

Advises Methods To Help Control Polio

Austin, Texas.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which s now occurring in certain sections

Until recently it was generally from the respiratory tract. It is ovements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must be eliminated at once Every effort should be made to institut eapproved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should, under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be

closed mmediately. Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinefcted with the same scrupulous care as in typhod fever or bacillary dysenttery.

And The Doodle-Bug Ran

Just how essential to the American way of living are train schedules was brought home in a hurry last week when trainmen all over the country took a holiday. Haskell does not depend as heavily on train service as do most American cities, but we learned in a few hours just how important our "doodle-bug" is. Mail and freight were held up, produce and livestock could not be moved as we had become accustomed to, and generally speaking suspension of service on the Wichita Valley line had Haskellites in a dither.

Local trainmen were not very enthusiastic about the strike. And from reports coming in from all over the nation President Truman had the thing about right when he said two money and power loving executives of railroad work ers' unions were rebelling against the wishes of trainmen and the government. Those two men led the railroad brotherhoods in a strike which paralyzed the nation as she has not been heretofore tied. President Truman and the trainmen themselves soon realized the selfish interests of those two men, and railroad service was restored

Acts of Congress pointed at curbing labor union power were proven almost worthless. A truly representative expression of the brotherhoods was never obtained. The spirit of unionism was not seen in the strike. Selfishness and greed of a few hurt the masses. 

Insects Pose Threat To Cotton Crop

(By F. W. MARTIN, County

One thing that is sure to affect the amount of cotton produced in Haskell County in 1946 is the amount of insect damage. According to figures recently released from the United States Depart ment of Agriculture, cotton farmers in Texas lose one bale out of seven produced. This loss amounts to about \$51,000,000 per year in

In the fall of 1945 the boll weevil damage amounted to 29 per cent in the area surrounding Haskell County. This means that 29 cotton squares were damaged out of each 100 examined. Just what the average damage from boll weevils in the county is, is not known, bue we do have records f fields that were heavily infest-

squares are knocked off the cotton and then start trying to poison you have about lost the crop.

It is recommended that as soon as the squares start forming the best plan would be to dust, using about 1-3 calcium arsenate and 2-3 sulphur at the rate of 12 to 15 pounds per acre. This will cost about 60c per acre at present prices for poison. Controls both boll weevil and flea hopper. After the first dusting if you make a count by going diagonally across the field pulling off 100 squares, some from bottom and some from the top, examine these squares and if more than 10 out of the 100 are punctured it is time to dust again. This procedure can be fol-

lowed until a crop is set. If you can get 21 days free from insects you will have all the squares on the plant that can ma-

Sodium Chlorate Is Effective In Control Of Johnson Grass

JUST HUMANS

(By F. W. MARTIN, County Agent.)

Farmers interested in the control or eradication of small areas of Johnson Grass on their farms can successfully accomplish this by properly applying sodium chlorate to the infested areas.

Sodium Chlorate applied to the soil either as a dry salt or in solution causes temporary sterilization of the soil and kills the plants. It is soluble in water and after each rain will penetrate deeper into the soil, burning and gradually killing the roots of Johnson Grass. It will usually leach completely out of the soil in 12 to 18 months after application, and the soil will then grow desirable crops.

ium chlorate should be applied at the rate of 3 pounds per square rod. It may be mixed with equal parts of soil or sand to get better distribution and spread on the ground where Johnson Grass is growing. Rains will dissolve the weed killer and leach it into the soil and kill the roots. Quicker results may usually be obtained by dissolving sodium chlorate in water at the rate of one pound per gallon and then spraying or pouring this solution on the soil around the base of plants to wet the soil to a depth of at least one inch. Best results have been obtained when the chemical is applied directly to the soil rather than by spraying it on the leaves and

stems of the plant. The areas treated should not be plowed or disturbed until a heavy, soaking rain has occurred and all the roots have been completely killed by soil sterilization. On sandy, porous soils quicker kills may be expected than on heavy clay soils.

When sodium chlorate is mixed with water the operator should take precaution not to get his clothes wet because, when it dries, it unites with cotton or other organic matter to form an easily inflammable product. Smoking should not be tolerated when using sodium chlorate and all instructions on the container should be carefully observed. It is safer to apply sodium chlorate in dry form and it can be applied much faster and without additional cost to the operator for spraying equipment.

Where a mixture of sodium chlorate and calcium chlorate is used, 4 pounds should be used per square rod to get the same results as 3 pounds of sodium chlor-The above mixture is sold under the trade name of Atlascide and seems to be more plentiful at the present time than sodium


