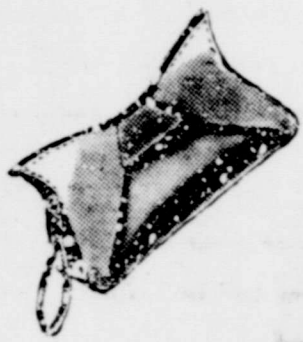

Recreation was sponsored by Mrs. Tony Patterson. The remain-

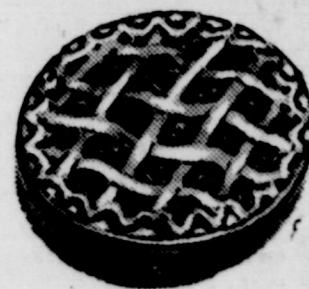
