Others are paying tremendous premiums on having water piped to their

There are dozens of Haskell citizens who plan to build homes just as soon as the lumber and other building materials are available through regular channels. One of the biggest inducements to building is to make gas, water and electricity easily available so that prospective home builders can install appliances they have dreamed about FOR COUNTY JUDGE: during the years of shortages. 


