After the business meeting the social hour was enjoyed. Mrs. John Fouts and Mrs. Josselet had charge of the entertainment.

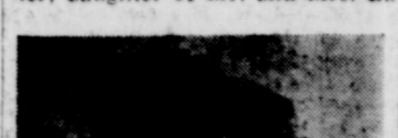

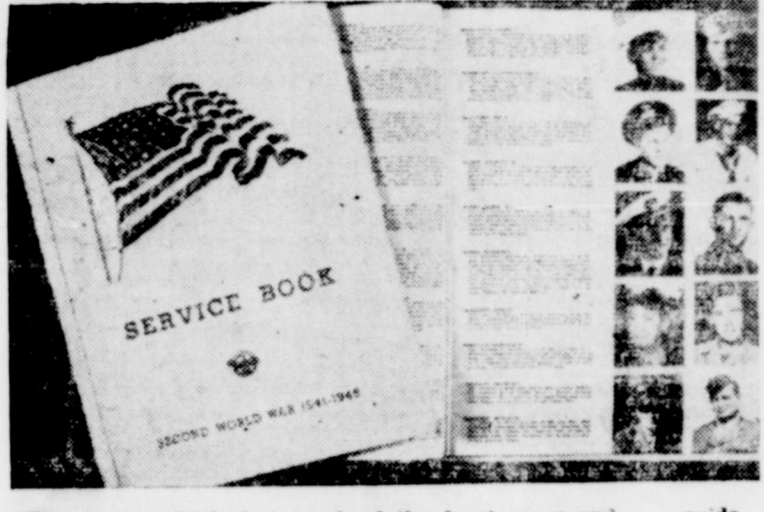

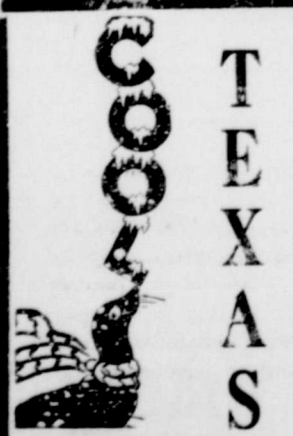
