2010.

Further excavation of the area found only animal bones, stone axes, and equipment from the Neolithic period - nothing else that could be linked to the skull.



### Lightning strike kills more than 300 wild reindeer in Norway

A lightning strike has killed more than 300 wild reindeer in Norway, in what officials described as an unusually large natural disaster. The Norwegian Environment Agency said 323 animals were killed, including 70 calves.

Agency spokesman Kjartan Knutsen said it is not uncommon for reindeer or other wildlife to be killed by lightning strikes, "but we have not heard about such numbers before."

He said reindeer tend to stay very close to each other in bad weather, which could explain how so many were killed at once during Friday's storm.

Thousands of reindeer migrate across the barren Hardangervidda plateau as the seasons change

It is the second time this month that a large group of animals has been killed by lightning. On August 25, 38 sheep died after they were hit by lightning in the Indian district of Kanchipuram.



### NOTICE OF ELECTION

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a board election in the Southern High Plains Caprock Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, in order to select a representative of the above-referenced zone to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The Southern High Plains/Caprock Eradication Zone consists of all of Cochran, Hockley, and Lubbock counties; that part of Terry County that is north of a line 1.25 miles south of the Hockley County line from FM 303 east to Highway 385 and all land north and east of a line with boundaries of County Road 230, County Road 525 also known as Cemetery Road, and County Road 280 to the Lynn County line; that part of Lynn County north and east of a line 5 miles north of Hwy 380 following County Road 18 that extends from the Terry County line east for 10 miles, then turns south to Hwy 380, and runs east to the intersection of FM 212 before turning south to the Borden County line; that part of Crosby County that is above the Caprock Escarpment, that part of Garza County that is above the Caprock Escarpment; and that part of Dickens County that is above the Caprock Escarpment

Any cotton grower having planted cotton in the year 2016 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Southern High Plains Caprock Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton intended to be commercial cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm, or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm or from an indemnity or other payment received from or related to the planting, growing, or failure of the cotton. Any person eligible to vote in the board member election that resides in the Southern High Plains Caprock Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received by the Department at its office located in Austin by November 6, 2016, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

The board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed to cotton growers by November 18, 2016. All ballots cast by mail must be postmarked no later than December 6, 2016, in order to be valid.

Because the day will be a shortened school day, the district will be focused on cleanup efforts and actions of goodwill rather than actual renovationtype projects. The district has a form located on the district's website (tahokaisdaus) that local businesses can fill out requesting help from the district for this day.

Because of limitations due to transportation and resources, not all requests will be able to be honored. However, the district will contact businesses that put in a request for help of which we are able to be of assistance," said the superintendendent.

#### Japanese karate expert, 63, fights off bear

A 63-year-old karate expert was the unlikely victor of a fight with an angry bear, police in Japan have said.

Atsushi Aoki was fishing in the mountains of the Gunma Prefecture region when the animal emerged from woodland. The snarling black bear - reportedly standing at 6 ft 3 inches on its hind legs - set upon him in an unprovoked attack, he told Japanese broadcaster TBS.

However, Mr Aoki said he was more than a match for his assailant, fighting the animal off with his bare hands. Despite being knocked to the floor, he managed to pick himself up and face up to his opponent. Rather than fleeing, he used his own deadly fighting skills to take the upper hand, punching the bear between the eyes. The animal then retreated.

"The bear had such, such great strength. I was knocked over when it leapt at me. It scratched me and bit me. But in the end I managed to trick the bear, poked it in the eves and it ran away." After the attack, Mr Aoki apparently made his own way to a nearby hospital, where he received treatment for minor injuries. Gunma police officials have warned anyone who comes across a bear in the wild not to copy Mr Aoki martial arts exploits. (SkyNews.com, Sept. 13, 2016)

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
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## The Birds ...

#### ... and the Bees


