Curtis E. Burke, War Veteran, Buried Here Saturday

Curtis E. Burke, 36, World War II veteran and the son of Mrs. Ed Howard of Weintert, died in Wichita Falls general hospital Friday, May 31 after a brief illness.

Funeral service for the veteran was held at the Methodist Church in Weintert Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock, with Rev. Alby Cockerell of Aspermont conducting, assisted by Rev. Lennel Hester of Weintert. Interment was in Willow Cemetery, Haskell, with arrangements in charge of Holden Funeral Home. Military honors were conferred by a unit of the Stamford State Guard, Capt. Roy Duke commanding, at the church and graveside. Pallbearers were Clay Griffith, Bruce Edwards, Jack Bartlett, Alva Ray Medley, Dub Campbell, James Anderson, Dewayne Vaughn and Eugene Gary.

Born Sept. 1, 1909, at Brownwood, Texas, Mr. Burke was inducted in the Army May 12, 1942, at Camp Wolters, Texas, and later served 22 months in the Aleutian Islands with the Army Air Forces. He was discharged November 4, 1945, at Sheppard Field, Texas with the rank of Staff Sergeant.

Mr. Burke is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ed Howard of Weintert; four brothers, C. P. Burke of Houston; Max A. Burke, Ft. Worth; J. B. Burke of Holliday; Eugene R. Burke of Alice, Texas; and a sister, Mrs. Sam Bird, Jr., of Llano, Tex.

Schedule Changes Announced By Wichita Valley

Important changes in passenger train schedules, affording faster and better passenger train service over the Burlington lines between Texas and Colorado to become effective Sunday June 9th were announced today by H. Dobbins, Haskell agent for the railway.

The departure times of several trains will be advanced in the speeding up of schedules, and travelers are cautioned to inquire about these changes to avoid missing a train.

The West Texan, which formerly made a morning trip from Dallas and Fort Worth to Wichita Falls, will leave Dallas in the evening at 9:15 instead of 7:19 to provide a supporting service as far as Wichita Falls for the evening Gulf Coast Special from Dallas and Fort Worth to Colorado. Earlier arrivals will be made in Amarillo and Denver and at intermediate points.

An equalization of the evening departures from Dallas and Fort Worth for the Texas Panhandle and Colorado has been effected, providing a 9:15 P. M. schedule out of Dallas and a 9:25 P. M. schedule out of Fort Worth with an arrival in Amarillo for overnight Pullman passengers the following morning at 8:40 A. M., earlier than heretofore. This train will reach Denver at 10 P. M. the following evening after departure from North Texas, earlier than the present time.

The southward Gulf Coast Special will leave Denver at 7 P. M., the same as presently, but its arrival in Amarillo will be at 10:05 A. M. the following morning, Fort Worth at 7:50 A. M. and Dallas at 9:10 P. M., a full hour sooner than these cities now are reached.

Veterans School To Extend Facilities Over County

With the aim of making facilities of the Haskell County Vocational School available to veterans in every community of the county, J. Weldon Young, coordinator of the school announced this week that a class in Business Administration had been started in Rule with a number of veterans enrolling for the course. Plans are underway for the addition of courses in agriculture mechanics and general education in the Rule branch of the county school, Young said.

Similar classes to provide foundation training for veterans will be set up in other communities of the county where a sufficient number of enrollees apply for the training. Under this plan of decentralization it is believed that benefits of the training program can be carried to a larger number of veterans by making possible for them to receive training in their local communities. Young explained, instead of requiring them to come to a central school.

At the present time, more than 100 veterans are enrolled in the various classes being taught, Young said Tuesday, and two additional instructors have been employed on a part time basis for the summer months. They are J. Cleo Scott, who conducts a class in Engineering, and J. B. Lawson in charge of a class in Math.

W. R. Marrs of the University of Texas and member of the State Board of Vocational Education, is teaching a class in Business Problems in Haskell and Rule as a part of the program.

In addition to the instruction phase of the school, a recreation and athletic program is being planned for the summer months, Young said this week, which will include competition in sports between teams and groups from several counties in which the Veteran's Administration has established training schools.

Both Young and Mr. Marrs were high in their praise for the cooperation of local businessmen which they declare has made the Haskell school one of the most successful in the state.

New Social Security Booklet Available

Although most workers know that their social security tax deductions are building up a retirement fund for them, many do not realize that they also have some very valuable family insurance protection under the old age and survivors insurance program.

This system, according to a statement made today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Social Security Board office in Abilene, provides monthly payments to several classes of dependent survivors. These include minor children up to the age of 18, the young widow with these children in her care, the widow at age 61, and - under certain conditions - the dependent at age 65. In many families, particularly in those homes where the children are small, the insurance protection under social security is equal to a \$10,000 or \$11,000 policy.

The Social Security Board now has available a new booklet which describes the survivors insurance features of the plan, as well as the retirement provisions.

Hail and Rain Strike In Area Thursday

Heaviest rainfall received in this section in several months blanketed a wide area of Haskell County last Thursday afternoon and night, accompanied by hail in some parts of the county which caused considerable disturbance and a severe electrical disturbance resulted in damage to at least one Haskell residence.

According to reports, Haskell was on the eastern fringe of the heavy downpour. Here, precipitation was gauged at 7.1 inch by Mrs. F. T. Sanders, Government observer. In the area north and west of Haskell Sam Herren Jr., who has a Government weather gauge, measured 3.20 inches of rain and hail. The driving rain and hail resulted in widespread damage to young cotton and feed, and Herren estimated that at least 5,000 acres would have to be replanted in his section. In the country north of Rule, one farmer, E. H. Kennedy said that a big orchard on his place had been completely stripped of a good peach crop, and that the hailstorm and rain was the worst he had seen in this section.

J. C. Holt, Jr., farmer living northwest of town, said Friday that the rain and hail had "combined" his grain crop in addition to leveling acreage planted to corn, maize and cotton which was up to a good stand. With his place approximately in the middle of the downpour, Holt estimated rainfall at four to five inches and said "It hailed for an hour." Other farmers in that section reported similar damage to crops.

North of Haskell the heavy downpour was welcomed, especially at Weintert, where the municipal water supply had been exhausted for months. Residents there have been depending on water shipped from Haskell to supply their domestic needs. Thursday's rain, however, filled the Weintert Lake, and after a few days' settling, the water will be ample to meet demands for some time.

Gusts of wind which accompanied the hard rain toppled the chimney of the new home of Dr. and Mrs. T. W. Williams on the north outskirts of town, and roof and one room of the residence was damaged.

In east Haskell, lightning struck the home of Mr. and Mrs. White and caused some damage. The couple, their son and grandchild were in the house at the time, and all suffered shock from the bolt, but quickly recovered. Fire started by the lightning stroke resulted in small damage to one room of the house, but was extinguished by Mr. White.

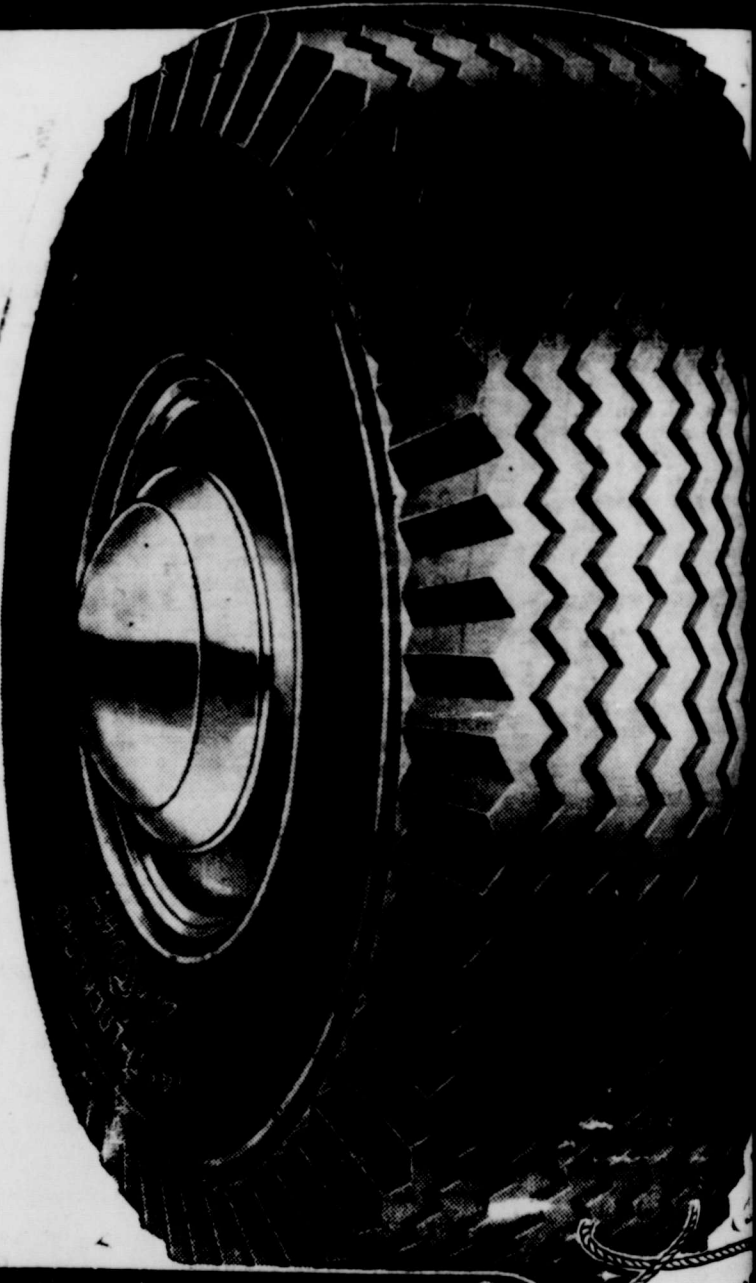

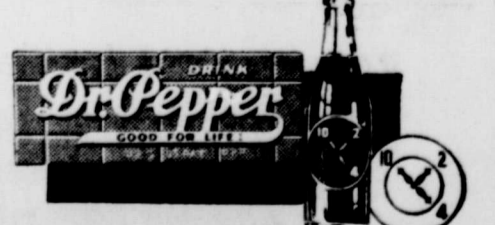

Have We Given So Much

We sometimes feel our country is feeding everybody. We sometimes feel our country is feeding everybody everywhere. The blunt fact is that, so far, of all the nations of the world ours has made the smallest proportional response to the food crisis brought on by a common war and by drought.

Canada and Britain have intensified their rationing since war's end; save for sugar, we've dropped ours. Canada has exceeded many of her commitments to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration (UNRRA). Britain has stripped her food reserves below safety level to help alleviate starvation.

We promised UNRRA 300,000,000 pounds of meat for the first three months this year, but didn't deliver half that amount. We delivered only half the 1,200,000 tons of wheat we had promised for the same period.

Now that the famine has reached its peak, what are our plans? One thing we can ALL do, right now, is back the Emergency Food Collection in Haskell County. It offers everyone a simple, direct and personal means of giving quick additional help to the hungry and the starving overseas.

The main objective of the collection is to secure cash gifts. More food can be obtained for a given amount of money if it can be bought centrally and in large quantities. Saving is also effected in pick-up, packing and transportation costs. The secondary objective is to procure food packed in tin cans.

There is no better way, it seems to us, to obtain more food and dispatch it quickly to the areas of greatest need. Think what it would mean if each Haskell County family gave a substantial money gift, and, in addition set aside a can of food a day for our afflicted neighbors—just for one month.

Scores of thousands in Europe and Asia appear certainly doomed. But we can save many other lives if we get behind the Emergency Food Collection and really push!

Where A Little Is A Lot

Hard work is no stranger to the farmer. He knows that what you get out of a job is based generally upon what you put into it. Most farmers, knowing the amount of effort it takes to have a successful farm, buy insurance against rain, hail or tornado damage to their buildings and their crops.

But the farmer, like the city resident, cannot protect himself or his family by any known means against a disease, infantile paralysis, which again is on the march in the United States.

Veterans News

Q. Can an honorably discharged member of the Women's Army Corps obtain hospital treatment in a Veterans Administration hospital?

A. Yes, former female members of the armed forces are entitled to the same treatment as male war veterans.

Q. Does National Life Service insurance contain any restrictive provisions respecting military service, occupation or travel which might limit the protection under the insurance retained after discharge from service?

A. No. Under what conditions may National Service life insurance be waived by the government on account of total disability?

A. All National Service life insurance policies contain a provision for the waiver of premiums, upon application by the insured, during the continuous total disability of the insured which continues or has continued for 6 or more consecutive months, provided such disability commenced subsequent to the date of his application for insurance.

Q. How does a non-citizen-veteran apply for naturalization?

A. If the veteran has been honorably discharged, he may apply at the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service or at the nearest post office for complete information.

Q. What are the requirements for a pension payable to World War II veterans for service-connected disabilities?

A. Pensions may be paid for disability incurred in, or aggravated by, active service in World War II, in line of duty, according to the degree of disability shown.

Q. For what veterans is out-patient treatment furnished by the Veterans Administration?

A. Veterans whose disabilities are service-connected may in addition to hospitalization and domiciliary care receive out-patient medical, surgical, and dental services for their service-connected diseases or injuries.

Q. May a veteran pay off a guaranteed loan before it becomes due?

A. Yes, the regulations give the veterans that right.

Vacationists Should Use Caution While Swimming

Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports during summer months was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of unfamiliar depths and currents, and without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, through carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety: when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is most important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted.

Swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous."
