





A Program of Civic Improvement

A city that is growing in these times of abnormal economic conditions is not necessarly an exceptional city. On the contrary, a city that is not growing must be regarded as somewhat backward. The influx of rural people into urban areas and mounting numbers of servicemen who have come home has contributed to a general prosperity everywhere. The condition is likely to be continued for some time because of the demand for production that has FOR DISTRICT CLERK: never really developed steam yet.

But the time will come when all the favorable ten- FOR SHERIFF: dencies toward prosperity will not exist. It will be the cities and communities that are looking ahead now that will cash in on a permanent basis. Other areas will be hard hit. For that reason it might be wise for Haskell to examine the local conditions and see what can be done about preparing for the future. Editorially, from time to time, we have mentioned steps which we believe might wisely be taken to safeguard our future.

However, no amount of mentioning such things can accomplish any purpose unless some effort is made to see FOR COMMISSIONER, that the suggestions are accorded proper support. That PREC. NO. 2: support cannot be attended to by any one person. Naturally, most of the support must come from the businessmen of Haskell, and the officials of the city must take the initiative. If we are content to let Haskell get the breaks that come its way, chances are that we will get a few. But why not make a few breaks of our own?

Not every person can see the value of spending money for improvements. And some investments that are made in behalf of a city are not wise. But it is certain that no city can continue to be prosperous and progressive unless it does spend some money. Individual merchants must make improvements from time to time in their places business, and the city must be ready to assume responsibility for advancing a program of civic betterment.





Sidelights From Washington . By George Mahon

We have concluded hearings on the seven corporations which operate in the interest of agriculture. The Commodity Credit Corporation is perhaps the most powerful Government Corporation which deals with agriculture. The CCC operates the price support and loar programs for cotton and grain and numerous other agricultural crops. Congress has guaranteed a support price, or loan, of 92 1-2 percent of parity on cotton for a two-year period following the year in which the official end of of the war is declared. A support price of 90 percent of parity is similarly provided for other basic crops.

Loans and purchases through the years by the CCC on cotton, wheat, corn, peanuts, eggs and other far mproducts run into the billions of dollars, but the CCC has sustained relatively few losses on crop loans and purchases. On cotton the CCC has made a net profi tof \$147,000,000. Cotton farmers will rejoice over the fact that practically all Governmentowned cotton will have been disposed of prior to August 1st. This is particularly gratifying when it recalled that at one time the CCC had on hand over 11,000,000
