Haskell Vet Buys Pickup at Childress

Fifty-nine veterans of World War II were successful purchasers of surplus used army vehicles at a two day sale conducted by the War Assets Administration at Childress, Tex., Army Air Field. In all 163 vehicles were offered, including passenger sedans, jeeps, scooters, trailers and trucks. Cash recovery for the sale by WAA was \$31,792 for vehicles which originally cost the government \$59,290.

Robert V. Earles, Rt. 3, Haskell, was fortunate in securing a Chevrolet pickup truck for \$455.

The sale attracted 250 veterans from all parts of North and West Texas. All awards were made to holders of oldest dated certificates for each type of vehicle in the sale.

Bronze Turkeys Not Inferior in Quality, Specialist Explains

Some Texas producers are concerned because their growing young bronze turkeys are developing many white feathers. Low protein feeding, not breeding, is the cause says Prof. D. H. Reid of the department of poultry husbandry at the A. and M. College of Texas.

As a preventive, he advises adding five pounds or more of meat and bone scraps, or soybean meal, to each 100 pounds of the feed given the birds. Turkeys molt just before reaching maturity and if this is done no off-color feathers will appear.

Veterans' News

Leaders in education, religion, labor, industry and government joined efforts this week to develop and employ the abilities of those who are physically handicapped.

By official proclamation, President Truman set the week of October 6 as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." The nation-wide drive is sponsored by a special committee of which the Veterans Administration is a member.

The committee pointed out that upwards of 300,000 physically handicapped are registered with the United States Employment Service. They are looking for suitable jobs.

Of these, about a quarter of a million are disabled war veterans according to VA, well over 100,000 veterans are now in training under Public Law 16. Many of them will be looking for jobs when their training is over.

Besides the disabled veterans, there are many other Americans with physical handicaps who are not holding jobs fully suited to their abilities. They number about 2,500,000, the Committee said.

A survey by the Department of Labor shows these important points: Handicapped workers make quick job adjustments; they are equal and often superior to the able-bodied in productivity; their safety records are as good or better than those of fellow-workers; they tend to have better records of attendance; they change jobs less frequently.

Hoping to set an example, VA has set up special interviewing units to place physically-handicapped people in VA jobs. VA is now employing well over 10,000 disabled veterans.

All beneficiaries who are drawing checks from the Veterans Administration were warned this week they will encounter delays in receiving their allotments if they do not notify VA of changes in address. New addresses must be reported to VA over the beneficiary's own signature, or checks will be undeliverable, VA said.

WAC Enlistment Goals Set by Army

Sgt. Melton G. Stapp of the U.S. Army recruiting sub-station in Stamford announced today that he had received a letter from the War Department, Washington, D. C., which states that a special effort will be made to reenlist ten former members of the Women's Army Corps with MOS 213 (Stenographer) for assignment to the Mediterranean Theater. Applications for re-enlistment will be forwarded to the Adjutant General's Office, Washington, D. C., as received. No application will be forwarded after October 20, 1946.

Sgt. Stapp also states that WAC's also received the recently authorized increases of soldier's pay which amounts to as much as 56% for some grades. The 26% additional pay for overseas service remains in effect also for the duration of the emergency and six months and will be payable to all WACs as well as male soldiers.

ed bronze turkey moults have been observed. This occurred in feeding tests in which the 24.37 total protein supplement was a combination of 65.29 per cent vegetable and 34.71 animal protein. In another test a more pronounced feather discoloration was produced when a ration containing 40.32 per cent vegetable and 59.68 animal protein was fed.

It is believed, Prof. Reid adds, that this discoloration can be traced to a deficiency of lysine, one of the essential amino acids which was shown to prevent the discoloration. Vegetable proteins are low in this amino acid. Meanwhile, further work is being carried on to discover the adequate amount of combinations of animal proteins necessary to prevent bronze feathers changing color. Additional information will be released as it becomes available.

taking "on the job" training under Public Law No. 16. I am receiving pension and also subsistence allowance. My wife recently had a child. May I get an increase for this child while I am in training?

A. Yes. Send a certified copy of the certificate of birth to the VA. The subsistence allowance will be increased \$10 for your first child and \$7 for each additional child.

Q. I am a disabled veteran and was injured while taking VA rehabilitation training in a machine shop. The doctor says my left arm will be permanently crippled. Can I get a pension from the Veterans Administration?

A. Yes. You must apply for it within two years from the date of your injury.

Q. I have been advised that my pension is to be reduced in 60 days. What can I do to prevent this reduction?

A. You may submit evidence to show that the reduction is not warranted and your case will be reviewed. The best evidence would be an affidavit from your doctor describing in detail your disability.

Q. Is it permissible for a veteran who is receiving a high rate of disability compensation to seek and obtain employment?

A. Yes. There is no VA objection to such action on his part.

Q. May a pension be paid because of a service-connected disability if the veteran did not serve during war time?

A. Yes. Certain rates of pensions are provided for disability contracted in line of duty during military or naval service in peace time.

Q. Is the parent of a World War I or II veteran eligible to receive a pension when the cause of death was not related to service?

A. No.

HASKELL COUNTY HISTORY

Brief Items Taken from Old Copies of The Free Press

20 Years Ago—Oct. 7, 1926

Roy Meacham, well known automobile race driver whose home was in Pawhuska, Okla., was killed instantly Saturday afternoon at the fairground race track when his car left the speedway and overturned.

Prior to Oct. 1, 3,477 bales of cotton had been ginned in Haskell County, compared to 2,180 bales on the same date last year.

A new Chevrolet car belonging to J. E. Miller, farmer living south of town, was stolen Saturday night while parked near the fair grounds.
