

That was the attitude not only of the big majority of Americans on the fighting front, but also of our fighting Allies and of the people at home in most of the nations of the world. Indeed, a friend had been lost. He was a personal friend whose conscience and heart was the conscience and heart of millions of people. He had proved his friendship by being a friend through twelve trying years of depression and war.

His genius of leadership and his resolute determination to make life better for the common man of America revitalized the economy of the nation and gave new hope to a people in despair. Born of an aristocratic family, Franklin Roosevelt saw clearly his duty to better the living standards of the majority of the people.
