## NOTE CHANGE IN POLLING PLACES

# Vote Saturday

Qualified voters of Bailey County will be going to the polls to vote on two separate issues Saturday, December 16.

An election held November 11 for the unexpired term of State Representative, District 75, has necessitated a runoff election between John J. Kendrick, Democrat from Brownfield and Eddie Paxton, Republican from Muleshoe.

The candidate elected Saturday is to fill the unexpired term of Jesse T. George as Representative.

Voters will also cast their ballots either for or against a City Sales Tax.

All voters are to note a change in voting places. Due to the municipal election on the sales tax issue to be held at City Hall Saturday, voters in Precinct 1 will vote at the Muleshoe Junior High School in the County Election, Precinct 1-A will vote in the Runoff election at the West Camp Baptist Church; Precinct 2 at Long-operate Association building, Precinct 3 at Long-operate Association building, Precinct 4 at Long-operate Association building, Precinct 5 at Long-operate Association building.

Needmore Community house and Precinct 6 at Three Way School.

Election judges are Ernest Kerr and Mrs. H. O. Barbour for Precinct 1; Myron Pool and Mrs. W. R. Bowers, Precinct 1-A; Lonnie Wilhite and D. O. Bursmith, Precinct 2; Bert Scales and Bo Ethridge, Precinct 3; George Tyson and L. E. Warren, Precinct 4; Mrs. Rudolph Moraw and Mrs. Margaret Phipps, Precinct 5 and Mrs. Eddie Wallace and Marjorie McDaniel, Precinct 6.

Voters in 21 more Texas cities passed judgment on the optional one percent municipal sales tax Tuesday and early returns showed that citizens in 10 cities staunchly approved the measure.

Decisive tallies were available from the 10 cities an hour after the polls closed. Balloting

also took place Tuesday in 11 other towns.

Seven Lower Rio Grande Valley communities adopted the tax. They were, with for and against figures:

Edinburg 529 and 115; La Feria 77 and 38; McAllen and Faria 77 and 38; McAllen 1,406 and 496; Mercedes 291 and 75; Mission 589 and 251; and San Benito 389 and 71.

Also approving the tax were Kennedy 303 to 35; Karnes City 182 to 23; Kerens 116 to 26; and Breckenridge 488 to 245.

Organized opposition against the measure, as well as support for it, has formed in the Valley.

Prior to Tuesday's elections, 96 cities had approved the tax and 17 turned it down.

The following is a list concerning the reasons a sales tax is needed:

1. We need to quit growing a block at a time. We must plan ahead -- We are.
2. Let's help build a livable town for all -- not just one group.
3. "Thinking" about doing something is necessary -- but "action" afterward gets it done. This is "action."
4. Let's help trim the increases that will otherwise be necessary in property tax.
5. We need a water system improvement program. --- Ground storage facilities, and replace old water lines that have rotted out, corroded and do not allow sufficient water pressure.
6. The sewer system needs reworking in old lines and collection lines and new and more facilities are needed at the treatment plant.
7. Storm sewers will be needed soon.
8. City parks and recreation.

tion facilities are badly needed for a city at the "crossroads" such as ours.

9. A community center has been requested many times -- and is badly needed -- besides being a tremendous asset to our community.

10. Our city hall is almost a disgrace to a thriving community such as ours. We need one to house our city offices, police station, Chamber of Commerce offices and our public library which is growing by leaps and bounds.

11. We have (fortunately) an excellent volunteer fire department. We need a new fire station and additional equipment.

12. We need entirely new "feeder" roads within our city limits to relieve traffic on our main streets of trucks and trailers.

13. We need more and improved equipment to furnish services such as trash hauling, street cleaning and repairs, garbage disposal as well as added operating costs of these services.

14. At least 50 percent of the sales tax collected will go into capital improvements and the balance into the maintenance fund.

15. The sales tax may not completely eliminate an increase in property taxes in the future, but it will certainly reduce tremendously the increase.

## Dale Hansard Winner of Hat

Dale Hansard, Northrup King seed man, took top honors in a recent contest held on the Lewis Scoggin farm which is located 10 miles west of Muleshoe on FM 1760.

The contest was conducted by those attending guessing the nearest pound per acre, their choice of the best producing grain sorghum on seven plots in the demonstrations.

Hansard was loyal to his own brand and guessed N.K.-275 to yield 8,440 pounds per acre.

His was the best guess record on the winning variety. Yield reduced to 15 percent moisture is as follows: NK-275, yield 6,972 per acre; PAG-665, yield 6,444; Weathermaster - 75, 6,376; Texas-671, 6,342; Pioneer-820, yield 6,075; Hunt and Tipps (HT-74), yield 6,022 and Asgrow Jumbo C, yield 5,863.

Hansard, as winner, was awarded a \$25 hat by the Muleshoe State Bank.

Scoggin experienced about 25 percent drop in yields as compared to prior years. The ten pound planting rate was a pound more than prior years and this was his first year to plant on Treflan treated cotton ground, reports reveal.

## Lamb Voters Reject Legal Liquor Sale

Lamb County voters turned 'thumbs down' on the legalized sale of alcoholic beverages in Littlefield during an election held there last Saturday.

High, gusty winds and low temperatures failed to slow the stream of persons going to the polls to cast their ballots which tallied 1,106 against the proposal and 745 for the proposition for the legal sale for off-premises consumption. The vote against led by a 3 to 2 margin.

Election Judge J. D. Smith said "The crowd was so constant at City Hall all day and by the time polls were to open, voters were lined up down the halls and into the fire station. The record number was counted at 10 a.m. with 200 in the building, jamming voting stations worked by 10 persons.

The election started off in an unusual fashion. Just after the 8 a.m. opening of the polls, a parade of cars and floats traveled south down Phelps Avenue, announcing and displaying their opposition to the legalizing of the sale of alcoholic beverages.

With City Hall overflowing with people, many of them pack-

ed the adjoining fire station... a noon fire created a two-fold problem for firemen as they not only had to clear the station of people to get to the fire fighting equipment, but get to the fire.

The election was called by the Lamb County Commissioner's Court in regular session held Monday, November 13 after viewing a petition bearing 800 certified voter's signatures. Originally, the petition count was 877 signatures. Sixty-one of these signatures failed to fulfill requirements and 16 others removed their names by affidavit, leaving the number of signers on the petition at an even 800.

According to the code, signature on such a petition must be certified by the county clerk which is required to present it to the court at the next session after the certification is complete. The petition was filed November 6 and certified by November 10.

The legalizing of the sale of alcoholic beverages within the city drew fire from numerous sources during the time between the filing of the petition

The Chisholm Trail Centennial Museum will be making a scheduled appearance in Muleshoe Monday, December 18 from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Mule Memorial statue.

Members of the Bailey County Historical Survey Committee will serve as hosts.

The sleek, sand-beige Chisholm Trail Museum, uniquely housed in a railway car, is sponsored by the Tri-State Chisholm Trail Centennial Commission in cooperation with the Santa Fe Railroad.

The Tri-state commission is made up of Chisholm Trail Centennial Celebration Commissions from Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas. Governor Connally appointed the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to coordinate the activities of the Texas Commission.

Housed in the 6-foot car, are exhibits of selected items from private and museum collections which vividly interpret the story of the Chisholm Trail.

On entering the museum car, the visitor sees a map tracing the Chisholm Trail from its many points of origin in Texas across Indian Territory (now Oklahoma) to Abilene, Kansas, and the railroad.

This entry opens into a spacious compartment roughly one-half the length of the rail car. Here display cases present the three main chapters of the trail story.

Exhibits near the entry depict the strong Spanish influence on the early Texas cattle industry and carries this theme over to "cowboy society," the evolution of drovers' wearing apparel; and adaptation of special tools and equipment needed for the long cattle drives.

The next exhibits are about the actual drives. By the time

herds had reached Red River Station on the Texas-Oklahoma border, the cattle were fairly well trail broken. The main hazards ahead lay in the rough and untamed terrain of Indian Territory.

Oklahoma during the time of the Chisholm Trail was occupied by eight tribes of Indians--Cheyenne, Arapaho, Wichita, Caddo, Kiowa, Apache, Comanche and Chickasaw. Indians along with outlaws, storms, stampedes and prairie

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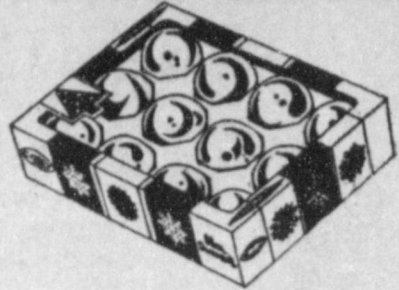

mount of that increase. This will depend on two things - (1) the amount of future bonds issues voted and (2) the final amount of sales tax collected. 16. The sales tax is the fairest tax yet devised. When everyone pays a share "it works."

VOTE A PENNY FOR THE PUSH

Nineteen questions usually asked by the public are answered in the following details. They will appear in the Journal again prior to voting date, December 16.

THE MUNICIPAL SALES TAX QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What items are subject to the one percent municipal sales tax?

A. The one percent sales tax is applicable only to those sales now taxed under the State Sales and Use Tax Act.

Q. There is a two percent State tax on automobiles. Would the city sales tax also apply to automobile sales?

A. No. The two percent State tax on automobiles is an excise tax; the municipal sales tax would not apply to automobile sales.

Q. Does the city sales tax apply to sales at wholesale?

A. No, only to retail sales. Goods sold for resale are not taxable.

Q. Are city sales tax pay-deductible on our Federal Income tax reports?

A. Yes.

Q. Does the municipal sales tax apply to purchases by units of government (county, state, other cities, etc.)?

A. No, all are exempt.

Q. Does a person residing outside of the city limits pay the one percent municipal sales tax?

A. Yes, when he makes a purchase of personal property subject to the tax in city which has adopted the local sales tax. In return, he enjoys the city's street facilities, police protection and other advantages of the city for which city residents pay the major share.

Q. Assuming that city "A" has the sales tax and city "B" does not, and a sale is made in "A" but delivery is to be made in "B", does "A" collect the tax?

A. Yes. The sales tax is levied at the point of sale. Q. If merchandise is ordered from a mail-order business in City "A", which has the local sales tax, for delivery in City "B", does "A" collect the tax?

A. City "A" collects, since it is the point of sale, rather than delivery.

Q. What are some of the items which are exempt from the one percent city sales tax?

A. Among many other exempt items are included cigarettes, cigars, automobiles, water, telephone and telegraph, meals served by hospitals to patients, meals sold by a church, food products which are not prepared for eating, prescription medicines and prescription glasses, cement, alcoholic beverages (unless included on meals), gasoline, farm machinery and products which will be used in the manufacture of another product which is not subject to this tax.

A complete list of exempt items is available from the State Comptroller, Austin.

The last section of exhibits are devoted to the conclusion of the drives. At the trail's end were the cowtowns with stockyards and loading pens. Also in abundance were the emplacements designed to swiftly separate the cowboy from his money--and lawmen to maintain peace and order.

Two displays of special interest tell the Colt Revolver story and the barbed wire story. Included in the gun display are the Patterson Colt of 1838 and the Walker Colt of 1842.

The barbed wire display contains many early variations -- homemade wire, square wire, ribbon wire, double wire and forerunners of modern barbed wire. Old-fashioned staples used to secure wiring to posts is also on display.

Charming photographs from the Irwin Smith Collection, Library of Congress, adorn the walls above the displays along with three massive sets of horns.

The second half of the museum car is separated into three main exhibit areas.

A cowboy in authentic costume along with his saddle, gun and working gear, occupy the first space.

The second area contains the working end of a full-sized chuck wagon along with a camp cook preparing grub. Scattered about in typical disarray are the tools of the cook.

The focal point of the third display, devoted to literary and artistic memorabilia inspired by the Chisholm Trail, is a bronze sculpture by Frederick

## USDA Clears Expanded Use Of Bermuda Grass Herbicide

The USDA has registered Simazine 80W herbicide for weed control in established Bermuda grass, Geigy Agricultural Chemicals, Division of Geigy Chemical Corporation has announced.

With this new labeling, the herbicide is now registered for use on both newly sprigged and established stands.

In field tests for the past several years, Simazine has enabled growers to establish a good stand quickly. It has proved highly effective in controlling most annual broadleaf and grassy weeds such as crabgrass, shallow germinating annual sandbur, little barley, Florida pusley, barnyard grass, Brachiaria, goosegrass, foxtail, carpetweed, annual morning glory, pigweed (carelessweed), Russian thistle, purslane, chickweed, henbit, and burclover.

Simazine 80W, a wettable powder, can be applied to established Bermudagrass before weeds emerge any time from fall to spring. If the crop has been cut prior to application, wait at least seven days before applying Simazine. In annual sprigged stands, it should be applied shortly after sprigging.

Application rate is one to four pounds in at least fifteen gallons of water. The rates vary according to soil type. If the stand is to be grazed, allow at least thirty days between last application and grazing to dairy and beef cattle, and sheep.

When cutting for hay, the interval between application and cutting is a minimum of sixty days.

Castro snubs Soviet on 50th anniversary.



LUBBOCK--The long range future of cotton production and cotton producers on the Texas High Plains looks brighter now than at any time in many years, according to Donald Johnson, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

This is in spite of two successive short crops which have driven many processors and some producers to the brink of bankruptcy.

Production from the 23 counties represented by PCG is now estimated at 1,169,000 bales this year. Last year's crop came to 1,293,700 bales, and these figures compare with a 1960-65 average production of 2,175,099 bales.

"These extremely low production years have brought about rather painful adjustments in our industry," Johnson says, "but I believe we have some things going for us now that will pull us through and carry us on to better things in the years to come."

Johnson's remarks were prompted by an inspection of the third semi-monthly quality analysis of the High Plains crop for this season.

PCG compiles and publishes twice each month during the harvest season a detailed fiber property analysis of the cotton classed at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa. The report is sent to buyers, mills, researchers and other interested parties all over the world.

It is followed later by manufacturing data and spinning test results from the area's predominant varieties, and these two reports have resulted in substantial sales of High Plains cotton over the years.

The third PCG Quality Report this year covered the 553,000 bales classed in the area through November 30 and shows significant improvements over previous crops in virtually all fiber properties.

bales (about half the crop) came to 32.2 thirty-second inches, two tenths of a thirty-second over an inch. At approximately the same state of the season in 1966 staple average was only 30.7 thirty-seconds.

Over 50 percent of the crop so far has stapled an inch or longer and 18.2 percent has pulled 1-1/16 inches or better. Percentages in these categories on the first half of last year's cotton were 18 and 3.5, respectively.

Significant improvement this year is also being recorded in "pressley", or fiber strength, which is another prime indicator of a cotton's spinnability and consequently a major price determinant.

In 1966 at this point average pressley was 73,900 pounds per square inch and only 41.4 percent of the crop was above 75,000 pounds. Pressley on the 1967 crop to November 30 has averaged 81,000 pounds and 72.4 percent has gone 75,000 pounds or more.

In the very strong class, 90,000 pounds per square inch and up, the Plains had only three percent last year, while almost 18 percent of this year's crop has been in that category.

The most desirable micronaire range for both short and long staple cottons is from 3.5 to 4.9, and the 1967 crop to November 30 shows a disappointing 48.9 percent between these figures. But even this is well above the 34.8 percent registered in 1966.

"This upgrading of quality, particularly staple length and fiber strength, has been a tremendous boon to the marketability and the prices paid for this year's crop," Johnson said, "and it is expected to be an even bigger factor in years to come."

He pointed out that there are good, strong, dependable markets for shorter stapled cottons with acceptable micronaire and fiber strength, but that in recent years we have just grown too much of such cotton.

"With the advent of more cot-

ton planted to the longer stapled varieties we will have a much more desirable quality mix on the Plains. And if we grow, gin and market all of our cotton with maximum integrity and maximum concern for pleasing our customers, there is no reason to believe we cannot continue to attract buyers," he stated.

Projecting percentage figures to the end of the season and converting them to bales, Johnson estimated that the Plains will this year supply the market with approximately 100,000 bales of cotton stapling 1-1/16 inches or longer, 200,000 bales of one inch and 1-1/32 inches, and 800,000 or more bales of cotton shorter than an inch.

"These are sufficient qualities of the different staple ranges to attract buyers from mills spinning a wide assortment of yarns, and as we achieve an even better balance in years to come our marketing situation should continue to improve," Johnson said.

He went on to cite other factors which promise to aid the High Plains cotton industry, such as greatly expanded Textile Research facilities and personnel at Texas Tech, the ginning laboratory and additional research people at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, new varieties being developed which will be better adapted to Plains growing conditions, and expanded research and promotion activity on the national and international scene through Cotton Producers Institute and the International Institute for Cotton.

"Our goal is a double goal," Johnson concluded. "We are reaching for greater overall cotton markets and for a greater part of those markets for cotton grown on the High Plains."

"I believe these goals are completely realistic and obtainable, and while there are certain to be ups and downs in the years ahead I cannot help but believe my long-range optimism is justified."

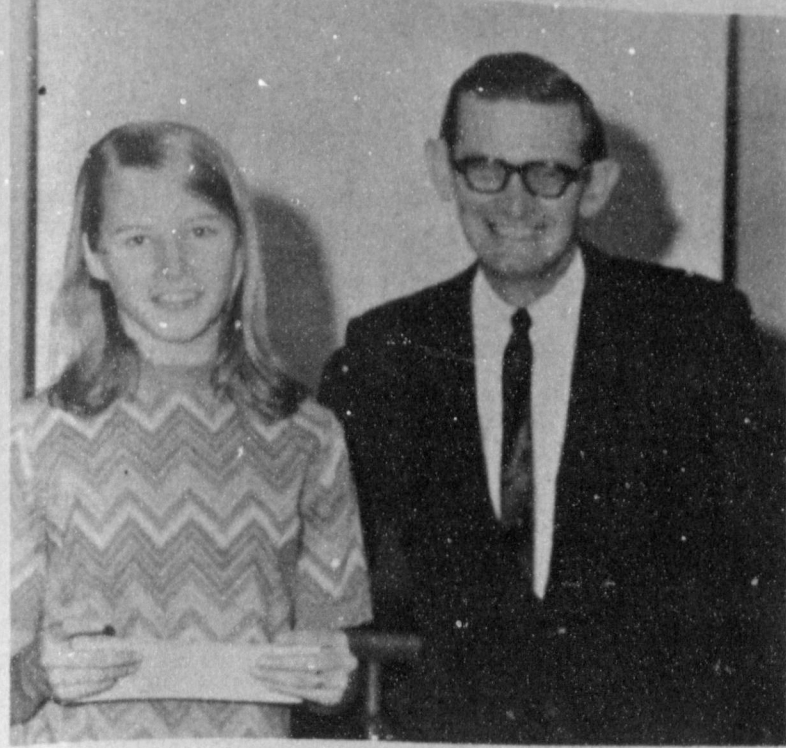

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**AUSTIN**-- Texas' veterans land program, derailed since 1965, is back on the track again.

According to Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, sale of \$30,000,000 in bonds is slated for December 19. Bonds are expected to be delivered around January 25. Money then will be available to buy land for state veterans.

At the November 11 election, Texans voted favorably for a constitutional amendment authorizing sale of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds for the program. Amendment also expanded the program to include veterans who served in Vietnam, as well as Korea and World War II. Ex-servicemen have spent \$242,000,000 to buy 3,000,000 acres of land under the program since it was first authorized in 1946.

Qualified veterans now can borrow up to \$10,000. Minimum amount of land that can be bought is 15 acres. Maximum interest rate on bonds is four and a half percent. Purchasers of land have 40 years to repay state loans. A five percent down payment and about \$150 in legal and appraisal fees is necessary to close a loan.

**DRAFT QUOTA UP**--Draft boards will have to provide 1,659 young Texans for the armed forces next month. This is the biggest monthly quota since 2,012 were called in November, 1966.

January quota is Texas' share of the national call for 34,000 men for the army, says Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director.

Local boards in Texas will forward 5,455 men in January for pre-induction examinations. They already have scheduled 3,485 for the exam in December.

**COURTS SPEAK**--State Supreme Court agreed with the lower courts that the election which resulted in consolidation of Robert Lee Independent School District and Silver Peak Common School District of Cooke County is valid.

High court granted writs of error and set for review these cases:  
A Bexar County man's claim he was disabled from cancer as result of assembling nuclear weapons.

A contractor's liability to the city of Midland for defects the city said developed in a swimming pool he constructed at a public park.

El Paso Jury verdict that cut a special condemnation commission award to an El Paso couple from \$6,685 to \$3,477 for property taken from them for freeway right-of-way.

Third Court of Civil Appeals here ruled that former State Savings and Loan Commission-

er James O. Gerst failed to follow the evidence in denying Houston First Savings Association an application for a branch office.

**MARTIN FILES SUIT**--Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin filed an \$846,000 civil penalty and injunction suit to stop alleged air pollution by seven garbage dump operators near Houston.

Suit seeks \$1,000 a day penalties from the date the new Clean Air Act went into effect, plus injunction. Hearing is set for January 4 in 151st District Court. It's the first major court test under the act. State Rep. Rex Braun of Houston earlier accused Martin of dragging his feet on complaints against dumps.

Later last week, Martin and two assistants argued a Permian Basin gas rate case before the U. S. Supreme Court. State maintains that the 14.5 cent rate for gas discovered January 1, 1961, and 16.5 cents for gas discovered after that date are inadequate to support the exploration program to sustain industry vitality. Loss of tax revenue due to rates proposed by the Federal Power Commission also would seriously affect the state, the attorney general claimed.

**TOURIST CONFERENCE SET**--A network of 10 Travel Trails showing how local communities can help themselves by promoting San Antonio's HemisFair '68 will be unveiled at the third annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference here January 17.

Trails were chosen from among nominations in 154 counties and state tourism people will be pushing these routes to out-of-staters visiting Texas and HemisFair. State will erect "Travel Trail" markers and design and publish maps to guide and inform the tourists.

Two panels of travel experts will join Gov. John Connally in encouraging communities to step up their tourist promotion.

A total of 7,000,000 visitors are expected at HemisFair, says HemisFair's Chief Executive Officer James M. Gaines who will keynote the conference. Two afternoon seminars are planned on developing special attractions and boosting them with publicity, photography and brochures.

**APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED**--Robert J. Derby, San Antonio attorney and former Texaco vice president, now is research director for Texas Constitutional Revision Commission. He has opened an office in the capitol.

A. F. (Tony) Rodriguez of San Antonio is the new assistant Republican state chairman, named to succeed Hilary Sandoval Jr. of El Paso.

Texas State Teachers Association named Charles B. Hamilton of Austin as director of its division of field operations and Lee Hicks, also of Austin, as TSTA field representative.

Chief Justice James G. Denton of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals has designated Bonham attorney Buster Cole as his statewide campaign manager in Denton's race for the State Supreme Court.

**HOLIDAY ACCIDENT DANGERS TOLD**--Col. Homer Garrison Jr., Texas Department of Public Safety director, estimates that 55 persons will die in traffic accidents over the Christmas weekend... and 45 on New Year's weekend.

All highway patrolmen will be on duty as much as possible during the December 22-25 danger period. Some 250 men from other uniformed services will aid in patrol duty. Similar "death watch" will be kept December 29-January 1.

Texas Safety Association, Texas Highway Department, Texas Motor Transportation Association, Texas Railroad Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters are cooperating.

Texas has received the American Automobile Association's Award of Merit for its outstanding pedestrian safety performance, as reported in National Pedestrian Safety Inventory for 1967.

**LOCAL PARKS FUNDS**-----More than \$10,000,000 has been allocated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in the two years since federal matching funds became available under the Federal Land and Water Conservation Act of 1965.

Approximately \$5,500,000 has been approved for state park projects and another \$4,600,000 for city, county and river-authority parks. Half of the money came from state coffers and half from the national government.

Four more state-park projects costing \$209,330 and three local projects figured at \$362,408 now are awaiting approval for federal aid by the Federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

**SHORT SNORTS**  
Secretary of State John L. Hill expects to resign about January 20 to run for governor.

Governor Connally says he plans to serve out his term as governor and has no prospects

for high government or private appointment.

Connally still insists no increase in state sales tax rate will be necessary to raise the money the state government must have in the 1968 special session.

Attorney General Martin has held that county tax assessor-collectors must deposit tax funds in county depository at least weekly, pending transfer to the county treasurer, and are subject to lawsuit if they don't.

Glenn Biggs, administrative aide to Speaker Ben Barnes, will join National Western Life Insurance Co. on January 1 as vice president in charge of development.

Texas Aeronautics Commission has set December 18 for hearings on the application for a new airline linking Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio at passenger rates 20 percent below current levels.

Major repairs to highway bridges damaged by Hurricane Beulah are among some \$15,000,000 in highway projects being bid on this week.

New lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council received an \$8,500 state regional planning grant for Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy County planning projects.

State Banking Board approved Central Park Bank, San Antonio, and El Paso Valley Bank.

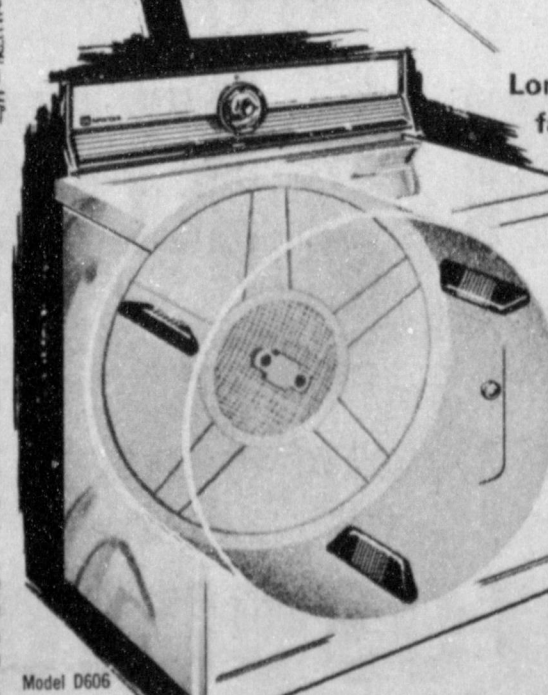
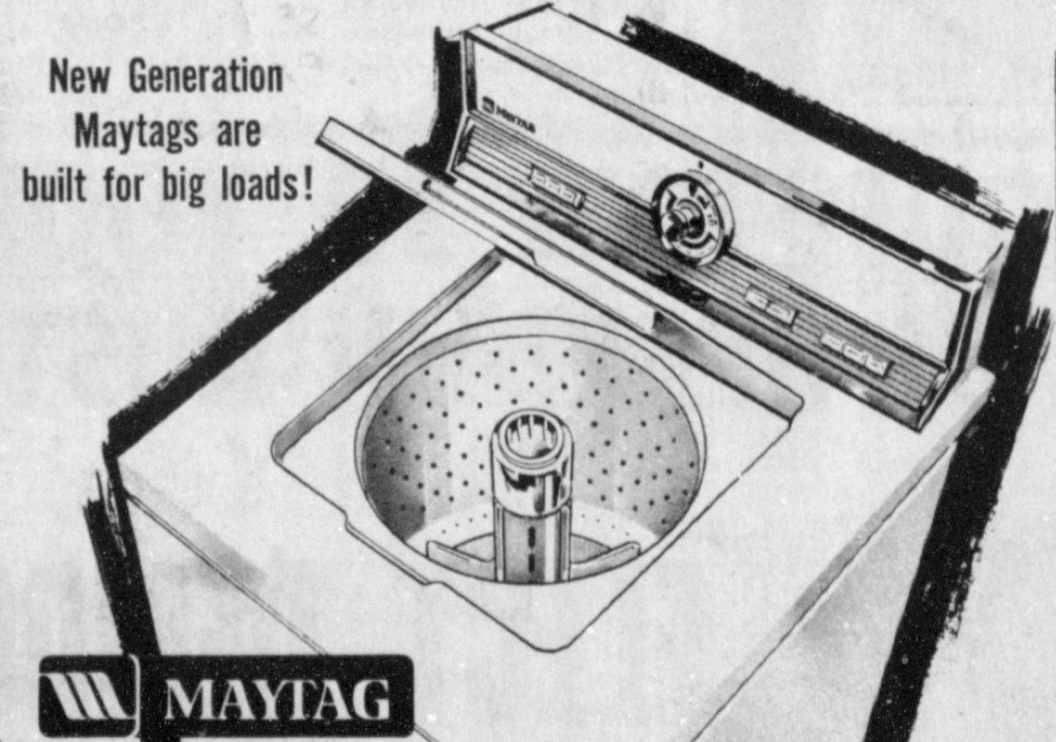

## Sample Receipts Decline At Area Classing Offices

Cotton sample receipts began a gradual decline at the USDA Lubbock and Brownfield Cotton Classing Offices this week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Estimates indicate that approximately 85 percent of this season's crop is now out of the fields in the Lubbock and Brownfield areas and 50 percent in the Lamesa area.

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa classed approximately 230,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 8. This brought the total classed at the three offices this season to 825,000.

Grades of cotton classed at the Lubbock office last week were lower than the previous week.

Strict Low Middling made up 16 percent of the total classed, Middling Light Spotted 44 percent, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 18 percent and Middling Spotted 13 percent.

Staple length was down and averaged between 15/16 and 31/32. Twenty-three percent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock office last week had staple lengths of 1-inch and longer compared to 33 percent the previous week. Thirty-nine percent stapled 15/16, 22 percent 31/32, 13 percent 1-inch and 10 percent was 1-1/32 and longer.

Micronaire continued the seasonal decline. Seventeen percent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 29 percent was in this category. Ten percent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 26 percent 3.0 through 3.2, 31 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 16 percent was 2.6 and below.

Forty-three percent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week had desirable Pressley readings of 80,000 pounds and higher, compared to 46 percent the previous week.

Cotton prices, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, were higher for the better micronaire cotton early last week and have remained steady since that time. Prices for this cotton ranged from \$6.50 per bale

over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton to \$75 per bale over the loan for high grade cotton having staple length of 1-3/32 and longer. Demand continued strongest for cotton having micronaire of 3.3 and better, and this cotton was selling at a greater premium over the loan. Cotton in the lower micronaire categories was generally selling at \$5 to \$15 per bale over the loan.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 20.10; Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 22.60; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 19.15; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 21.55; Middling Spotted 15/16 - 18.75 and Middling Spotted 31/32 - 19.60.

Cottonseed prices were steady and ranged from \$57 to \$72 per ton at the gins.

## Company Marks 4-Million Hours Injury Free

The 387 employees of Southwestern Public Service Company's 10 power plants have worked 4,000,000 man-hours without a lost-time injury. The four-million man-hour mark, which is being added to daily, was reached in mid-November, a check of plant safety records revealed.

The last disabling injury in one of the power plants occurred in March of 1963, and two of the plants, Carlisbad and Denver City, have each worked more than 1,000,000 man-hours without a lost-time injury.

Clifford A. Morrow of Amarillo is the safety and personnel supervisor for the production department.

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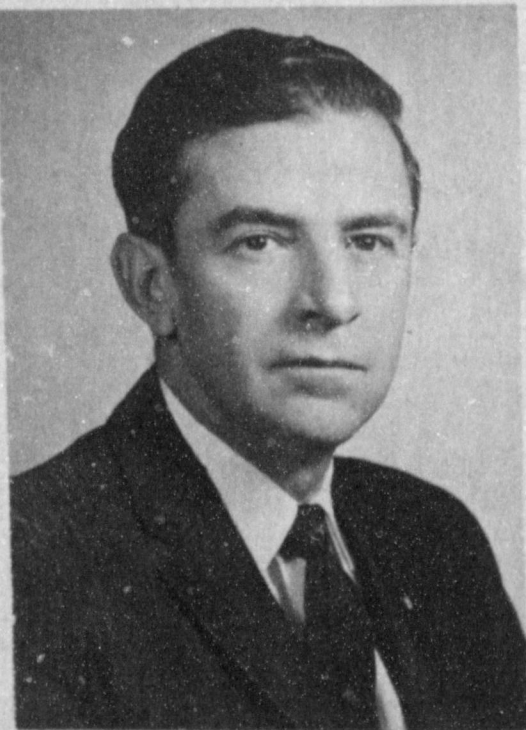
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
