Dry goods stores WEEK-END VISITORS sell thousands of dollars worth of clothing and bedding material: hardware stores sell them great quantities of small implements and other supplies that go with camp- Grand Prairie spent the week end ing, cooking, working and living in the open; grocery stores sell them food in orders that run quickly into hundreds of dollars every week; drug stores sell them medicines and other items that are required by anyone in normal everyday living: garages and filling stations profit by supplying gas and oil, tires, automotive equipment and service; cafes do business in big volume with them; theatres entertain hundreds of these workers every week; and other businesses make money supplying needs of folks who make good money and are ready to spend it.

Several years ago there were people who came to This section during harvest season who were of questionable character. Let us not penalize those who come here now by classifying them with former transient laborers. Most of the workers who gather Taskell County crops now are of unquestionable changer, and are so organized in groups that they are highly efficient and are easy for farmers to deal with. They are intelligent and clean and establish friendships here that last through the years. Many groups return year after year to work for the same farmers. They truly are an asset to Haskell County.










How far can inflation climb? Let me cite an extreme case. In 1925-36, while I was living in Canton, China, a Chinese dollar usually bought about 18 pounds of rice. Today that much rice commands a price of 2,300 Chinese dollars. By the way, an American dollar (worth 3 to 4 Chinese dollars when I was there) will buy about 2,300 Chinese What of America?

Hard-earned savings in China are not worth much today. Even in America the same trend is active. It keeps taking more and more dollars to provide food, clothing and housing here. How far will it go? ATTEND SCOUTERS MEETING What might it do to the American can avert disaster? If so, what are the things that need to be done? These were the questions on my

mind when I was admitted to the office of John W. Snyder, Secretary of the United States Treasury, on the afternoon of July 11, in Washington. This was while the OPA was inoperative. Mr. Snyder's appearance and his words are vigorous, and his expressions are straightforward. In plain frankness, he said taxes ought to stay high while money is easy, and that interest rates are just what they

tive. He said "I don't know. There are so many uncertain factors involved that it is very complicated. If OPAis not restored, I don't know what will happen."

Pointing out that OPA had been failing anyway, that it had been granting higher prices almost daily before its June 30 expiration, and seemed hopelessly lost, I asked for another opinion.

My question was: "Assuming the OPA to be gone for good, what do you think about inflation?" His reply was music to my ears. He said "There's only one alternative -education of the public. We can readily prevent inflation and attain sound prosperity if we will all do the right things." He is right! No republic can live long if the public is not well enough educated to do

Boost the Program When our people must be regi-

mented into doing the right things, our country will be a republic no longer. Thousands will want to compliment the Secretary upon being ready with something better than an alternative for OPA far better than price-fixing by law. If other leaders will join in this sound program of education, we can make progress on the only possible road o success.

There are two main things that Secretary Snyder wants to teach the American public: (1) Government, labor, and industry must work together for maximum prosurance. This is a fender against inflation. (2) While driving for production, educate people to buy prudently and spend for essentials only. The world's one remaining powerful republic can be preserved this

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
