# Half of Feed Crop Wasted Every Year

Half of the feed produced in Texas in 1945, on the basis of total food value, was wasted.

That is the contention of G. G. Gibson, dairy specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who points out that most sections of the state have 90 days of plentiful pasture and feed and a nine-months period of getting by the best way they can. In his estimate of lost food value

ing, Gibson includes such potential crops as fence row Johnson Grass, crop residue, and bundle feed which is stacked in the open grain ,of course takes a heavy toll. "There has never been a year when it is so important not only to produce as much feed as possible, but to save every bit that is

produced," Gibson said. He pointed to the silo, especially the trench silo, as the surest and least expensive method of storing

"Some farmers point to high labor costs and labor shortage as the reason why trench silos were not dug and filled in 1945", Gibson added. "I believe that labor cost at its present level is not the limiting factor for food conservation in the face of the nationwide food and feed shortage.



After nearly two centuries of living in a country that FOR COUNTY ATTORNEY: was founded in the name of freedom and liberty, Amerigays have come to be distinguished by their spirit of personal independence as well as their national independence. | COLLECTOR:

We have gone to war to preserve the things that mean most to us, but we have allowed to be developed within our boundaries a condition that is as much of a threat as some of our foreign enemies.

Whatever invectives and epithets we might hurl at FOR DISTRICT CLERK: John L Lewis would be no addition to those with which he has already been branded these many years. We would FOR SHERIFF: be happy to call by any new names within the limits of decency and legality. But America's Public Enemy Number One is too far gone to be fazed by name-calling.

Unhappily, his destruction is not unlawful. He has INSTRUCTION: the power to call his United Mine Workers to strike at any time it meets his fancy. Since he has the power to control the output of coal, he has the power to stop virtually every industry in America, because industrial America is run

John L. Lews proved in wartime that he was not worthy of being trusted with the lives of American fighting men. He used hs perverted greatness to stop war production that cost the lives of those who were doing our fighting. Evidently he is without a conscience. He wants only power and more power.

But whether or not he is worthy of being trusted with PREC. No. 3. the welfare of the nation has nothing to do with the fact that no private individual should have such power at his fingertips.

Why should we risk so much to the whimsy of one man? If John L. Lewis is within the law, then it is time to change the law. If he gets by with his demands this time, what may we expect of him next time?

Let's have a ruling with teeth in it to control actions PRECINCT NO. 1: of a monster like Lewis. And let's do it now. He has shown that the lives of all of us are subject to his decisions. The right of eminent domainallows our government to ap- PREC, NO. 1: propriate to its own use any property that can best be used to the public interest. Then why not some sort of provision that will stop a man who can run the lives of all of us? Maybe the miners have a right to more than they are getting. But neither they nor their henchmen have a right to rur America. We do not believe in government ownership of industry, but government ownership is better than national subjugation. So if necessary, let's have the government seize and keep control of the coal mines. If the miners refuse to work, then let's have some new miners, and let those who are displaced join the unemployed and shift for themselves. Drastic action, but better than have ing John L. Lewis tell us where to get off.





Army Air Forces, will be before our Military Appropriations Committee Monday to ask us to put through an appropriation of one billion two hundred million dollars for the Air Forces for the coming fiscal year. I am going to ask him to expedite the Army program for reserve pilots so that these discharged veterans under a well-suptryised plan may have an opportunity to continue to fly. I would like to see a National Guard Unit in aviation established in

The National Guard will have a bigger and better program in the future than it has ever had in the past. The Guard was a great factor in the victory which we won in the war and it will represent a large reserve force for national defense in the future.

The Reserve Officer Training Corps in the schools is due for expansion. Texas Tech is slated for a bigger ROTC program than ever before, which will include, if desired, when appropriate plans are completed an ROTC unit in avia-

The Military Appropriation Bill s scheduled to pass the House in June. Indications are now that the bill, for the first time in years will include no money for the purchase of horses and mules. The General Staff of the Army has decided to abandon the Horse Cav-

The Army is asking for forage for the 2000 horses and 1347 mules which it still has on hand in the Continental U.S. The prize horses of the Army now are the horses that were captured in Germany and brought to the United States last October. These 152 animals are valued at more than one million dollars, and the Army is beseiged with offers of purchase.

We approved in the House of Representatives this week a \$75,-000 fund to be used in the investigation of un-American activities by one of the Committees of the House. This is the committee of the House, supported by many patriotic organizations, which investigates and gives publicity to the un-American activities of individuals and groups within our Country. The measure was bitterly contested, but the final vote was 240 for and 81 against.
