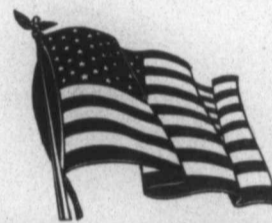

Bulldogs welcome home exes in a big way, with 63-18 win

The Tahoka Bulldogs found themselves again on the winning side of the scoreboard as they faced a very solid Roosevelt team last Friday night at Kelly Field, in front of a Tahoka Homecoming crowd.

The Bulldogs got on the board early with a big run by junior Malik Hamilton to start the scoring on the home side. The Bulldogs didn't stop there as they closed out the game with a final score of 63-18 over Roosevelt's Eagles.

"I was super proud of how the kids handled the adversity and the distractions that came with last week," said Head Coach Stephen Overstreet. "With the many things that go on with it being Homecoming then the weather turning out to be wet I was very impressed with how our kids handled that. I felt like we showed a lot of maturity in staying focused on what was the most important thing about last week and that was coming away with a victory against Roosevelt."

Hamilton scored four touchdowns for the night, and other TDs

were scored by Braden Stone, Soul Moore, Alexander Herevia and Major Due, for a total of 8 touchdowns in the win.

"We have really narrowed our focus on attacking and getting better each week. We obviously have a goal in mind, but in order to achieve any goal you have set down the road, you must first take positive steps in getting there. I felt like we took another huge step on the offensive side of the ball as we had 512 yards rushing on the night," said Overstreet.

"We really have a stable of guys in the backfield that can touch the ball and make us very multiple. We have two guys - in Malik Hamilton and Soul Moore - that we feel can really make it a long night on defenses. They are two very physical backs and have somewhat of the same running style, but out of two different body types. Malik is a small package that makes big things happen, and Soul is a guy that is much bigger but still brings

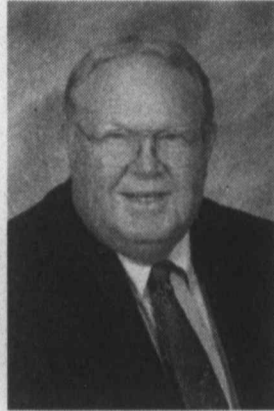

City honors Lenda Wood with "Be Like Lenda Month"

Tahoka Mayor John Baker made a surprise presentation during Saturday's Harvest Festival in Tahoka, honoring a hard-working local woman who volunteers daily to help keep the city of Tahoka clean from weeds. Hardly a days go by that Lenda Wood can't be seen somewhere in the downtown area of Tahoka, with her hoe and her trusty sidekick, Rascal the dog, attacking weeds on sidewalks, vacant lots, the Tahoka Pioneer Museum area, and parks.

The Mayor issued a Proclamation designating the month of October 2018 as "Be Like Lenda Month" and named her as honorary chairman of a month-long cleanup

campaign for the city. More information on the clean-up campaign will be printed at a later date, but the Mayor wanted to present an appreciation plaque to Mrs. Wood in front of the crowd at the Harvest Festival.

The proclamation reads, "Whereas, Lenda Wood is a person who has selflessly given of her time, effort and money to make sure our community is beautiful through hours of sweat and toil, and has without want to recognition beautified our City for all to enjoy; and, the job of keeping Tahoka beautiful is not only to be carried upon her shoulders, I as Mayor of the City of Tahoka, declare the month of October 2018 "Be Like Lenda Month" and October shall be a city-wide cleanup month."

Mrs. Wood, 86, told the mayor she wasn't doing the cleanup for any recognition, but because she enjoyed doing it. Commissioners approve final plat for Buffalo Wallow subdivision

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning at the Lynn County Judge's Office, approving a final plat for the Buffalo Wallow subdivision in northern Lynn County. The new subdivision will be south of New Home and will include 53 2.5-acre lots.

Commissioners also approved a property tax abatement agreement with Sage Draw Wind, LLC, for a 300-megawatt wind energy project that will be located east of the Wilson area. Most of the 120-turbine project will be in Lynn County, but a portion (about 30 turbines) will be located in Garza County, according to information presented by Eric Barnett with Lincoln Clean Energy, who addressed the court.

"Our goal is to get the abatement done, and all the

tax work and title work, where we can close out the financial aspects by February. The construction will probably start in March of 2019," Barnett said. "Ideally we would like to get this project online in 2019, but it looks like it may be 2020 before that happens," he added. The project will start about 4 miles east of Tahoka Lake, giving a buffer area near the lake for wildlife.

In other business, commissioners unanimously approved a 77-cent property tax, which is an 8-cent decrease from the current 85-cent tax rate.

An order was approved setting the county auditor's salary at \$21,091 for the 2018-19 fiscal year, and commissioners approved an order adopting rules of Lynn County for on-site sewage facilities. A motion was also approved to

allow Pct. 3 commissioner Don Blair to seek bids for the purchase a motor grader for his precinct.

Wendy Scott, Texas Agri-Life Extension Agent for Lynn County, presented her Extension Impact report, and told commissioners that there are 84 youth enrolled in Lynn County 4-H, 25 of whom are new to the program, and 52 4-H'ers have signed up for an upcoming Food Challenge event.

Budget amendments and monthly bills were approved, and the meeting adjourned after one hour, at 10 a.m.

County Judge Braddock led the session, with all four commissioners present including Blair, Larry Durham, John Hawthorne and Matt Woodley, as well as other elected county officials and guests.

Two arrested on Grand Jury Indictments handed down in 106th District Court

Two persons have been arrested on Grand Jury Indictments during the past week, from a Grand Jury held in 106th District Court proceedings in Tahoka on Aug. 28. Tommy Moreno Garcez, 47, of Tahoka, was arrested on Grand Jury Indictment for Sex Abuse of a Child Continuous Victim under 14, and Ulises Alejandro Ortiz, 19, of Hobbs, NM was arrested on Grand Jury Indictment for Prohibited Substance or Item in a Correctional Facility. Both were taken to Lynn County Jail.

In call sheet reports at the Lynn County Sheriff's Office for last week were one report of criminal mischief and a

theft report. At 2 p.m. Sept. 4, Starr Knox reported that someone had driven through a fence on property located six miles south of Tahoka on US 87, causing damage to the fence. Keith Sander reported a theft at 10 a.m. Sept. 7, advising officers that someone had broken into his farm hand's garage located a half mile north of CR2 on County Road Y, but the report did not list missing items.

The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) will hold their annual farm tour on Wednesday, Sept. 19 in the O'Donnell portion of the county. Registration begins at 8 a.m. at Woolam Gin in O'Donnell with the tour kicking off at 8:30 a.m.

The purpose of the farm tour is to look at newer practices and technologies, listen to discussion about crop disease/ issues and strategies to overcome them, and discuss general agriculture issues facing agriculture in Lynn County.

Speakers for this year's farm tour will include:

- Samuel Harryman, wildlife biologist with Texas Parks and Lynn County Game Warden Shannon Chambliss, who will present information about TPWD programs and give information and field questions about upcoming hunting seasons in Lynn County.
- Terry Wheeler with Texas Agrilife will discuss cotton wilt, nematodes, disease and pests and strategies to overcome them.
- Tommy Doederlein with Texas Agrilife will discuss his soil sampling program and will also offer CEUs to those farm tour attendees that complete the farm tour.

Door prizes from local

donors will be given out during the farm tour and a plant ID contest will be conducted at the end of the farm tour with awards given to the top scoring participants.

After the completion of the tour, buses will return to Woolam Gin and a hamburger lunch, provided by Lynn-

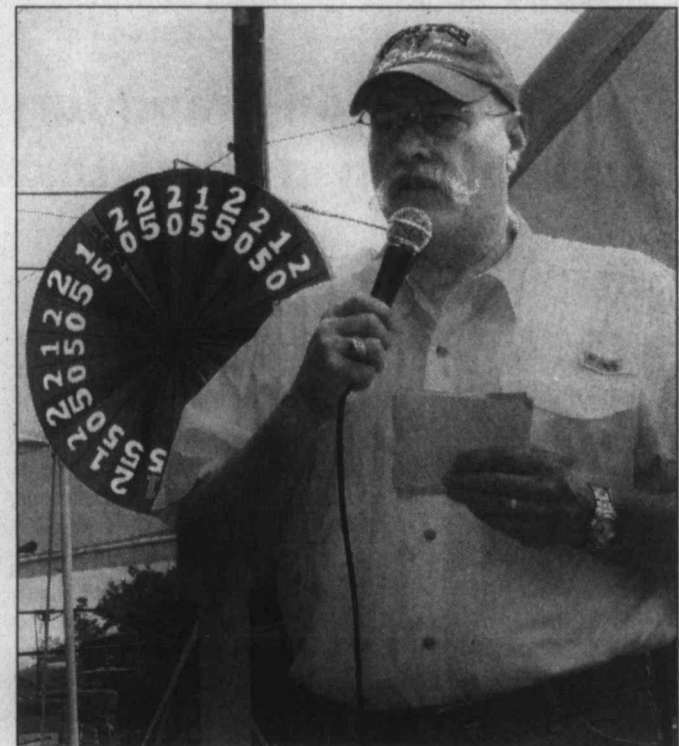

City Council approves 74-cent tax rate

Tahoka City Council met in regular session Monday night, conducting a public hearing on a proposed Yard Parking Ordinance and considering other agenda items, including approval of the proposed property tax rate. Council members approved keeping the property tax rate at the current rate of 74-cents (\$0.747030) per \$100 of property value, for the 2018 year. The budget for 2018-19 was also approved.

Four citizens attended the 5:30 hearing on the Yard Parking Ordinance, asking questions about the details in the ordinance. The ordinance was listed on the agenda for consideration for approval, but the council tabled action on the issue due to some missing language regarding exemptions for agricultural items, which had been intended to be included in the final draft of the ordinance. The wording will be added by the city's attorneys and brought back to the next meeting for final approval. Also tabled, for missing wording, was action to approve another ordinance regarding Mobile Food Vendors within the city. Both ordinances are expected to be corrected and presented for final approval at the next meeting of the council.

The council approved a social media policy for city employees. Action was tabled on two other agenda items, one for closing and abandoning a portion of Avenue D between South 5th Street and South 6th Street, and one for installing stop signs at Avenue H and Harper Street requiring east-west traffic to stop.

The council requested Tahoka Police Dept. conduct a traffic survey at that intersection before approving the signs.

City officials approved a resolution approving a negotiated settlement between the Steering Committee of Cities served by Atmos Energy and requiring the company's 2018 Rate Review mechanism filings as recommended by the committee. The council selected Civil 360 Engineering for the city's 2019-2020 Texas CDBG funding cycle.

Mayor John Baker led the meeting with all council members present including Johnny Rosas, Ronny Jolly, Shiloh Braddock, Ryan Curry and Ray Box, with City Administrator Jerry Webster and other city officials also present.

Golf Tourney, burgers & fries fundraiser to benefit Tahoka VFD

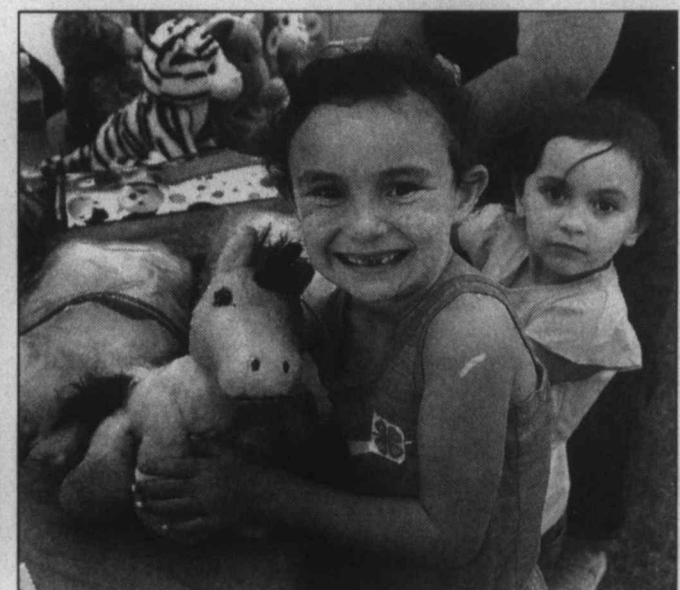

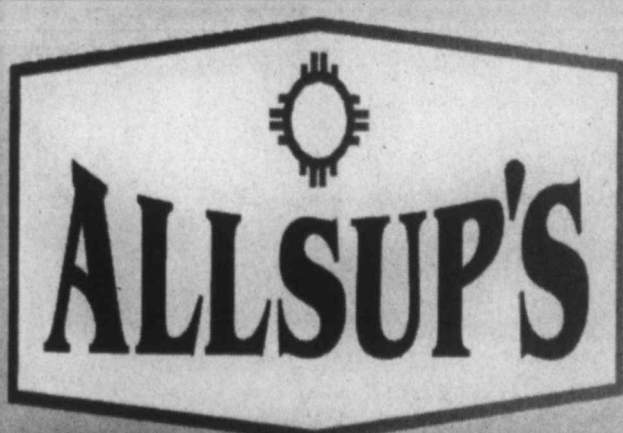

the power and speed aspect to that position. Our fullbacks are really doing a great job of blocking for them, but the five offensive linemen up front have stepped up in a big way. Nicodemus Ayala, Bryson Resendez, Cameron Tekell, Manuel Soto, and Christian Reyna have really been the rubber on the road.

"Our backs have seen running lanes and holes that are very impressive. When you put your hand in the grass and the skill guys behind you can rack up those kind of numbers its a true testament to your mentality of being hard nosed and physical. We are a run first team and these guys make our job so easy when they embrace that role and allow us to control the tempo of games. Braden Stone manages this offense in a phenomenal way. We don't reinvent the wheel but we do have a very detailed offensive call to be relayed in the huddle. Braden is a guy that understands what we are trying to do. He is a game manager and always makes sure

we are in the right formation and helps these guys understand what we are trying to do.

"With our offense being so dominant our defense has been able to really play aggressive and wide open. When you find yourself with a cushion on the board because your offense is doing so well, it makes you play better on defense. Knowing that you can bend a little bit just helps you from the mental side of the game. Our defense has stepped up and also got on the scoreboard the last two weeks. When you are taking the ball away and flying around the field and able to score on defense the same thing goes back onto the offense, the pressure is off and they can just play. If we can continue to play well on both offense and defense and if our special teams continue to improve we could have a really special season," said Coach Overstreet.

The Bulldogs will host Brownfield this Friday night, with kickoff at 7:30.

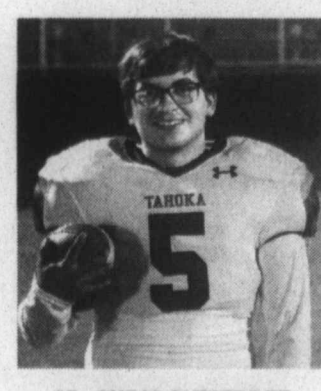

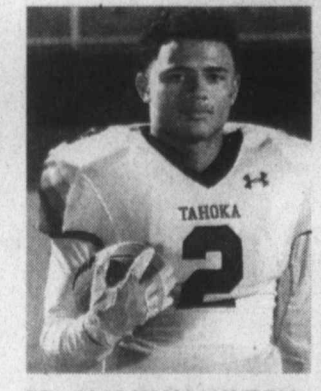

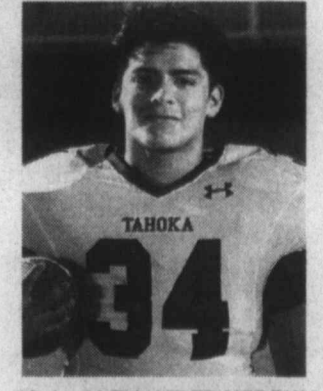
