## Council Approves SWPS Rate Increase

Muleshoe City Council approved a rate increase requested by Southwestern Public Service at the regular meeting held Tuesday afternoon.

Need for the increase, the first general hike request by the company since 1951, was explained to councilmen by Southwestern Public Service officials.

The increase amounts to 7.62 percent average for residential and commercial customers alike. The new rates raise the company's rate of return on investment from 5.65 percent to 5.98 percent.

For the average residential user, the rate will mean an increase of from 77 cents to \$1.16.

Company spokesmen detailed the proposed new rates for electrical power.

For residential service in homes which are not electrically heated or do not heat water electrically the new rate schedule is as follows:

6.50 cents per kwh for the first 50 kwh used each month.  
4.30 cents for the next 50 kwh used each month.

2.15 cents per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month.  
1.70 cents per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

The 1.70 cents bottom step on the rate schedule for regular residential service is the lowest rate for this type of service the company has ever offered.

This additional block recognizes the trend toward increased use of electric service in modern day living and offers to the customer the benefits accruing to the company when it is able to utilize larger, more efficient equipment.

The new commercial rates call for the following schedule:

6.50 cents per kwh for the first 100 kwh used each month.  
4.20 cents per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month.

2.15 cents per kwh for the next 6000 kwh used each month.  
1.30 cents per kwh for the next 6000 kwh used each month.

.80 cents (eight-tenths of one per cent) per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

When the commercial customer's demand (the number of kilowatts the company must have available to serve his load) exceeds 10 kw, then the 4.20 cents block of the rate will be extended 38 kwh for each kw of demand above 10 kw.

The demand feature of the rate affects only a small percentage of the commercial customers.

Representatives of three groups were present at the City Council meeting to obtain information for community betterment.

They were Mrs. Dollie Ann, Muleshoe Study Club, Mrs. Cecil Cole, Historical Survey Committee and Mrs. J. Pat Wagon, Muleshoe Area Women's Service Organization.

The representatives were concerned with the need for a community building and how

funds could be obtained for one.

The bonds voted for a municipal swimming pool and a municipal building in 1946 were inquired about by the women.

The council explained the \$25,000 was used for the swimming pool and an additional \$10,000 for the Chlorine system which left a total of \$15,000.

Of this figure, the council has recently appropriated approximately \$8,000 for building tennis courts, leaving \$7,000 in Certificate of Deposit which is drawing interest.

Pointing out to the council that they were concerned that facilities were not available to hold such things as flower shows such as Morton and other area towns had held in the past and are currently slated, due to conflicts in booking adequate buildings, they ask how such facilities could be obtained.

Space for teaching children dancing without going out of town not being available was brought out. The women, in citing functions held in other cities, felt the counties had assisted with building facilities.

They were told by the Council that bonds would have to be voted for such a building if constructed by the city.

Councilman St. Clair stated that the office building on the airport land, approximately 20 by 40 feet was not being used and should some agreement be reached with the present lessee, Morgan Locker, this was a possibility of an additional meeting place for clubs and shows and things of this nature.

Interest in the park situation was also denoted by the organization representatives.

The Council was asked if plans were in the making for large parks or small ones.

Councilman Williams said that several small parks could possibly be worked out better than a large one and Lambert expressed his belief that drainage would prove a problem at the proposed site for a large

park in the Richland Hills addition.

The city survey presently underway would include park sites, Williams reviewed, and related that after the Larsen report was submitted it would take time to obtain a Federal Grant and would possibly take one and one-half years to get work underway.

It was also explained that various parts of the pending bond issue could be voted on separately, if specific items were desired.

Two ordinances were passed by the Council. One was an ordinance passed compelling all natural gas companies distributing gas to pay a three percent franchise.

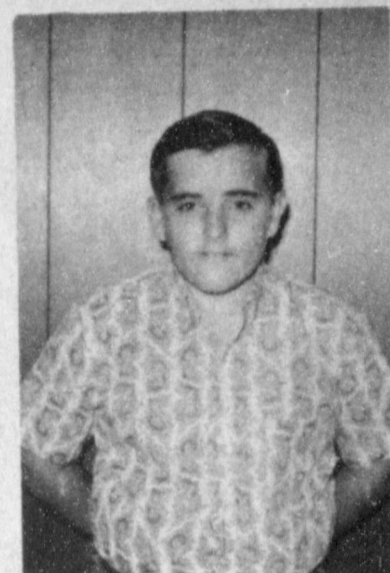
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### Contest Winners

## United Fund Campaign To be Launched Oct. 23

The Muleshoe Area United Fund campaign will be kicked off Monday, October 23, with a breakfast meeting, time and division to be announced. The goal for the year has been set at \$14,800.

A meeting of the board of directors of the Muleshoe Area United Fund was held at 11 a.m. Tuesday in the Community Room of the Muleshoe State Bank.

Roy Whitt, Budget and Ad-

missions chairman, reviewed the proposed budget, explaining the increase and decline, in the assistance given those organizations by United Fund and the functions of the organizations.

The budget was adopted by the directors.

One group has become self-supporting and no longer requires assistance from the Fund. This group is the Muleshoe Area Youth Center which was assisted by United Fund until this year.

Three groups receiving increases are Bailey County Jr. Livestock Show from the 1966 figure of \$3,495, to \$3,700 this year; the American Red Cross was raised from \$500 to \$1,000 and Babe Ruth League from \$461 to \$1,400. The Livestock Show projection for this year shows an increase of 15 percent over last year's show and thus, more money will be needed. Money which went to the Youth Center last year dropped from this year's budget totals \$750.

The budget and organizations include Bailey County Jr. Livestock Show, \$3,700; Boy Scouts of America, \$2,500; Salvation Army, \$1,800; Girl Scouts, \$1,525; Babe Ruth League, \$1,400; American Red Cross, \$1,000; United Service Organization, \$200; 4-H Development, \$150;

Medical Research Foundation of Texas, \$50; Texas United Fund, \$100; Muleshoe Area Senior Citizens, \$500; Southwestern Diabetic Foundation, \$250; and Reserve for Contingencies, \$700 and Campaign and operating expense fund, \$950.

This brings the total budget and goal for the 1967 campaign to \$14,800.

The coaching staff of the Muleshoe school system were guests of the Rotary Club at noon Tuesday.

Head coach Dick Stafford was presented by Myron Pool, Rotarian in charge of the program.

Of the athletic program, Stafford said "It is difficult to lose, but we have fine young men on the team and are limited in number with only 31 coming out for football for the Mules. We have won one, and lost two, but we feel that the kids played hard and played good."

"This is not an alibi...our kids have not lay down and quit. We have some capable people," he continued.

"It will be a two or three year overhauling program, yet our kids have pride and do not like to be beaten."

"We appreciate the attendance and the fact that the team has not been criticized for losing. This year, the downtowners and the community is encouraging the boys and helping with the athletic program."

the courts will be 120 by 120 and will be used for Physical Education classes, and the public. They will be maintained by the school after they are constructed.

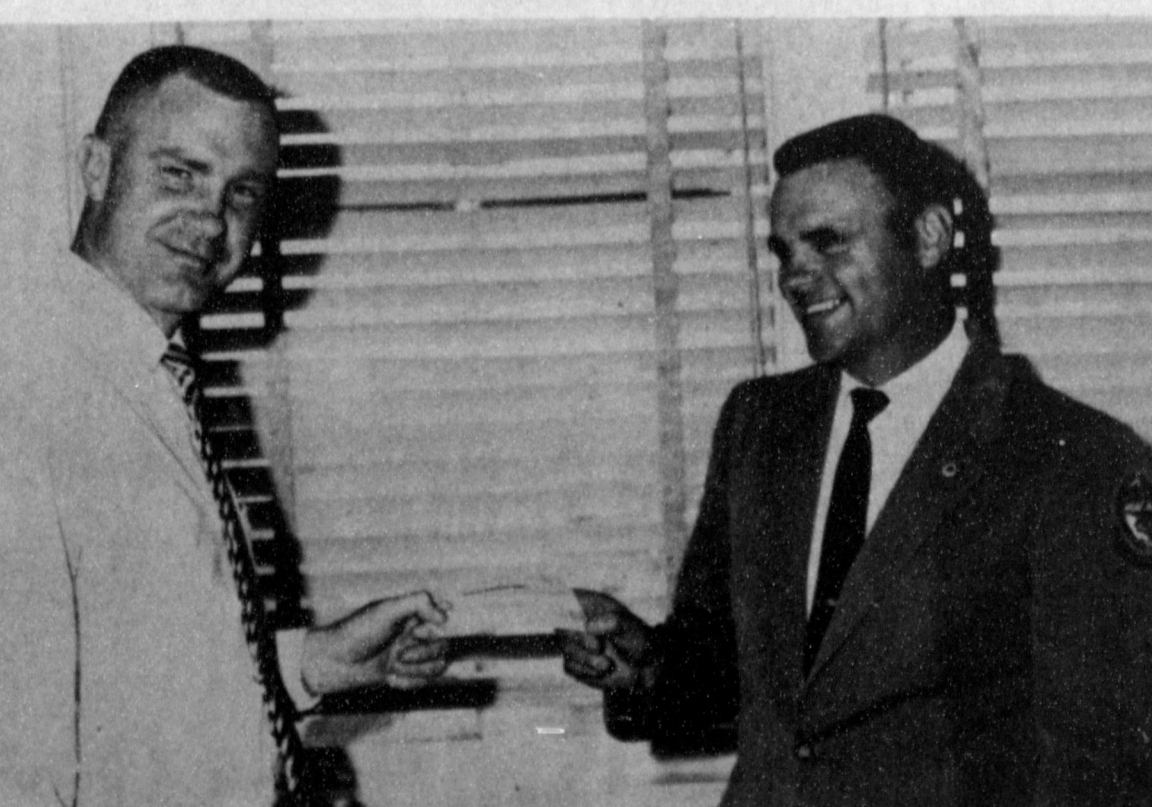
St. Clair said they would meet NCAA regulations and concrete work is expected to be started next week.

### County Receives Check From Wildlife Refuge

Refuge Manager, Keith S. Hansen today presented County Judge, Don Cihak, with a check for \$1,764. This presentation was made at the regular weekly meeting of the County Commissioners.

The payment represents the county's share of revenue generated from the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge and is figured on the adjusted cost of the acquired lands within the refuge. This is the second payment to the counties under Public Law 88-523, which set up the procedure now in use for distribution of revenue from the refuge receipts. This law further specifies that funds paid to the county under this act must be used for schools and/or roads. The commissioners voted to split the money in the following manner: County Road and Bridge Fund, \$882; Muleshoe Public Schools, \$442; and \$220 each to the Bula and Three-Way Independent School Districts.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN--Gov. John Connally dropped a political bombshell on the state capitol scene by reportedly telling 45 top supporters in a meeting at the Mansion that he has about made up his mind not to run for re-election.

Word of his unexpected reluctance promptly leaked to newsmen. Connally confirmed that the meeting was held and the possibility of a fourth term was discussed.

"My mind is not finally and irrevocably made up," he stated. "I have a pretty firm idea what I am going to do, but I am not prepared to announce the decision. I may decide within the next few days, but I think it will be longer--two weeks or later."

Backers began deluging the governor's office with telephone calls and some newspapers are sounding editorial appeals for the governor to run "just one more time."

U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough's name figures increasingly in the list of prospective gubernatorial candidates following a disagreement between Connally and the senior senator over flood aid.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, who already has announced as a candidate for the top spot, continues his campaigning in East Texas where he is conducting a "listening tour."

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has stated repeatedly he might run for governor if Connally does not.

House Speaker Ben Barnes says he will run for lieutenant governor regardless of Connally's ultimate decision.

COURT RACES SPOTLIGHT--State high court races are assured more than ordinary attention in 1968 primaries by the early announcements of three incumbent judges that they will not seek re-election.

Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Wesley Dice is the latest

to reveal plans to step aside at the end of his present term. States Attorney Leon Douglas immediately announced as a candidate for the place.

Earlier announcements were made by State Supreme Court Associate Justices James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffin that they will retire after next year. Potential candidates to succeed them include Austin District Judge Tom Reavley, Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, Associate Justice Matt Davis of the Texarkana Court of Civil Appeals and Houston District Judge Sears McGee.

NEW INSPECTION ITEMS--Auto inspections, expanded by the new State law, are underway at 5,500 stations and will continue through April 15.

Don't be surprised at the additional items covered by the new \$1.75 fee. They will include:

\*Required front seat safety belts on every car which has anchorages as part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

\*Checking for "lash" or "play" in steering control. Vehicles will be rejected if steering wheel can be turned more than two inches without front wheel motion. It must also be possible to turn the wheels from full right to full left without jamming or binding. Vehicles with power steering must be checked with power on, and if fluid is below recommended level, car will not pass inspection.

\*Wheels with defective or bent rim flanges or those with loose or missing bolts, nuts or lugs will cause rejection of the vehicle.

AIRPORT AID ALLOTTED--Texas Aeronautics Commission has allocated \$467,260 to 24 towns and a county for airport development.

Funds went to Wharton County (\$24,500) and these communities:

Alpine, \$14,000; Bay City, \$20,000; Canton, \$18,000; Clifton, \$9,760; Dimmitt, \$20,000; Dublin, \$18,000; Ennis, \$27,500; Gilmer, \$18,000; Granbury, \$20,000; Kenedy, \$18,000; Knox City, \$20,000; Kerrville, \$20,000; Levelland, \$18,000; Liberty, \$18,000; Littlefield, \$18,000; Livingston, \$20,000; Llano, \$20,000; Madisonville, \$27,500; Paducah, \$14,000; Shamrock, \$18,000; Slaton, \$18,000; Stamford, \$18,000; Weslaco, \$10,000; and Wills Point, \$20,000.

COURTS SPEAK--Reversing a 32-year-old decision denying right of parents to recover damages for death of a child due to pre-birth injuries, State Supreme Court recognized the right of parents to collect compensation in such a case. Suit involved the death of a two-day-old infant as a result of injuries sustained before birth in an auto-truck accident.

Court in other actions:

\*Upheld denial of applications for savings and loan institutions in La Grange.

\*Agreed that the City of Fort Worth and Fort Worth schools can tax Greyhound buses within their jurisdictions.

\*Set a November 22 hearing on a Negro's suit against a Houston club manager who refused to serve him and allegedly jerked a plate out of his hand.

ATTACK ON CRIME--House Speaker Barnes revealed his three-pronged plan on the pro-

blem of rising crime rate in Texas.

The "concentrated attack" would equip law-enforcement

officers with the tools necessary to offset a "wave of lawlessness", he said.

First of the three steps is the appointment of a study committee to make a continual study of the Code of Criminal Procedure, which was passed by the 59th Legislature and revised somewhat by the 60th Legislature.

Second point will be the production of a Manual of Law Enforcement, designed to insure uniformity in crime prevention in the state, to be put out by a recently appointed Law Enforcement Study Committee.

Finally, Barnes wants to establish a state police academy, which would be open to law officers of all levels within the state, from highway patrol to county sheriffs and city police.

AUCTION SALE--High bids on oil and gas leases on University of Texas lands in West Texas averaged \$54 an acre. Funds will be used mainly for university construction.

Jerry Sadler, Land Commissioner and Chairman of the Board for Lease of University Lands, said the 170 tracts totalled 45,000 acres and brought high bids of \$2,426,400. He expressed satisfaction with this figure.

AG RULES--New law, requiring American government and history courses in state institutions of higher education and junior colleges for general academic courses, is not applicable to vocational or technical course certificates given for State Board of Vocational Education-approved courses, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

In other opinions Martin held that:

\*State comptroller may refund tax overpayments made under mistake of fact or mistake of law under duress.

\*Comptroller must refund forfeited discount and deductions and penalties and interest when a taxpayer is able to show returns were mailed on time but postmarked late.

\*Motor vehicle sales tax applies to all sales of motor vehicles to a dealer where vehicle is extensively utilized for personal or business purposes of the dealer, his family or employees, including use of vehicle as a demonstrator.

\*Comptroller's office can use state funds to pay premiums on existing group life insurance policy for its employees. No new group contract is necessary under recent law.

\*Fees cannot be paid by a county to its own county clerk in condemnation proceedings brought by the county.

DRAFT QUOTA SET--Texas' draft boards have received a quota of 1,159 men for November, reports Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director.

Figure compares with 977 for October, 1,180 for September, 1,421 for August, 974 for July and 975 for June.

National call totals 22,000, all for the Army.

State draft boards will forward 4,650 men in November for pre-induction examination, compared with 4,000 for October.

SHORT SNORTS--New Texas calendar of events, listing 300 fairs, festivals and celebrations for fall, winter and early spring, is available through the State Highway Department and its tourist bureaus.

Dr. James B. Henderson of Coleman was named new executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission to succeed Dr. S. B. Walker who resigned to re-enter private practice.

Continued from Page 1 2. We Resolve to support and approve all of 1967 policies stated and adopted by the Annual Convention in Mineral Wells, Texas, November 2, 1966. 3. We Resolve that \$1.00 per bale be paid to the CPI by the company or individual that gets the "city cotton," to help pay their part of the Research and Promotion Bill. 4. We ask that the gins install automatic sampling devices or machines. (We emphasize No. 3, which states as follows: Permitting reclassing of cotton owned by the government, by processors or exporters, discriminates against the producer and strong local markets at harvest time, we therefore urge that the government regulations be to assure that the first classing of cotton prevails. The grade card showing weight, grade and quality should be permanently affixed to the compress ticket from the time the bale is sold by the producer until the bale reaches the processor.) 5. We Resolve to keep the 1968 cotton allotment acres just as they are, and relax penalties for skiprow planting back to the 1965 rules and regulations, and raise diversion payments to 100% of parity. 6. We urge the Department

of Agriculture to continue to allow us to substitute wheat and feed grain allotments acreage. 7. We are in favor of a long term feed grain program that will maintain the producers' income at a full parity price through a program which utilizes the present price support system, supply adjustment and compensatory payments at 50% of county support rate times projected yield. 8. We resolve to appeal to State ASC Committee to raise diverted acre grazing from the present time of October 1, to September 1, for the top 27 counties of the High Plains. 9. We approve all livestock resolutions, with special emphasis and approval on No. 4 concerning Screwworm Eradication Program. 10. We urge the NATIONAL FARMERS UNION to support the legislation proposing the establishment of a Federal Bank for rural telephone systems now pending in Congress. STRONGER BARGAINING POWER 11. We resolve (a) We urge the Secretary of Agriculture to resist pressure to increase cotton acreage in order to keep cotton more in line with demand. (b) We urge the Secretary of Agriculture to lend his aid to the passage of any law necessary to protect us so that we may bargain collectively.

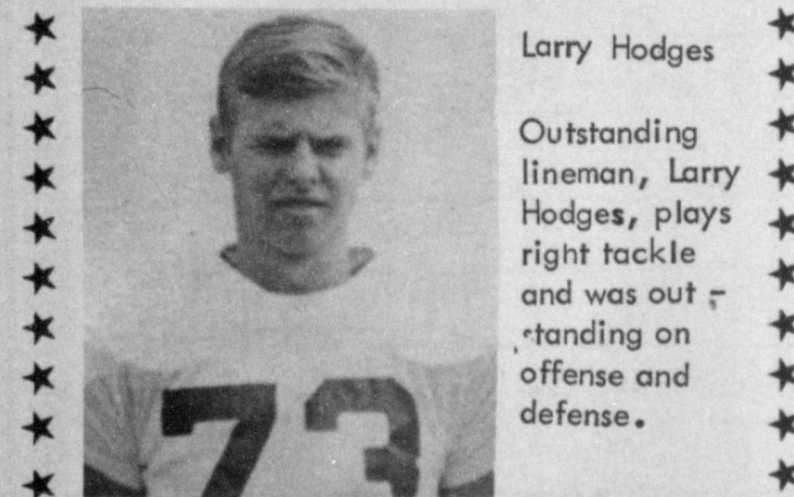

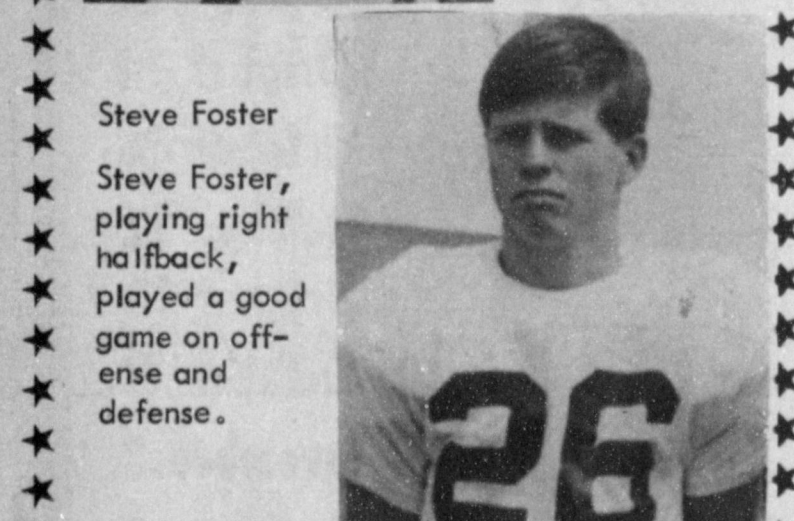

Mix one cup sugar, 3/4 cup flour (don't bother to sift it) and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Blend four tablespoons of butter into the flour mixture with a pastry blender. Spread this dry mixture over the apples and bake at 400 degrees for about 30 minutes or until brown. Serve plain or with cream.

## End Debate, Withdraw, Force Urges Opposition

The debate continues on the President's proposal for a 10 percent surtax on income. Next to the war in Viet Nam and recent riots across the country, nothing has drawn such a vigorous protest from citizens of the Panhandle since I arrived in Washington.

House majority leader Gerald Ford pointed to cuts already made in non-essential Federal spending by Republicans "with the aid of some enlightened, disenchanted Democrats. These cuts add up so far to some \$4 billion. But more, much more, is required," Ford said.

"It will not result, however, until this Administration, with its Democratic majorities in the Congress, responds to the American people's demand that this dreadful pressure on the ever-rising cost of living be removed.

Senator Dirksen recalled that just a year ago this month we were told by the Johnson-Humphrey Administration that what America needed was "a strong dose of self-discipline. To this we replied, as we do now, that to ask self-discipline of labor, to ask self-discipline of management, to ask self-discipline of the farmer, to ask self-discipline of the Congress, to ask self-discipline of the housewife and the consumer was pious and pointless, as it is now -- until the President asks self-discipline of his Administration and his own Democratic majorities in the Congress. We were not impressed then. We are not impressed now."

To describe the nation's present economic trend as nightmarish, as several have done, is an understatement. The impact of Federal, state and local taxes has rarely been so great. Interest rates and a growing curbs on available credit have seldom been as high or as strong. The jobless rate among the unskilled and minority group workers is dangerously high. The Federal budget deficit anticipated is astronomical. The nation's balance of payments and our growing weakness in the world market-place are ominous. This Administration's fiscal and monetary policies require drastic overhauling. We Republicans in Congress will do everything in our power to bring it about.

As always, the people who are hurt the most by this skyrocketing cost of living and economic mismanagement are those who can stand it least -- the housewife, the wage-earner, the pensioner, the poor. To the extent that the Republican minority in Congress can do so, we shall put a stop to it.

We are fighting a war on two fronts -- one in Viet Nam and one here at home. Both have become critical. The Johnson-Humphrey Administration has regularly lambasted those "tired people" who oppose the so-called "Great Society's" multi-billion dollar programs, insisting that we can fight and win the war in Viet Nam while at the same time we spend even more billions for "Great Society" programs and experiments. We cannot. And if to our voices others are needed to swell the chorus of protest, add that of the respected Democratic Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, Mr. Mills, who insists, with us, that we cannot have both guns and butter.

To those who believe that "Federal money" will solve all our problems, this reminder: there is no such thing as "Federal money". It is your money, no one else's. And if you don't believe that, take another look at your last income tax payment. It is the American people's money, siphoned from every home and hearth, that is being spent for the national security -- which is right. It is more and more of this same money that is being spent for these "Great Society" experiments and adventures -- too many of which are wrong.

Attack Squadron 66 is a member of Carrier Air Wing Six and flies the A4C "Skyhawk," a single seat, jet attack aircraft.

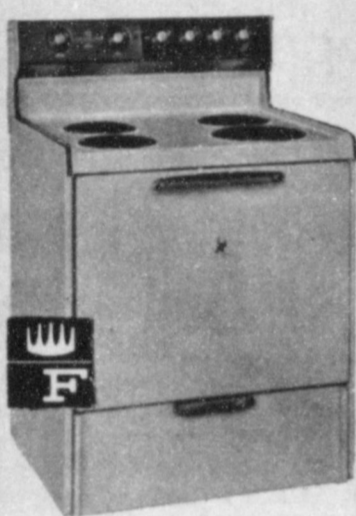

## Insects Like Warm Winter Places Too, Control Viewed

Everyone enjoys a good fire and a full stomach on days when the wind is brisk and ponds sport icy coats. And insects are no exception, according to County Agent J. K. Adams. Many insects are common indoors in the winter months simply because they're looking for warmth and food, adds Adams, and this causes problems for the homeowner.

In this winter parade, homeowners can expect to see cockroaches, silverfish, crickets, boxelder bugs, elm leaf beetles, spiders, wasps, moths, and many other shelter-seekers. As

the nights become cooler, homeowners in Bailey county can expect the parade to begin.

An insecticide "barrier" around the foundation is an excellent means of keeping these invaders out, Adams suggests. Dieldrin or chlordane applied to the outside foundation, around porches, steps and patios give effective results.

Adams points out that spraying is the best method of applying the barrier around the house. Treat the outside walls and foundation from sill to soil and about five to six inches of the soil surface next to the foundation. Give particular attention to cracks, crevices and entry places into the house. For treating window sills and thresholds, a paint brush makes a good applicator, Adams says.

A two percent chlordane solution is recommended for outside application. This can be prepared by mixing one pint of 45 percent chlordane in three gallons of water. A 0.5 percent dieldrin spray works equally well. By mixing seven-and-one-half tablespoons of 18 percent dieldrin in each gallon of water, you get the 0.5 percent dieldrin spray.

Anyone with questions concerning household insect control is invited to pick up a copy of the Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects. It is available at the County Extension office.

## Abernathy Farmer Named Member of Europe Tour

Elbert Harp, an Abernathy farmer and President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, was named this week by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to be a member of a feed grain export promotion team to Europe.

The seven-man group made up of USDA officials, corn and sorghum producers, and grain trade representatives will be abroad from October 14 through November 5.

In naming the team, Secretary Freeman said that he wanted this "blue ribbon" group of American farm leaders to travel throughout Europe calling attention to the supply quality and availability of U. S. feed grains which had lost a quarter of a million bushels of the previous U. S. market to other producing areas this past year.

This export market loss has been credited, along with bumper U. S. crops this year, with the current low market prices for corn and sorghum. It is hoped that the efforts of this team will reverse this price trend.

Countries to be visited are the United Kingdom, France, Belgium, West Germany and Italy. It is expected that the U. S. group will visit the Ministries of Agriculture in the various countries and discuss duty and tariff situations as well as call on feed users, livestock producers, and other European grain trade individuals. Members of the team in addition to Harp include: Francis Kutish and Don Novotny of USDA in Washington; Clarence Palmy of the U. S. Feed Grain Council in Wash-

ington; Sam Sabin, Vice President of Continental Grain Company; John Heline of Iowa and Don Wilson of Indiana, both corn producers.

Harp was a founding member of GSPA in 1956 and has served in an officer capacity since 1957. He is a Business and Economics graduate of Texas Technological College, a trustee of the High Plains Research Foundation, and has previously been assigned by USDA to evaluate feed grain market potentials in Latin America.
