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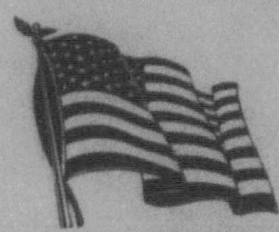

Wayne Howard "Jack" Miller of Tahoka passed away on Saturday, November 5, 2016 at the age of 90. He was born May 30, 1926 in Red River County, TX to Roy Lee and Eva Gertie (Lindsay) Miller. Jack was drafted to the United States Army in high school. He served four years before being honorably discharged from the Army Air Force. 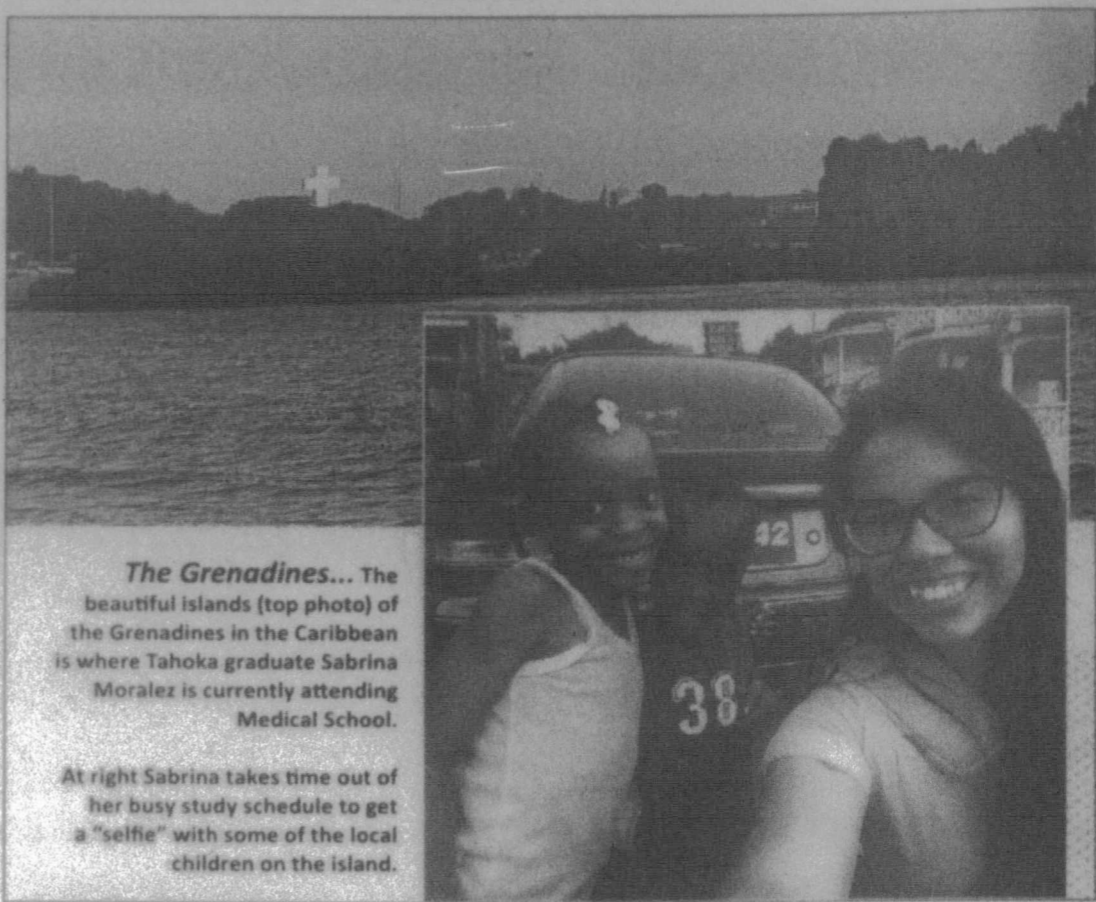

Student finds calling in missionary work

(Editor's Note: The following article was printed in the Hardin-Simmons University newspaper in Abilene, about Jaree Bell, daughter of Terry and Twila Bell, who are currently missionaries in Songea, Tanzania East Africa, and the granddaughter of Lindell and Jean Bell of Tahoka. Terry is a 1978 graduate of Tahoka High School.)

Christ, and wanted him to see me in whatever way he decided. He called me at that time to be a missionary, and I don't know when or where that will happen, my passion for art is going to apply to my future as a missionary. As I grew up, I knew I had a passion for art and I couldn't imagine any other major job that I could find joy in everyday. There is a way, I don't know how yet, to use it to share the gospel. Maybe I'll be called to a country where I can't go in as a titled missionary, and I could go as an art teacher," Bell said.

The life of a missionary is not an easy one and few people know this better than Hardin-Simmons Sophomore Jaree Bell. As the child of missionary parents, she has spent most of her life trying to bring the gospel to foreign nations.

"I was born in Nairobi, Kenya and I grew up in Shinyanga, Tanzania," Bell said.

Bell has been living the life of a missionary since birth, with few exceptions.

"We lived in Shinyanga for 14 years before our missionary agency moved us. We spent about a year in America, and then went to Songea, Tanzania to spread the gospel."

Spending so much of her life in Africa has made the American way of life stand out to Bell.

"There's just so many white people here!" Bell said. "I always look around and wonder where all the people are. In Tanzania, people are everywhere."

As a child of missionaries, Bell had many opportunities to watch how the word of God could change people's lives.

"My family worked with the Sukuma people group. They're cow herders, and their agriculture is a big part of their lives. My dad is an agriculturalist and he used this method as "Planting God's Way" to teach them how to plant their crops better and at the same time teach them about the gospel.

Bell spent her days helping her family help others in every way possible.

"Every day, there were people just waiting outside. They knew the missionaries would help them if they could, so people came to us with all kinds of problems. They would talk to my dad to see how he could help, then we would pray with them and give them flour or vegetables from our garden."

While most would likely struggle with this way of life, Bell embraced it completely.

"By my junior year of high school, I gave my life fully to

but I know it will and I'm really excited. God gave me so much peace and so much satisfaction in him, knowing that what I'm going to be doing is to glorify him," Bell said.

Although Bell plans on spending her life as a missionary, she has decided to pursue a bachelor's degree in art at Hardin-Simmons.

"I've always questioned how

bringing in Africa will continue to positively impact her life.

"Growing up where I did give me a broader perspective and lets me see so many different things. But living as a missionary has made me able to look back and see how God was working. Always God made it work out, and always we could point back and glorify him."

October goes down as 4th warmest ever

Warm temperatures in Texas dominated the month of October, so much so that the month will go down as the fourth warmest in the state's history, according to figures from the State Climatologist. John Nielsen-Gammon, Regents Professor of Atmospheric Sciences at Texas A&M, says the month also tied for the sixth driest since 1895.

"So far, we know that 215 records were set all across the state," Nielsen-Gammon says.

"About 70 percent of those records were set during the period Oct. 16-20. Every single station reported above-normal temperatures for the month. The warmest areas relative to normal were the northern Panhandle, the Midland-Odessa area and northeast of Dallas."

Numerous national records have also been set in much of the Southwest, Midwest and Northeast, with many stations recording October temperatures 20 degrees above normal. Also, many northern cities have yet to record their first freeze, and areas such as Denver had no measurable snowfall in October.

"October's weather doesn't mean much going forward, but the combination of a long-term warming trend and a likely La Niña (cooler than normal waters in the Central Pacific Ocean that tend to influence weather patterns) event does mean that win-

ter is likely to be warm across Texas," he added.

"We're seeing drought spreading across much of the state, with core drought areas in East & South Texas. At this point, November is looking quite a bit wetter, but the overall outlook for the winter favors drier than normal conditions."

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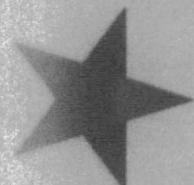
