3,438 Motor Vehicle Licenses Issued in County to April 1

Total of 3,438 car, truck, tractor and other vehicle licenses were issued in Haskell County prior to April 1, records in the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector R. A. Coburn show. This was a slight increase over last year, but it is believed that many vehicles remain yet to be registered in the county.

By groups, the registrations included 2,792 passenger cars, 227 commercial trucks, 334 farm trucks, six motorcycles and motor scooters, six dealers' licenses, 53 trailers and 20 truck tractors.

Owners of vehicles failing to register before April 1 will be subject to a 20 per cent penalty on the registration fee if the vehicle is operated on a state highway after April 1.

New Conservation Group at Funston To Be Developed

The district supervisors voted, during their regular meeting March 26, to give assistance to a new conservation group which was named Southeast Funston. This group is the seventeenth accepted and approved for work in the California Creek soil conservation district.

According to Jim McCulloch, chairman of the board, at this meeting conservation plans were signed into agreements on the following farms: C. V. Oates, J. L. Tubbs, J. C. Holt, August Balzer, Jack Terrell, A. L. McKeever, and D. C. Rister, Jr., and W. R. Redus. The acreage involved in these 8 agreements is 1644 and this brings the total of land under active agreement to 169,727 acres.

Congressman Mahon Says Funds for Cotton Insurance Payments Assured

Congressman George Mahon reports from Washington that final payment of all approved cotton crop insurance claims is now virtually assured. He advises that the House of Representatives passed a bill early this week providing adequate funds to pay all outstanding insurance claims on the 1946 cotton crop.

Mahon, a Member of the Appropriations Committee, was able to get the money included in a deficiency bill which was approved by the committee last Friday. Senate action must yet be taken, but the action of the House paves the way for early and successful termination of the matter.

In commenting on the situation, Mahon said, "The 20 million dollars for crop insurance which was placed in the bill on my motion and at my insistence will enable the Government to pay off all approved outstanding cotton insurance claims. There are 17 thousand such claims in Texas, a great part of which come from West Texas, the heaviest insured area. About one-half of this money will be used in paying Texas claims. I do not have accurate figures before me, but I estimate that the 146 insurance program will mean in excess of 10 million dollars to the cotton producers of our Congressional district."

"I realize that the cotton insurance program has been very imperfect and that it will be drastically modified for the crop year of 1948. But the claims on the 1946 crop are obligations of the Government and ought to be immediately honored. The total net loss to the Government on the 1946 cotton crop insurance program will be 42 million dollars."

"Manager Gus Geisler of the crop insurance program advises that he wants to rewrite and greatly restrict the 1948 cotton crop insurance program, probably placing it in only a few counties and on an experimental basis. Congressman Clifford Hope of Kansas, chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, has begun work on a revision of the present law. However, producers who went into the 1947 crop insurance program will undoubtedly be protected on their contracts."

John S. Hays, 82, Dies Wednesday After Long Illness

John Samuel Hays, 82, resident of Haskell County since 1911, died at Stamford Wednesday after a number of years of declining health. He would have been 82 on June 1.

Mr. Hays was born in Missouri and came to Texas with his parents as a young man. The family settled in Collin County near Walnut Grove, where he was married to Caddie Lou Smith April 22, 1894. He had been a member of the Baptist Church since boyhood.

Funeral services for the octogenarian were held Thursday afternoon, 4:00 o'clock, at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Miles B. Hays, pastor, officiated. Interment was in Willow Cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. Edgar Tudor of Throckmorton, Mrs. Lonnie Griffin of Amarillo, Mrs. Dalton Hilburn of Borger and Mrs. Roy Brock of Haskell; a sister, Mrs. Lizzy Leonard of Orange; eight grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Accumulation of Winter Rubbish to Be Moved in Drive

The week beginning Monday, April 14 has been designated as Annual Spring Clean-Up Week in Haskell by the City Council and cooperation of the entire citizenship is urged in making the campaign a success.

Care Needed In Cleaning Glass Cooking Ware
 Never use knives or rough scouring materials to clean glass cooking ware. Scraping with a knife or scouring with steel wool may scratch the protective surface of the utensil and cause the glass to crack. Even a slight scratch may make the glass less resistant to breakage. Louise Newman, county home demonstration agent has been advising Haskell County homemakers.

Generally, glass cooking utensils need only to be soaked in luke warm water and then washed in soap suds. This should clean them thoroughly enough. When baked food on the glass becomes hard to loosen, a little baking soda added to the soaking water will help to loosen these hardened foods. If some brownish stains still remain, you can remove them by rubbing with dry baking soda.

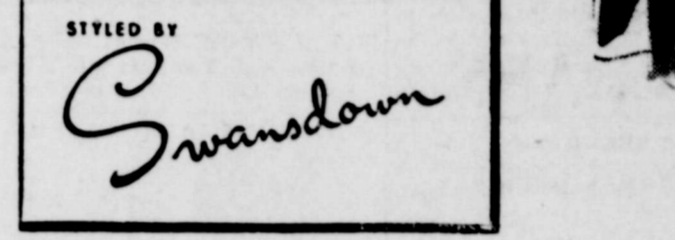

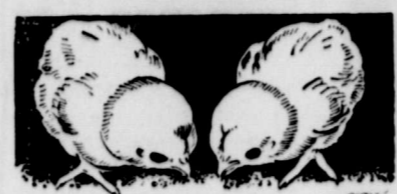


