Many Haskell Vets Retaining GI Insurance

Othey Cannon, Veterans Administration Itinerant Contact Representative serving Haskell said today that veterans in the Haskell area are responding to the advise "hold on to your G. I. Insurance", as evidenced by the great number who are flocking to the VA contact (Itinerant Station), located 3rd Floor, Court House in Haskell, to reinstate or convert their GI Insurance.

To Veterans in this area who have missed payments on their GI Insurance Cannon, said "It's not too late to reinstate. Under conditions made possible by a recent act of Congress, a veteran who has allowed his insurance to lapse, may reinstate it by paying only two monthly premiums and signing a statement that his health is as good as it was at the time of lapse."

It was pointed out that some veterans have been confused over the matter of converting G. I. Insurance. Due to miss information, a few veterans have been lead to believe that "converting" means dropping government life insurance and buying a policy in a private company. This, of course, is not only a mistake but an injustice to the veteran.

By converting the veteran retains his National Service Life Insurance and simply changes it from term insurance, the kind issued in the military service, to a permanent plan of National Service Insurance Cannon said.

The seed are delinted by a linter machine. Charge for delinting is \$1.00 per hundred weight of seed before delinted, and the lint that is removed from the seed.

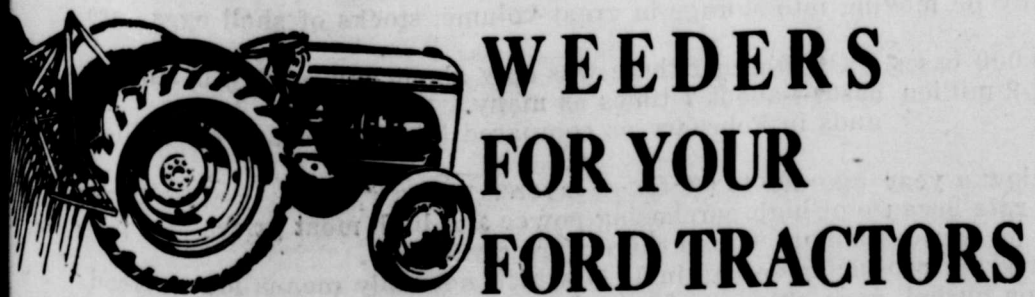

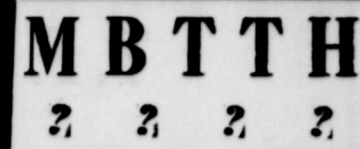

5. There were 55 million fewer chickens on farms January 1 than there were a year ago.
6. Virtually all signs point to an excellent grain producing season in 1947 which normally means lower feed prices. A record wheat crop and another 3 billion bushel corn crop are forecast.

Step Cotton Program Spreads Among Producers of State of Texas

making cotton a part of a balanced farm plan.

Step No. 2, "Take Care of Your Soil." In following this step, barnyard fertilizer was applied to cotton land on 7,128 Texas farms; 8,395 farmers planted cotton following legumes and phosphate fertilizers; and over 2000 farmers reported a decrease in cotton root rot by following Extension Service recommendations.

Step No. 3, "Get Together on the Best Variety." More than 36,000 farmers organized into 343 one variety cotton communities last year. By getting together and planting the variety best adapted to their community, these one variety farmers averaged 182 lbs. of lint per acre, when the average for the remainder of the state was 111 pounds. These producers received an extra \$36,000,000 for their cotton crop.

Step No. 4, "Make Your Labor Count." New labor saving machines are gradually finding their way in Texas cotton farming. There were 1,100 stripper type

cotton harvesting machines in operation last year; 26 farmers used picking machines; and 24 flame cultivators were operated.

Step No. 5, "Control Cotton Insects and Diseases." Since cotton insects ordinarily destroy one bale of cotton for every seven the farmer harvests, insect control is a big part of any cotton program. Martin reports that 27,841 growers recognized that fact and followed specific recommendations in properly treating 1,077,222 acres of cotton.

Step No. 6, "Pick and Gin for High Grade." Following the Extension Service's program, 322 cotton communities received assistance in getting clean, white cotton to the market. Over 1,400 gins in 147 counties applied for the free cotton classing service offered under the Smith-Duxey Act.

Step No. 7, "Sell for Grade, Staple and Variety Value." A marketing division was set up in 95 cotton improvement associations in the state, to give growers a better idea of what their cotton was actually worth, and to keep check on market prices. Nine communities also had cotton spinning tests made.

Much of the state's cotton will

be going into the ground soon. Martin says the Extension Service as well as many agencies and organizations in the state who have pledged support, is ready to help growers who want to fall in line with the Seven Step Cotton Program.

AN ORDINANCE DEFINING JUNK YARDS; DECLARING A JUNK YARD TO BE A PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING A MANNER FOR THE KEEPING OF A JUNK YARD, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of Haskell, Texas:

Section 1.—Definition: Junk yard within meaning of this ordinance shall be any place which is used to accumulate rubbish, scrap iron, junk pipe, worn-out, wrecked, and dismantled automobiles and parts thereof and other junk and refuse. All junk yards within the City of Haskell, Texas, and/or on the highway or roads outside the city limits and within a distance of five thousand (5,000) feet of said city limits, are a public nuisance. Junk yards, as hereinafter defined are unclean, unkept, unsightly, odorous, filthy and an eyesore, serve to detract from the appearance and character of and to discredit and disparage the City of Haskell, to depreciate the property values and to vex, annoy and threaten the security and welfare of the inhabitants of the City of Haskell and the property values of said inhabitants.

Section 2.—It is therefore ordered that all junk yards within the City of Haskell, Texas, and outside the city limits for a distance of five thousand feet, located upon or within three hundred feet of any highway or road which enters said city, shall, except as to the point of entry and exit into and out of any such junk yard or any railway switch or spur, be completely enclosed and screened by a solid, unbroken fence, not less than six (6) feet high, stoutly and well built of good material, and which shall at all times be maintained and kept in good repair and condition. And no junk shall be piled in any such junk yard higher than six inches below the top of the fence.

Section 3.—Any violation of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars for each offense, and each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4.—The fact that there are several junk yards, as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, operating within the City Limits of the City of Haskell creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this ordinance be passed, and requires that the rules calling for ordinances to be read at three several meetings of the City Council be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage and it is so ordained.

Passed, approved and adopted the 25th day of March, A. D. 1947.

Queries of Veterans Answered

Question. Can the beneficiary or the family of a veteran make premium payments on his National Service Life Insurance of the veteran doesn't care to do so?

A. Yes, but the insured veteran has the right to change his beneficiary at any time without consulting with or receiving the approval of anyone. He may also surrender his permanent NSLI policy for cash at anytime.

Q. I am drawing retirement pay at present. Can I receive subsistence allowance while going to school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act?

A. You are entitled to draw retirement pay and still receive the full amount of subsistence allowance while in school or training. Retirement pay is not considered income from productive labor and therefore is not to be included by the veteran in his estimate of earnings filed with Veterans Administration.

Q. I obtained a G. I. home loan in June, 1945, and now would like to know if I may obtain further loan under the amended G. I. Bill?

A. Yes. Evidently your guarantee under the original Servicemen's Readjustment Act was \$2-

Q. Will my 10 percent World War disability of \$13.80 be increased if I marry?

A. No. Your compensation is based on the degree of disability and not on the number of dependents.

Q. I am an ex-WAC with an honorable discharge. I am contemplating marriage to a non-veteran and would like to know if I lose any of my rights under the G. I. Bill

A. No.

When cooking it in the oven use a very low heat. Cooking cheese dishes in a double boiler or over water is best for those not baked.

Another cheese cooking rule: Add cheese to other ingredients in very small bits rather than in small pieces. When grated or shaved thin the cheese will spread more evenly in a mixture, will prevent lumping, and will require less cooking.

Rule number three is aimed at preventing curdling in cheese dishes. When possible, blend the cheese in a smooth sauce before adding to a food mixture. A white sauce with cheese melted in it may be poured over cooked vegetables or scalloped dishes before baking. By combining cheese with the sauce while it is hot and not returning the sauce to the heat most of the curdling in cheese dishes can be avoided.

Veterans' News

A sharp upward trend in World War II veteran enrollment in Southwestern colleges and universities for the 1947-48 school year is predicted by both Veterans Administration and school officials.

Veterans studying in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi colleges now number approximately 58,000. Veterans enrolled in higher institutions of learning throughout the nation number about 1,100,000.

The peak of veteran enrollment in colleges and universities is expected during the next school year, according to VA surveys. After that, a gradual decline is predicted.

Laws under which veterans enroll for education specify that the program must be concluded nine years after the formal termination of World War II.

Nearly half the blinded veterans of World War II either are working or in training for employment, a Veterans Administration survey shows.

The survey, made by VA's Vocational Rehabilitation and Education staff, included 1,133 blinded veterans who had been discharged by the Army and Navy up to November 30, 1946.

Twenty-eight per cent were working. Another 20 per cent were in vocational rehabilitation training.

Professional and scientific courses, particularly social work, teaching and law, accounted for the largest number of veterans who were going to school. Agriculture was second.

Nearly half the blinded veterans with full-time jobs were in industrial occupations, chiefly as machine operators and assemblers. Another large group was in business and sales work.

Self-employed blind veterans were found to be engaged in such occupations as general farming, chicken raising, citrus farming, fishing bait business operators, magazine agencies, gift shops, trucking business, mechanics, musicians, clerks and tourist cabin operators.
