

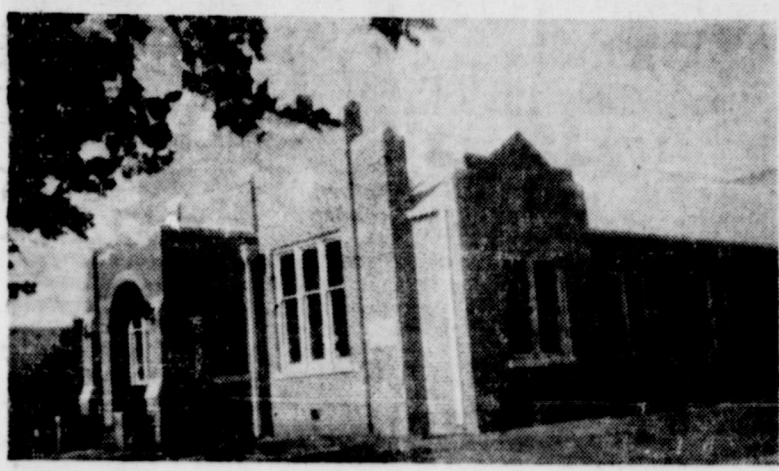

Former Haskell Couple's Son Is Traffic Victim

A traffic accident in the heart of the residential district of Lubbock Tuesday resulted in the death of Edwin Clay Johnson, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Johnson of that city, former residents of Haskell who moved to the Plains city several years ago. Two automobiles were involved in the accident which claimed the boy's life. Two other high school students, Thomas Harvey and Patsy Farmer, were injured.

Powell, projectionist at the Texas Theatre, which was found abandoned in the north part of Stamford late Tuesday night, badly damaged by fire which had burned the upholstery and interior of the machine, a '38 Ford sedan.

Garage attendants, believing the man had been given permission to take the car, thought nothing of the matter and it was late Tuesday before Mr. Powell discovered his car missing and notified officers Tuesday night.

A SMALLER PORTION WOULD BE WELCOME NOW... Today Is Anniversary of 1930's 'June Flood' When 8.62 Inches of Rain Fell

Although moisture is badly needed in practically all parts of the county, few if any farmers desire rain in anything like the proportions which have been received here occasionally in the past.

Today—June 13—is the anniversary of one of the heaviest downpours recorded in this section, the disastrous "June flood" of 1930, when almost nine inches of rain fell within three hours, causing heavy property loss in both the residential and business section and isolating this city from the outside world for a period of 48 hours during which time all bus and train service in and out of the city was at a standstill.

Precipitation here was recorded at 8.62 inches for a three-hour period from 6 to 9 o'clock on Friday afternoon, June 13, 1930. Previously, 10.74 inches of rain had fallen here since April 24 of that year. The rain of almost cloudburst proportions struck suddenly, and was heavier in the section north and northeast of Haskell. Near Goree, a family of five persons drowned when the waters of Miller Creek, normally a small

'First-Aid' Meals For Starving Asked By Food Collectors

Dr. John W. Studebaker, Commissioner of the U. S. Office of Education, has called on the nation's school children, college youth, and educational leaders to help provide "first-aid" meals to people overseas who are suffering from hunger and starvation. His statement was made public at national headquarters of the Emergency Food Collection.

"Many children in famine-swept lands are too weak from hunger to play," Dr. Studebaker declared. "Others are dying of starvation. Those who manage to survive may never be strong in body, and their hearts will be bitter. Their embittered spirits could definitely endanger world peace. For our own sake, as well as for theirs, we must do everything possible to assure them food now, because these are the children whom our own boys and girls must work with in the world of tomorrow.

"Gifts to the Emergency Food Collection can assure first-aid meals to famine victims that will be as important as first-aid treatments given to people injured in accidents or suffering from shock."

Price Control Ban Seen by Reed as Inflation Feeder

Until there is a substantial balance between supply and demand it would be utterly folly to assume that the abolition of price controls would result in anything short of increased inflation, S. N. Reed, chairman of the Haskell Price Control Board, declared today.

Production of such sought-after items as automobiles, shirts, men's wear, lumber and home appliances could not possibly increase greatly enough to satisfy demand, and therefore, stabilize prices by the end of this year, Mr. Reed said.

Although large quantities of scarce items in the low-price levels will show up on the market this summer, they cannot be expected to go very far in meeting a national "unquenchable demand," Mr. Reed warned. "Nevertheless, there will be a steady increase in production and everyone will see more and more goods for sale on merchants' shelves."

Mr. Reed pointed out that although the production of most important commodities — except in the recreation field — is running well above 1941 levels, demand has increased so much since then as a result of much higher incomes and accumulated wartime backlogs, that to remove controls on most of these products now would almost certainly result in sharp and cumulative increases in prices and business costs. It is most difficult, he said, to imagine what would happen to the price of most farm products, coal, house furnishings, wool and rayon fabrics, bus and truck tires and most of the basic industrial materials if controls on these products were removed suddenly. To avert the grave consequences and the irrefragable harm of inflation here in this country we must hold prices to our present average. Decontrol of items before there is a substantial balance between supply and demand will result only in unprecedented hardships and calamity for millions of wage-earners who will be forced to pay outrageous prices merely to exist," Mr. Reed concluded.

37 Candidates File For County Places On Primary Ballot

With 12 p. m. Saturday June 15 deadline for filing for places on the ballot for the first Democratic Primary, 37 candidates for various district, county and precinct offices to be filled by Haskell County voters had filed with Jno. A. Couch, chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee up to Thursday morning.

Several candidates who have announced for office remain to file for the ballot, but are expected to do so before expiration of the deadline as all have been notified, Couch said.

In addition to candidates required to file with the county chairman, Couch has received a list of State candidates certified by the State Democratic Executive Committee for places on the July 27 ballot.

Survey Reveals Teacher Shortage

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition of the teacher personnel in Texas. Replies were received from 945 superintendents, representing 36,057 teaching positions or about 80 per cent of the total in Texas. Since the opening of school in September, 3,533 teachers have resigned their positions which represents about 10 per cent of the total. Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,546 were listed with sub-standard qualifications which represents approximately 15 per cent of the total.

Local districts are exerting every effort possible to keep teachers in life classrooms but many superintendents report that it appears impossible to fill all of their positions this coming year because of the low salaries paid and the number of resignations which are anticipated at the close of the current school year. Practically all of the cities in Texas report resignations averaging 13 per cent. Many local school districts are voting to increase their tax rate or will increase property valuations in order to secure more revenue for teachers' salaries. 110 independent school districts have voted a tax increase above the rates they levied a year ago and 143 report that they plan to hold elections for tax rate increases soon. In 40 counties, one or more common school districts have increased their tax rates and 10 counties report that they plan to hold elections for this purpose soon.

It is estimated that 8,500 Texas teachers entered the armed forces and industry from September 1941 through 1945. However, only 1,277 have returned to teaching.

In looking over the results of the survey, Elizabeth Koch of San Antonio, President of the Texas State Teachers Association, said: "If we are to keep a staff of well trained teachers in the public schools of Texas, we must materially increase salaries. There is no other solution to the problem. The continued exodus of our teachers from the classrooms presents an alarming condition. We must give our attention to this problem immediately with the hope that local communities and the next session of the legislature will provide greatly increased support for the public schools."

Survivors include the parents; a sister, Audrey Ann; the maternal grandmother, Mrs. N. H. Harrell.

Would Provide for Needed Expansion of Water and Sewer Facilities

Expansion of Water and Sewer Facilities

To meet an acute need for expansion of the city water and sewer system to make these facilities available to additional sections of the city in which many new homes are being built, as well as to meet an increased demand in the business section, the City Council has ordered an election to be held Friday, June 28, when property taxpayers will vote on the proposed issuance of \$88,000 revenue bonds of the city's water system for the purpose of improving, enlarging, and extending the city water system and city sanitary system.

The election will be held at the City Hall and all qualified voters who are property-owning taxpayers in the city of Haskell will be eligible to vote on the proposition. However, the election order specifically states that the voter must have rendered property on the city's 1946 tax rolls.

The planned extension will make sewer and water service available to an estimated two hundred and fifty new patrons, many of whom are urgently requesting the extensions, pointing out that all property owners are entitled to every convenience "necessary to better homes" so long as it can be financed under a sound financial plan.

In voting the proposed bonds, property owners will be creating a lien against the revenues of the water and sewer system and they must be paid from that source.

The proposed extensions of the water mains will insure better fire protection and bring about a permanent reduction in fire insurance premiums that could not be granted with the present inadequate system of water mains. The Fire Insurance Commission at Austin has estimated the reduction in fire insurance premiums at about six to one-half per cent which would result in a net saving of more than fifteen hundred dollars per year to the citizenship of Haskell.

At present there is outstanding \$16,000.00 four per cent bonds against the city's water revenues. Holder of these bonds is not willing to accept the cash for them at the present time, but has agreed to accept bonds from the proposed new issue in exchange. Therefore it will be necessary for \$16,000 of the new issue to bear four per cent interest. The additional \$72,000 for water and sewer extensions will mature over a period of fifteen years. Bonds maturing within ten years will bear two per cent interest, bonds maturing ten to fifteen years will bear two and one-half per cent interest.

Average increase in the city's obligations by reason of voting the proposed bonds will be less than \$6,000 per year for a period of fifteen years. If there is an additional two hundred new water and sewer customers added by reason of the extensions, these at the minimum fee of \$2.75 per month would add \$6,600 per year to the present revenue, it was pointed out, making the proposed extension self-sustaining.

T. M. Eight grandchildren also survive.

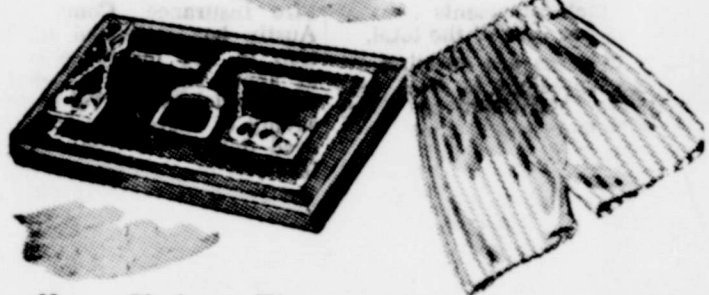

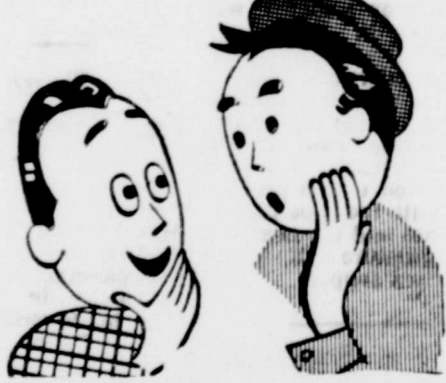

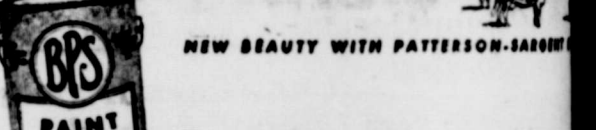

NOTES ON AGRICULTURE

(By JOE HARPER, Secretary)

County Committee and Secretary Make Trip to King Ranch

The county committee and the secretary have just returned from a trip to the King Ranch in South Texas, where they were shown a demonstration of cattle management by the King Ranch. The demonstration included four groups of cattle handled separately in sections as follows:

Group One—Cattle which were fed only native pasture.
Group Two—Cattle which were fed only native pasture plus a bone meal supplement.
Group Three—Cattle which were fed native pasture, plus phosphorus in the water.
Group Four—Cattle which were fed native pasture on which there had been placed 400 pounds per acre of superphosphate.

There was a distinct difference in the cattle, and Group Four was by far the most productive and healthiest group. The figures are not yet available for all groups, but this column will carry the complete comparisons as soon as they are available.

The Water and Sewer Bonds

In this week's Free Press will be found a notice of election called by the City Council on issuance of bonds for the purpose of extending and improving water and sewer service in Haskell. This action is real news to most citizens but is the result of planning and looking to the future for a better city by those truly interested in the welfare of the town.

Haskell has most of the conveniences offered by the average town her size. Such improvements as more paved streets, city mail delivery, adequate housing and business building facilities, enlarged schools, large payroll concerns and other projects run through our minds when we think of making Haskell more attractive. The water and sewer system has become inadequate and should head the list of projects. Haskell is building. In spite of the serious shortage of building materials a large number of business and residential buildings are going up. Several of them are having to go to more than a little expense to install their own water and sewer systems because they are not reached by the city lines. Others are paying tremendous premiums on having water piped to their buildings.

There are dozens of Haskell citizens who plan to build homes just as soon as the lumber and other building materials are available through regular channels. One of the biggest inducements to building is to make gas, water and electricity easily available so that prospective home builders can install appliances they have dreamed about during the years of shortages. Utility companies already have made public their plans to make their commodities available to practically everyone in the near future. The City of Haskell should be just as eager to offer her citizens water and sewer facilities.

The day of cantankerous water and sewer facilities is past for cities looking to their future. Haskell, in part, is a city of private and inadequate water systems. The City Council is offering property owners an opportunity to construct additional lines and improve some outmoded ones. That's a mighty good step in the right direction.

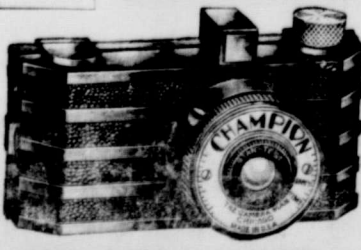

Left-Over Medicines Present Real Danger Says Health Officer

There are many persons who naturally hoard anything and everything including old clothes, boxes, and other useless articles, some of which constitute no greater danger than a possible fire hazard, but a very real danger is present when this tendency is applied to hoarding old medicine in any form.

Most medicine finds itself into the home through a doctor's prescribing it for some specific illness. For the sake of safety, left-over medicines should be destroyed immediately when they have fulfilled their purpose and never be stored in the medicine cabinet for future unprescribed use in case of another illness, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Self-medication with the use of left-over drugs which were of great benefit to some previous illness can sometimes turn a simple ailment into a very serious condition of actual poisoning," Dr. Cox said. "This is particularly true of the indiscriminate use of sulfa drugs which have been prescribed for some previous specific condition."

"It is wise to use medicines as indicated for the illness for which the yare prescribed by your doctor, and when they are no longer needed, destroy the remaining medicine immediately," Dr. Cox said. "Even if you expect a return of the same condition at some future date, it would be better to obtain new medicine if the condition recurs than to retain this old medicine"

Simple Rules Help To Conserve Fats

To get the best use from fat in cooking as well as to save it for use again, heed the "no smoking" rule for when fat is overheated and reaches the smoking point. It starts to break down chemically and three unfortunate things happen. The flavor of the fat and of the food cooked in it is damaged. Food fried in smoking fat is not easily digested. And finally, fat that has reached the smoking point will turn rancid more quickly than fat which has not smoked if saved for use again.

To prevent fat from smoking, Louise Newman, County Home Demonstration Agent advises: Keep heat low when melting fat for sauce or pan-frying. Cook meat at moderate temperature which is best for the protein as well as the fat. Remember that fats vary in the amount of heat they can stand. Butter, oleomargarine, drippings and olive oil, all tend to smoke quickly.

Used fats should be kept cold, covered, and in a dark place to prevent rancidity and help keep a good flavor. Heat, especially, but also light and air hasten the chemical change that causes fat to become rancid and inedible. The jar or can in which left-over fat

Veterans News

Q. Does the Veterans Administration furnish artificial limbs to veterans?

A. Artificial limbs are furnished veterans when required for a service-connected condition or for an associated disease or injury held to be aggravating the disability from a service-connected disease or injury. Seeing-eye dogs are also furnished.

Q. Where should veterans go to receive employment assistance?

A. To the nearest office of the United States Employment Service or to the nearest Selective Service Local Board.

Q. How can a veteran who is interested in Federal employment find out about job opportunities?

A. Announcements of civil service examinations, and the proper application forms may be obtained at any first or second-class post office, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C.

Q. Does the Veterans Administration issue an American flag upon the death of a veteran?

A. An American flag with which to drape the casket of any veterans of a war, discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, may be issued by postmasters at any county seat post office or any other post office designated by the Veterans Administration, or by field stations of the VA.
