Let's Don't Let It Drop

Haskell Lions Club made a start recently on a project that would be of untold benefit to the town. Members of the service organization discussed ways and means of getting underway in Haskell a permanent set-up for garbage disposal, and got as far as the City Council with the proposition. City Dads were as much in favor of the proposal as were the Lions, but neither the Lions nor the Councilmen seemed to know exactly the right answer to the problem. They still are working on it.

Many a worthy project in Haskell has died in a committee or because no more than a few were interested in it. No one will question but that a project which would eliminate as many flies and mosquitoes and stray cats and rats and mice and roaches and ants and germs and foul odors as would the garbage disposal project is a good thing for everybody in Haskell. Everybody heard expressing an opinion is for the proposal whole-heartedly. But being for a deal in mind isn't enough. Haskell people need to voice their opinions on this project to the City Government and the sponsoring Lions.

Several proposals have been offered. Some would put an additional 50c to \$1 on every city water bill each month and guarantee that garbage would be picked up at least twice a week. Others have suggested that several citizens who are not on a city water main would want benefit of the garbage disposal program and that a driver who would dispose of the garbage could collect enough from Haskell citizens to assure himself an above-the-

Any way to guarantee garbage disposal systematically and thoroughly would be welcomed by Haskell citizens. Give it a boost by talking it up in your neighborhood and offering helpful suggestions on its operation.




Q. Can a veteran have a loan guaranteed or insured to buy or construct more thn a single-family home




