



The rest of the nation has tried for years to settle our racial problems for us. Well-meaning social prophets usually advanced the notion that we should accept the Negro as a complete social equal. Those of us in the South know that others cannot understand our feelings toward inter- cant and do everything possible to Wednesday and says everybody is mingling of the races when we see such suggestions. They do not seem to understand that neither of the races want such conditions to exist. The South knows that the twain ean never meet.

But there is no good reason why the Negro race! should be held forever in complete subjugation. There are very few of them who have ever felt the freedom of social action that white people take for granted. Feeling is no respector of persons. Mistreatment penetrates black skin as readily as it does white. And no rational-minded person can deny that Negroes are burdened with discrimina-

So while we in the South know that the two races cannot have social intermingling, it is our duty to recognize the fact that there's no good reason why the Negro should not have a right to vote. As a citizen, he must pay taxes. He must support the laws of the land or suffer punishment accordingly. It is time for Texas and all the South to face the responsibilities that are thrust upon us by the racial problem. Allowing the Negro his natural right to vote is one point forward in settlement of the question.
