Sewer, Water Mains Will Be Extended If Plans Realized

At least two major projects are on the agenda for civic improvement here for 1946 and plans going forward now offer encouragement that both will be completed during the year.

Wide extension of sewer and water mains and installation of city mail delivery service have good chances of completion before the year is out. Already streets in the city have been renamed to

The six-inch pipe would be installed in four additional sections of the city, including seven blocks in the northwest part of the city, 21 blocks in the west part, 23 blocks in the south part and 28

blocks in the east part. A profile map being used in the survey will be completed in about two weeks and the plan later will be submitted to the Texas Public Health Department. Sewer, Water Mains Will Be Extended If Plans Realized

At least two major projects are on the agenda for civic improvement here for 1946 and plans going forward now offer encouragement that both will be completed during the year.

Wide extension of water mains and installation of city mail delivery service have good chances of completion before the year is out. Already streets in the city have been renamed to simplify mail delivery

Rogers Gilstrap, superintend of the water works, and G. C. Mc-Kinney, civil engineer of Fort Worth, have been surveying the city to determine where the sewer and water lines will be needed About 31,000 feet of sewer and water lines are included in the project which would bring facilities to practically every part of the eity. The six-inch pipe would be installed in four additional sections of the city, including seven blocks in the northwest part of the city, 21 blocks in the west part, 23 blocks in the south part and 28 blocks in the east part.

A profile map being used in the survey will be completed in about two weeks and the plan later will be submitted to the Texas Public Health Department, After approval is secured, the project might be delayed to some extent until materials could be obtained. 



Quoted below is Department of Agriculture Bulletin No. F0145, dated March 29, 1946. Part 1468.12, Section B.

"RESTRICTIONS ON USE"

(B) "Mixed feed manufacturers; use of grain, grain oducts and grain by-products. (1) No mixed feed manucturer shall, during any calendar month use grain, grain oducts, or grain by-products in a quantity in excess of 80 ercent of all grain, grain products, and grain by-products sed by such manufacturer during the corresponding calenar month of 1945."

Since this directive from the Agriculture Department, have been informed that a recent change allows only 70 er cent of the corresponding calendar month in 1945.

In the face of this we are finding it increasingly diffiult to maintain a standing supply of feedstuffs. However, e are doing all in our power to supply our customers, and hall continue to do so.

During this emergency we earnestly request that feeders operate on as small a reserve as possible, and if necessary voluntarily ration the amount fed to their livestock and poultry until conditions improve.

One of the nation's most popular radio programs is Amos n' Andy, and Shorty the Barber is one of the best characterizations on the program. Somermans, although an idea is wrong, it does no harm. Like the idea that a square jaw is the sign of will power. That winters aren't as severe as they used to be, or that red hair denotes quick

But there are other wrong ideas, which are definitely harmful to public confidence in and understanding of industry. One such idea is the current "guessing" about profits made by large business organizations.

Many people are apt to grossly exaggerate the money made by business. So Opinion Research Corporation (an independent organization) made a survey to learn just what the public thinks about profits. Compare these guesses and yours with the International Harvester profit figures given below.




