Rainey Cites Slander Used by Opponents In Haskell Saturday

Accusing his opponents in the governor's race of using a "malicious, vicious campaign of personal slander" against him, Homer P. Rainey appealed to a crowd here Saturday afternoon to "fight with me in the effort to unshackle Texas from monopolistic interests."

"I am president of the University of Texas yet," the candidate told the crowd of several hundred gathered on the east side of the courthouse square, "if I'd been willing to knuckle under and just teach the sort of propaganda that crowd wanted."

Then he added: "Why don't they want me for governor? Because they know they can't control me."

He said of the 14 candidates for governor, "13 are running for second place on the slogan 'Stop Rainey'—and there would have been more candidates if the big interests of the state could have got them into the race." He added confidently that "it looks like there won't even be a run-off."

"Powerful monopolies have a

strangle hold on Texas," he insisted, "with half a dozen big oil companies dominating the state's oil industries and driving independent out of business; four or five big companies controlling its natural gas industry; two powerful companies monopolizing its sulphur, which constitutes 50 per cent of the nation's output."

The owners of these concerns, he asserted, "live in Chicago, New York, and the people of this state are getting nothing out of it all."

In addition, he listed the average farm income as less than \$500 yearly with half of those who work the farms merely tenants for non-resident owners.

Explaining his own program for improved health, education, larger pensions, better farm life conditions, he advocated a state tax increase of two cents a barrel on oil and two cents a 1000-cubic feet on natural gas.

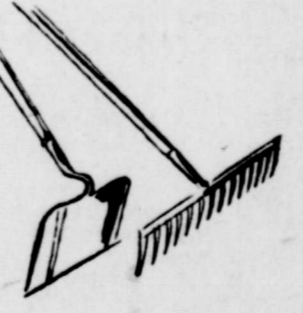

FSA Has Flexible Loan Program For Returning Vets

The Farm Security Administration, an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, offers technical guidance and financial assistance to veterans of World War II with a farming background who wish to establish themselves on land they already own or rent, or who wish to buy farms. The two types of help available through FSA are described below:

Standard Operating Loans
Standard operating loans are made to veterans who (1) have an agricultural background, (2) are in need of supervision in good farm and home management practices, and, (3) cannot obtain adequate credit elsewhere at reasonable rates and terms.

These loans may be made to finance farming operations, home operations and minor improvements and repairs. They also may be made for the purchase of farm and home equipment and livestock.

Operating loans are based upon an improved farm and home management plan, worked out jointly by the veteran and his family and the FSA county farm and home supervisors. This management plan calls for (1) home production of feed and of the family living, as nearly as possible, (2) several sources of cash income and, (3) improved soil conserving practices and proper use of land.

Careful hours of guidance in these improved farming and homemaking practices accompany the loans.

The most that can be loaned to an individual in any one fiscal year is \$2,500, and total indebtedness of a borrower to FSA cannot exceed \$5,000. Interest on loans is 5 per cent. Payment terms are one year on funds used to buy consumable goods and up to five years on funds used to buy recoverable goods such as livestock and equipment.

Farm Purchase Loans
Farm purchase loans are made to veterans who (1) have an agricultural background, (2) are physically able to operate the farm and (3) are willing to cooperate with the Farm Security Administration in farming operations.

Farm purchase loans may be made to finance the purchase of a family-type farm, to finance the

purchase of additional land to make a family-type farm, or for the construction of new farm and home improvements as a supplement to land purchase.

Applicants for farm purchase loans are passed upon in each county by a committee of local farmers, who pass on the applicant's eligibility to receive a loan. The farm to be bought also is passed upon by this committee of farmers.

Each farm under consideration must undergo a careful appraisal to determine whether or not its long-time earning capacity will enable the borrower to repay the loan and, at the same time, to make a living for himself and his family.

As a general rule, farm purchase loans are not made for more than \$12,000.

Interest on farm purchase loans is 3 per cent, and up to 40 years may be allowed for payment of the loan. Most farm purchase borrowers, however, repay their loans on the "variable payment" plan, under which they are billed for larger amounts in good years and smaller amounts in bad years.

This plan substantially cuts the repayment time needed. It also protects borrowers by permitting them to get ahead of their repayment schedule during periods of high farm income, providing a margin of safety against the possibility of poor yields or low prices.

Loans are accompanied by an improved farm and home management plan and borrowers are guided in improved farm and home practices by FSA county farm and home supervisors.

Detailed information on the assistance available to World War II veterans through the Farm Security Administration program may be obtained at the local FSA office, located on the northeast corner of the courthouse, on the third floor. This county office unit, with Robert C. Pope as FSA Supervisor, serves both Haskell and Stonewall Counties.

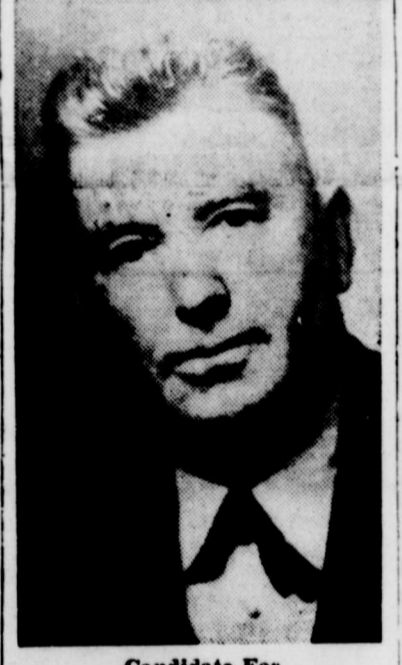

An Editorial Wherein Voters Are Scrutinized

When you look down that long list of names on July 27, what will be your chief reaction?

Some voters will scratch three or four candidates they happen to dislike and then choose somewhat at random the office-seekers for whom their ballots are to be cast. These are the "aginners," and may their number be few.

Some citizens will glance at the long sheet of paper and start chopping names as hastily as if they were chopping cotton. By the time their labors are ended, a lot of their choices may not count because they have not made their marks according to balloting requirements. These are the "mutilators" who always have a small but sometimes potent hand in selection of our officials.

Every primary election turns up with a number of ballots on which only a few choices are made. Maybe the governor's, the attorney general's, the sheriff's and commissioner's races interest them, but they don't give a yelp for the others . . . just as if their failure to vote for certain offices would leave the offices vacant! These are the "part-timers," and they often change the course of elections.

Then there's the group that gives little thought to the ballot until they are seated in the voting room, pencil in hand, ballot before them. They vote in the "hot" races for the man they've heard probably will win. In the other races they just select names at random—because they sound good or because Aunt Hattie's brother's wife had a nephew named so-and-so. These are the "hesitators," and their indecision may saddle some good-for-nothing candidate on the rest of us for the next two years.

Next and foremost come the men and women with the gleam of true American citizenship in their eyes. They have read the papers, listened to the radio, entered into discussions and weighed the merits of candidates for every race. They can tell you with some degree of authority about the platforms, accomplishments, promises and campaign antics of all the leading candidates. Voting to them is the supreme American privilege . . . one of the privileges for which many Liberty County boys died on the battlefields of the world. They are the "patriots." May we thank God that they are usually in the majority, that theirs is the hand that keeps the United States generously supplied, from constable to president, with men and women of high purpose and patriotic mien!

To these voters, all we refer this week's Vindicator, in which a full sample ballot is published, and in which the messages of most candidates are presented. May the "aginners," the "mutilators," the "part-timers" and the "hesitators" become fewer and fewer as July 27 approaches. And may the "patriots" cast the majority vote in every race.—The Liberty Vindicator.

Carothers of this city, who was in Haskell Monday. Most of the damage was to young cotton, Mr. Carothers said.

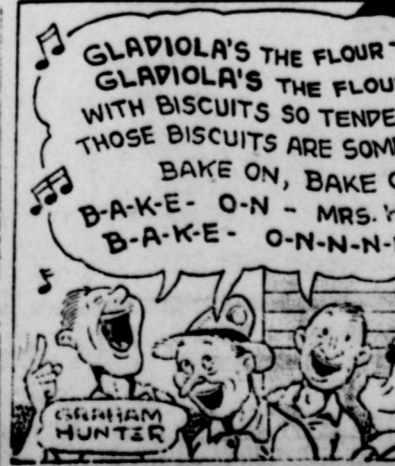

Canning Hints for County Women Point To Fair in October

With canning season again in progress it is also time to think of canned products for exhibition at the fair in October. The catalog with the list of prizes and ribbons will be published within a few days. Prizes will be offered for first and second place for the best quart of canned peaches, pears, plums, dewberries or blackberries, best pints of canned pineapple, peach, pear, tomato and strawberry preserves, best glasses of plum, berry and grape jelly, and best pint of peach butter. Canned okra, corn, and tomato gumbo, English peas, and tomato juice should be in pint jars but snap beans, field peas, tomatoes, and dill, sour cucumber, dill pickles, beet pickles, and peach pickles are to be in quart jars. Green tomato pickles, pickled onions, relish and chow chow are to be in pint containers.
 Methods and score cards approved by the Extension Service are to be used in judging these canned foods. The containers should have an air tight seal, be smooth and unblemished, clean and polished, and free from rust or corrosion. Only standard jars made for home canning should be used.
 In most instances fancy packs should not be used. Peaches and

pears should be packed in over-lapping layers with the pit cavity downward. They should be of even ripeness, uniform size, firm, good color and should be packed in a clean syrup. Tomatoes should be packed in tomato juice. Snap beans of even length and uniform maturity with clean liquid. Pickles should be neatly and practically packed, of a dark olive green color. Tomato juice should have not more than one inch separation per pint and should be filled to not over one-fourth inch from the top of the jar. In all instances the liquid or syrup covering vegetables or fruits should be in one-fourth inch of the top of the container.
 To assure a good quality canned food select fresh, good quality fruits and vegetables; can them as soon after gathering as possible; use good containers and proper equipment; seal food hot, whether it is pre-cooked or steamed in the jar; follow reliable processing times; cool properly and store in a clean, cool, dark, dry place. Further information concerning canning procedures and scoring is available from the office of the home demonstration agent.
