Families planning to install nome freezing units will do well to do some advance planning before completing their purchases, advises Louise Newman, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Generally farm families will want larger units than city people because they will have more food to store. A minimum of five to six cubic feet of space per person for each member of the family is recommended. Freezer units of 20 cubic feet of space will cost approximately \$600 according to the present OPA ceiling price. Larger freezers cost less per cubic foot.

Park At Your Peril

On almost any given Saturday afternoon the four streets around the square here are so clogged with traffic that other cars can proceed only at a snail pace, often having to stop while another car in front gets going or while one backs away from the curb.

There is scarcely a driver who often parks his car in the business district who is not delayed quite frequently because of other cars that illegally obstruct his passage. Haskell has had for several years a city ordinance that prohibits double parking along the streets of the city. And a state law provides that traffic shall not block free pas-

sage of traffic along a state highway. On the west side of the square on a recent Saturday afternoon there were twenty automobiles parked illegally. The cars that were parked at the curb could not possibly PREC. NO. 2: have been driven away. Anyone whose car was parked at the curb would have found it impossible to leave hurriedly for a possible emergency. The condition on the west side PREC. No. 3. was repeated on other streets of the city, and it is a condition that may be found any Saturday afternoon or night and, to a less extent, many times during the week.

It has been found that those people who are so inconsiderate of the rights of others by parking illegally, also are so thoughtless as to leave their cars without keys in them in order that they might be moved. The drivers are often bent on getting their shopping done, and the devil take the hindmost. Parking in such a manner certainly does afford a convenience for the driver of the car, but it causes a resulting inconvenience on others who have parked their cars legally.
