Bigger Market Seen For Peanut Crop

New York, Nov. 7.—New markets for Texas peanut crop, estimated at 398,000,000 pounds this year, are forecast with an announcement from James A. Stewart, vice president in charge of American Can Company's research and development division, that new canned peanut products are being tested.

Mr. Stewart said that his company's research department has canned experimentally peanut scrapple, peanut scotch, baked peanuts and soy beans in tomato sauce, peanut soup and chocolate pudding with peanuts. He added that results of this experimental canning indicate these products can be commercially packaged.

The high nutritive value of peanuts, one of the best sources of vitamin B1, together with the nut's widely popular flavor, should create an excellent market for such items, the can company official continued. As an indication of the importance of peanuts in the diet of the American soldier, he said that more than 62,000,000 cans of the nuts were supplied the government during the first six months of 1945. During the war the military forces used 100,000,000 cans of peanuts annually.

The can company is continuing its research on canning the peanut in various forms, he said further.

Cigarette Tax Stamp Sales Show Increase

With Haskell Countians doing their share, cigarette smoking continued on the increase, in spite of the war being over, it was disclosed from Austin when State Treasurer Jesse James reported tax stamp sales of \$1,476,659 in October, an increase of \$448,581 over the same month last year, and \$67,302 above last September.

Total stamp sales for October were \$2,317,201 with a net increase of \$481,599 over October, 1944.

Liquor contributed \$1,005,023 in October, up \$11,600 over the preceding October, while beer contributed \$295,538 with increase of \$22,882. Wine paid \$39,828, a decline of \$1,463 from last year.

Will Test Milk Cows For Bangs' Disease

Farmers or anyone wanting their cows tested for Bangs' Disease should contact the County Agent, F. W. Martin, as plans have been made to have a veterinarian in the county to test for this disease.

Dr. J. B. Reneau, Jr., will do the testing. He is a graduate of the Vet school of Texas A. & M. College, and has had several years of veterinary work and has just been released from the Army.

Bangs' disease in milk cattle causes Undulant Fever in humans, and is spreading in Texas, according to latest reports.

The testing in Haskell County will be done Nov. 15 and anyone desiring to have their cattle tested should call at the County Agent's office and leave their name.

'46-'47 Support Price On Hogs Announced

A 1946 spring pig goal of 52,000,000 head and an average support price for good to choice butcher hogs of \$12 per hundred pounds (Chicago basis) has been announced by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Effective dates of the support price program are October 1, 1946 to September 30, 1947, according to C. B. Hodges of Texas Production and Marketing Administration. Seasonal variations are being applied for the first time to hog prices, meaning the \$12 average Chicago price will vary according to normal seasonal changes. This price ranges from \$10.75 in December, 1946 to \$13.25 in September, 1947, Hodges said.

The present support price of \$13 per hundred, Chicago, with no seasonal variation, was announced May 21, 1945, to be effective until September 1, 1946 and now is extended to September 30, 1946, he continued.

Next year's average support price of \$12 at Chicago will reflect at least 90 percent of parity to farmers as provided by the Stagall amendment.

In arriving at the new support price, the average difference between U. S. average farm prices for all hogs and average Chicago market prices for barrow and gilt butcher hogs have been added to present 90 percent of parity price, the addition now including allowance for sows. Heretofore, sows have been reflected in farm prices but not in Chicago prices, Hodges explained. Parity for hogs September 15 was \$12.60 and 90 percent of parity for the same date was \$11.34.

Sgt. Gustave Pueschel Returning to States

Pearl Harbor, T. H.—Sgt. Gustave W. Pueschel of Haskell, Tex., is on his way home. He is one of more than 3,500 high-point Army, Navy and Marine Corps veterans whom the "Magic Carpet" is bringing back to the states aboard the USS Saratoga.

The USS Saratoga—one of more than 200 carriers, escort carriers and attack transports in the Navy's famed "Magic Carpet" fleet—left Pearl Harbor Friday, October 26, and was scheduled to arrive in San Francisco Wednesday, October 31.

Passengers will go directly to the Separation Centers nearest their homes to complete the formalities of obtaining their discharges before returning to civilian life.

The Army Answers Your War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependent will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. While my brother has been in the service, a lot of taxes have accumulated on his farm. After he is discharged, will he be able to borrow money under the GI Bill of Rights to pay the back taxes?

A. Yes. Under the GI Bill of Rights, the Government will guarantee 50 per cent of a farm loan or home loan which your brother can use to pay accumulated taxes on his farm.

Q. My husband is an Army officer. I have been trying to run his business for him, but I am ill and no longer able to do so. I am afraid the business may go to ruin if there any way he could be released from the service now, before he becomes surplus or eligible for release under the point system?

A. Military personnel may be released from the service if an undue hardship of a permanent nature exists for him or his family, and his release is necessary to alleviate the condition.

Q. I have heard that it is possible to enlist in the Regular Army for less than three years. Is that true?

A. Yes. A man may enlist for 18 months, two years or three years.

Q. My son is at college under the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program. With the way the Army is cutting down a lot of its activities, will this program continue?

A. Trainees now enrolled in the Army Specialized Training Program will complete their courses.

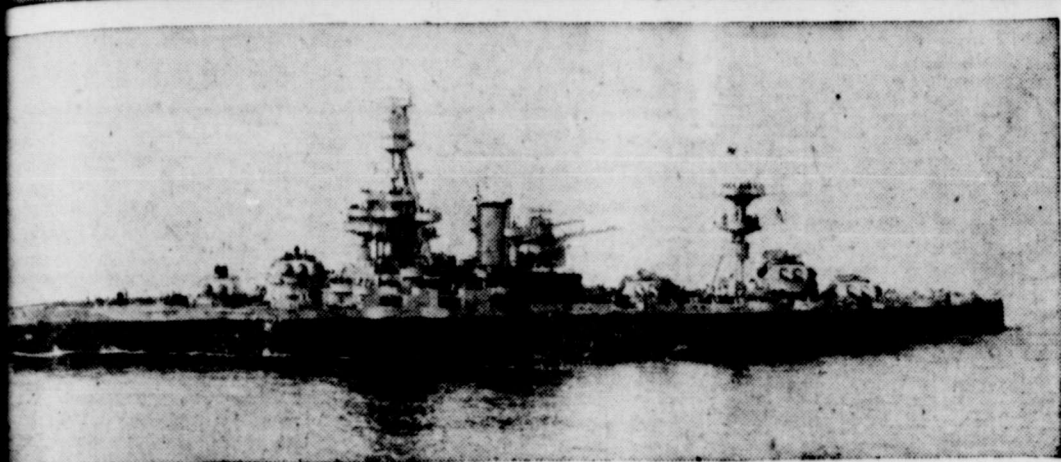

US Marine Corps 170 Years Old Saturday

Collection of Used Fats Continues

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 6. (A&MC)—Specifications for a successful farm-size grain drier, with a per-hour capacity of 2,000 pounds of dry grain, have been released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It can be used satisfactorily with grain sorghum, oats, wheat, and barley, and with minor changes for drying clover and grass seed, and possibly peanuts.

The drier can be installed for approximately \$500. Mechanical elevating equipment for loading and unloading will cost an additional \$75 to \$200, depending upon the type used. Power and fuel costs in drying combined grain sorghum from 20 percent to 13 percent moisture content were found to be about 30 cents per ton.

Progress Report No. 968, just released by the Station, entitled "Building and Operating a Farm Grain Drier", describes a unit designed and built by agricultural engineers of the Station's Division of Agricultural Engineering and of the main College's Agricultural Engineering Department. It includes seven illustrations showing the grain drier and its operation.

The experimental unit was constructed from standard dimension lumber, plywood, screen wire, hardware cloth, and other materials easily available in each farming community.

Since the drier is operated only a few weeks during the year, the motor will be available for other power uses. Mounted on skids or a wheel truck, it makes a convenient portable unit which may be moved about the farm whenever it is needed.

Full description and discussion are given in the progress report to the drying section, the fan, the controls, construction, operation, heating equipment, motor, safety loading and unloading, and the bill of materials.

"Our supply of industrial fats and oils still is not sufficient to manufacture all the peacetime items consumers need and could use now," he explained, "and the difference must be made up with used kitchen fats until imports are resumed." The combined efforts of all housewives is needed to accomplish this all-important peacetime job, he continued.

Almost everything essential to everyday living requires industrial fats and oils in one way or another, including cutting oils for machined items and wire drawing for Soaps, a by-product of fats and oils, are needed for washing textiles at some stage in their manufacture, Munro said.

Rights From Washington . . .

George Mahon says congress has given war priority rights in the form of surplus government property. But the veteran has having much luck in acting a chance to buy this property. Some time ago with other interested members of congress in urging the Surplus Property Board make available to veterans who have sought to buy surplus property. On October 15, a new provision was put into operation which allows a veteran who desires to buy surplus property makes application to the nearest district office of the Smaller War Plants Corporation for the items he wishes. The SWPC offices which are located in the Mercantile Bank Building, Dallas; The Caples Building, El Paso; and the Key Building, Oklahoma City. The SWPC grants a priority certificate to a veteran and seeks to help him buy surplus property for him. On November 5, surplus property in Texas is actually disposed of by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Vets Need Not Pay Poll Tax, Says Ruling

Discharged service men and women who have left the armed services since May 5 can vote in next summer's primary and the general election Nov. 5, 1946, without payment of the poll tax.

This was the opinion of the attorney general's office, announced several days ago.

The recently adopted constitutional amendment, the opinion pointed out, exempts veterans from the poll tax for 18 months after discharge.

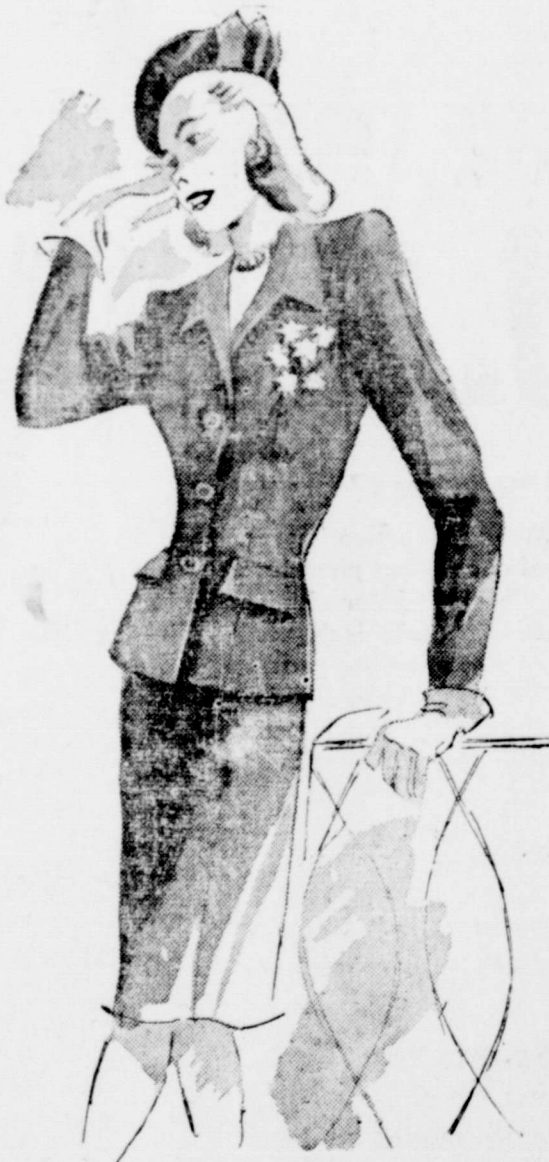

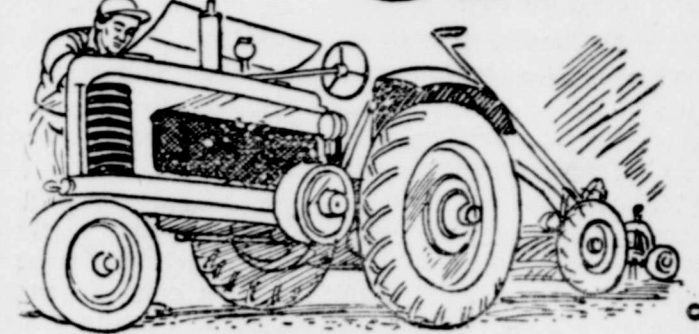

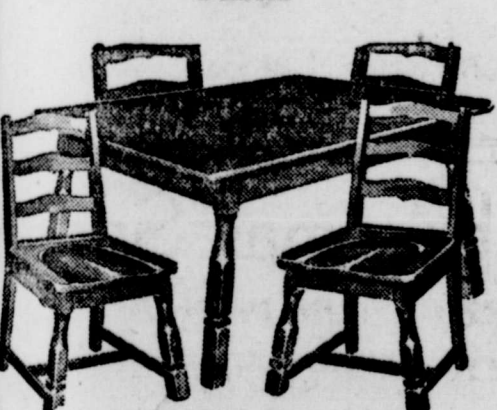

## The Meaning of Armistice—1945

November 11, 1918, was heralded the world over as the end of a war designed to end wars. American participation in that war anticipated by peace loving peoples as an assurance that never again would dictatorships bring wanton destruction to the American lives and materials expended for the mighty conflict. But that was not to be. Less than twenty-five years later millions of young Americans again were sent to the battlefields of war-torn Europe to conclude another war acclaimed as the one destined to end wars.

Peace has come to most peoples of the world—a peace that cost the world the greatest price ever paid for freedom. Hundreds of Haskell County's young men and young women were trained and fought and many of them suffered and died that future generations might enjoy a peace uninterrupted by war-mongers. The youth of Haskell County served around the world, fighting the enemies of democracy on battlefronts more far-flung than were witnessed in any previous conflict. Young Americans have won a great victory over cunning and well-trained warriors.

Every week dozens of Haskell County homes and businesses are welcoming home veterans of World War II. These men and women are coming home to live for the things for which many died. They have learned the hard way that the American way of life is the happiest and the most precious of earthly rights. They are determined to enhance the teaching of truth and freedom that future young Americans need have no fear of death and destruction at the hands of brutal and Godless nations. They are determined to establish homes and businesses that shall promote high Christian ideals and an ever better way of life.

Thus it is that we can evaluate the true meaning of Armistice Day, 1945. We can offer thanks for the peace that is bringing our loved ones home from all over the world. We can offer those returning our best in maintaining and forwarding freedom. We can make the most of the terrible lessons we've learned from four years of turmoil and strife, and dedicate ourselves to the cause of peace on earth and good will toward men.

## Higher Production and Better Business

Many citizens of Haskell were ready a few weeks ago to sell fall trade in this section far shorter than is the case now. An unexpected spurt in cotton production will make the total crop a great deal higher than was indicated just a short time ago, and the additional yield is meaning more income for farmers and a greater trade volume for Haskell merchants.

The average farmer knows just about what he can expect to spend each year on living expenses, and when crops are normal he knows the approximate amount he will be able to save. The factors of production need vary but little to make a big difference in his yearly budget. Most farmers operate on a modest margin and a difference of one-third, for instance, in his crop production is of paramount importance.

As a hypothetical case, let us suppose a farmer must spend 20 percent of his gross income to make his crop and to make a living. If his gross income is three thousand dollars, he shows a profit of six hundred dollars. Most farmers, of course, raise a big percentage of things they must eat and the profit is not required to care for his family for a year. Profit, in this case, means the amount of money that he can do with as he pleases.

In the case considered, the farmer has a gross income of three thousand dollars. Then suppose his crop production had been reduced by one-third, he would have a gross income of two thousand dollars, which would necessitate his going into debt in the amount of four hundred dollars or digging into his savings, rather than having a profit of six hundred dollars. He would then find it advisable for him and his family to postpone buying new clothes and other household articles.

So there is a great difference in whether or not crop production is up to par. There is even a great difference in whether the farmer breaks even or is able to accumulate a certain amount of extra cash. If he only breaks even in a year's farming, he will be prone to buy many things he would buy otherwise.

Farmers in this area seem to be of the opinion that production this year will provide them with a profit, and that belief is being reflected in a healthy business in Haskell. So we have additional proof that this area is one of the better of the state for farm production.

There is no natural immunity against this disease during the first six months of life as there is against measles. It is at this age that whooping cough strikes its hardest blow and over 80% of the deaths occurring in children are under one year of age. The disease is usually transmitted by direct contact with secretions of the mouth or nose, and only a very short exposure is required to contact the infection. Handkerchiefs, drinking cups and toys also may transmit the infection.

"The infection is communicable from the appearance of the first symptoms and is most contagious at this early period when the nature of the infection is unsuspected. The incubation is commonly seven days, fever, running of the nose, cough make their appearance gradually and insidiously. diagnosis is practically unobtainable. When the 'whooping' there is no mistaking the your community keep away from your home and keep your children away from your home. Isolation of all cases for two weeks from the appearance of the characteristic cough should be rigidly enforced.


