4H Club Boys Given Seed For Projects

Twenty-seven 4-H club boys in Haskell county have been given enough certified Caprock sorghum seed to plant 5 acres of land. The seed were given to the club boys by the Burlington Railroad Company through their Agricultural Agent A. K. Hepperly.
The purpose of the grain sorghum demonstration is to get better planting seed in the county. Each boy is given the seed and he agrees to sell his neighbors planting seed at market prices if he makes a crop.
The grain sorghum will all be planted in April and the boy making the largest yield will receive \$25.00 in cash; second place \$15.00; and third place \$10.00. The money awards were made available through W. L. Richey and the International Harvester agency of Haskell.

Mr. Neely of this city joined his brother from Houston at Texarkana and they went to Nashville for the funeral.

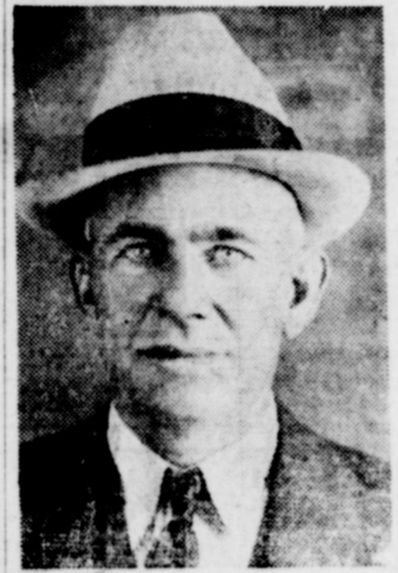
Mrs. H. K. Baker Dies In Ft. Worth

Mrs. Harlan K. Baker of Fort Worth, the former Laura Huckabee of this city, died of a heart attack Friday at 5:15 p. m. in All Saints Hospital in that city where she had gone to visit her husband who was a patient in the hospital receiving treatment for first and second degree burns.
Mrs. Baker, 52, was the daughter of Mrs. W. N. Huckabee of this city and visited in the home of her mother during Easter.
Mr. Baker was burned Wednesday when a spark from a fumigation machine ignited gas from a leaky gas jet in their home. His condition is painful but not serious.
Funeral service for Mrs. Baker was held at 2 p. m. Monday at Hemphill Presbyterian Church in Ft. Worth with Rev. Robt. Boshen conducting. Interment was in Rose Hill cemetery in that city.
In addition to her husband, other survivors are a son, John Baker; a daughter Nancy Baker, all of Fort Worth; her mother; and two sisters, Mrs. Marvin Post of Denver City and Miss Eunice Huckabee, Wichita Falls.

John R. Watson, Former Commissioner, Pioneer In Soil Conservation Practices

John R. Watson, California Creek soil conservation district supervisor pictured above, has been using some practices of conservation farming since 1915. He states that he has not grown cotton any two years in succession on the same tract of land since that time.

Watson has farmed in Haskell County since 1903 and all of this in the Paint Creek conservation group with the exception of the first three years. The two farms owned and operated by him, are owned and operated by him, are under district agreement and the conservation plans on both have been completed.

The Haskell county district supervisor constructed his first terraces in 1925 which were the sharp narrow type constructed with a small blade machine. These naturally were unsatisfactory, and had to be widened through several years operations before they were suitable to cultivation. Fifty acres of cultivated land was terraced this year to complete the practice.

Watson uses a one-way plow to attain "stubble mulching" of applicable crop residues and when deep tillage is needed to break up a "plow sole" or tight layer of soil he uses a middle buster and lists the ground deeper than normal. A pond was constructed on the home farm in '44 being planned and staked by SCS

with ample temporary pasturage such as sudan and small grain grazing in order that the permanent pastures may be given proper use. Five acres of cultivated land was seeded to perennial vegetation three years ago. Four acres were seeded to Madrid sweet clover this spring to improve the soil and furnish additional grazing.
Watson was elected supervisor for subdistrict 1 in 1943 to succeed C. G. Burson of Haskell

Two Road Projects Now Underway

Construction work is expected to start at an early date on a 7 mile stretch of paved road which will connect Paint Creek School with Highway 24, county officials said this week.
Commissioner M. B. Cobb of Precinct 3, in which the project is located, said that practically all the right of way for the new road has been secured with the exception of some property owners. Fences are being moved along the right of way where necessary, this work being done by the county without cost to the property owners.
The new road will be built by the State Highway Department and will consist of caliche base and asphalt coating, similar to the Haskell-Rule highway.
In Precinct 2, a road improvement project is underway on the road from Brannon filling station north toward the Mattson community. This work is being supervised by Commissioner Alfred Turnbow of Precinct 2.

Three persons, two Haskell women and a Haskell negro man, were killed and three other persons were seriously injured in a head-on collision of two automobiles four and one-half miles south of Haskell on the Stamford highway about 8:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Mrs. Christyne Watson Wilson, 31, and Vastene Adams, Haskell negro mechanic, died instantly; and Miss Alfa Marie Huff, 33, succumbed of chest injuries 15 minutes after admission to the Haskell County Hospital.
Stanley McMillin, 30, Army veteran, and Miss Hazel Sellers, 23, who with Miss Huff were riding in the 1946 Ford driven by Mrs. Wilson, were seriously injured. The third injured person, Lucy Wilson Hall, negro woman from Seattle, Wash., who was visiting in Haskell and who was riding in the 1935 Ford car driven by Adams, was also rushed to the local hospital.

McMillin, son of W. B. McMillin, and whose condition was described as very serious by hospital attendants, suffered severe head injuries and a fractured right leg. Miss Sellers, the least injured of the victims, sustained a broken right leg.

The negro woman was treated for a fractured leg and severe body bruises and lacerations.
Both automobiles were completely demolished in the crash, which was investigated by Sheriff Mart Clifton, Deputy Doss Fuller and Highway Patrolman Keith Whitt of Stamford. It was believed that a light mist or fog was a contributing factor of the accident.

The car driven by Mrs. Wilson was traveling south and the one occupied by the negro couple was approaching Haskell when the accident occurred.

M. B. Cobb and Alfred Turnbow, Haskell county commissioners, and Bob Cousins, were the first to arrive at the scene and immediately summoned an ambulance from Holden Funeral Home.
Mrs. Wilson is survived by her mother, Mrs. Hugh Watson, and a small daughter, Johnnie Lou, of Haskell; a sister, Mrs. C. R. Blake of Breckenridge; and two brothers Thomas Watson of Haskell, and Hughie C. Watson, Sweetwater.

Funeral service for the young woman was held at the First Baptist Church Thursday at 4 p. m. with Rev. C. A. Powell of Rule conducting. Interment was in Willow Cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

Miss Huff, a Haskell beauty operator, is survived by her father, T. P. Huff of Hart, Texas; two sisters, Mrs. A. E. Wheatley of Mulenshoe, Texas; Mrs. L. A. Warden, of Andrews; and three brothers Ralph and Marvin Huff of Earth, Texas; and Loys Huff of Lubbock. Funeral service for Miss Huff was held at the Baptist Church in Earth, and interment was in the Earth cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.
Funeral service for the third victim, Vastene Adams, will be held Friday afternoon. The negro had been employed as a mechanic in the Gene Tonn garage for several years. He is survived by his widow and five children.

Cuttings Planted Now Will Insure Orchard Growth

Many of the common shrubs, trees and vines may be grown easily from cuttings, and although they can be planted most any month of the year, cuttings set out early will give larger plants to put out in the open ground next fall.

Louise Newman, county home demonstration agent, outlines this procedure for selecting and planting cuttings: Choose a limb that grew last year about the thickness and length of a new pencil. Be sure you select a healthy, unbruised cutting. If the plant has leaves two or three left at the top of the cutting will make food for the new plant.

Plant your cuttings in rows 4 to 6 inches apart in the garden or in a cutting bed. Leave only an inch or two out of the ground. If the cutting has no leaves, see that at least one strong bud is growing about an inch from the top.

Planting four or five extra cuttings for each plant that you actually need is a smart move, then the surplus plants can be exchanged with neighbors, or given as presents when rooted in pots or cans or boxes.

Sharp, clean sand rooting soil, is best, but Texas gardeners have been very successful in rooting cuttings in all soil types which grow crops in the state. But good drainage and plenty of moisture are necessary for growing young plants. A two or three inch mulch and half shade promote growth in the summer.

Almost all our plants, shrubs and trees can be grown from cuttings except a few like peaches, pears, pines, oaks, cherry laurel, photinia and Arizona cypress. These may be grown from seed.

Pecan Pest Insect Can Be Controlled

Haskell County pecan growers, from the man with two trees in his back yard to the man with a large grove, may want to join in a fight to grow more nuts this year.

The battle going on is against an insect called the pecan nut case-bearer, and he is a tough little enemy. County Agent F. W. Martin quotes Entomologist Paul Gregg of the Texas A and M. College Extension Service, as saying that the nut case-bearer sometimes destroys up to three-fourths of the total Texas pecan crop. However, the insect can be controlled by spraying at the right time, says Gregg.

The effective spraying period against the nut case-bearer is short, and it varies with the season and locality, the entomologist says. In general, however, the growers have found that spraying as soon as possible after the nuts have set is effective. When the blossom end of the nut turns brown, it is time to start the spraying campaign. This stage of growth is coming up soon in most of Texas' pecan groves.

Entomologists have worked out a new spray mixture that has given the case-bearer plenty of trouble. The mixture is composed of six pounds of lead arsenate, one pint of nicotine sulfate and three quarts of summer oil emulsion in 100 gallons of water. The old spray mixture that growers have used for a long time is still effective—six pounds of lead arsenate in 100 gallons of water. DDT is also showing much promise against the case-bearer, Gregg says. Six pounds of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder to 100 gallons of water is the recommended mixture.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I was discharged from the U. S. Army because my mother was dependent on me. Am I eligible to enter a course of education or training?

A. Yes. The fact that you were discharged from the service because of dependency of your mother would not be material if you are otherwise qualified.

No, your compensation will not be increased; but during the time you are being rehabilitated, you will receive your disability compensation plus subsistence allowance to bring you up to \$105 a month if you do not have a dependent. Additional amounts will be added for each dependent or dependent.

Q. I am being rehabilitated under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16). Am I entitled to a vacation during the summer, and will I continue to receive subsistence allowance during the vacation?

Generates Static Over Plans for Race Track Former Haskell Youth, Now Oil Millionaire,

According to daily newspaper dispatches from Houston, an oil millionaire of that city who lived in Haskell as a youth has generated plenty of static over his plans to build a \$1,500,000 race-track near Houston, and for which he assertedly received approval of CPA for materials required for the project.

He is George Echols, who lived here during his boyhood, from 1905 until 1908. He is a cousin of John E. Robison, local filling station operator and automobile dealer.

Echols jumped into a hornet's nest when he tangled with Baptist preachers on horse racing, but now he has a veterans' group in Houston demanding some answers in regard to his proposed swank racing park. They have asked the Dallas regional office of the Civilian Production Administration for a "satisfactory explanation" as to why Echols was granted permission to build the race track. "We are not opposed to horse racing," the organization leaders

said, "but we do not believe that critical materials should be used at this time for a race track."

Echols drew a storm of protest from Baptist church leaders on his horse racing plans. Then he withdrew a \$10,000 gift to Baylor medical college, which is controlled by the Baptist church.

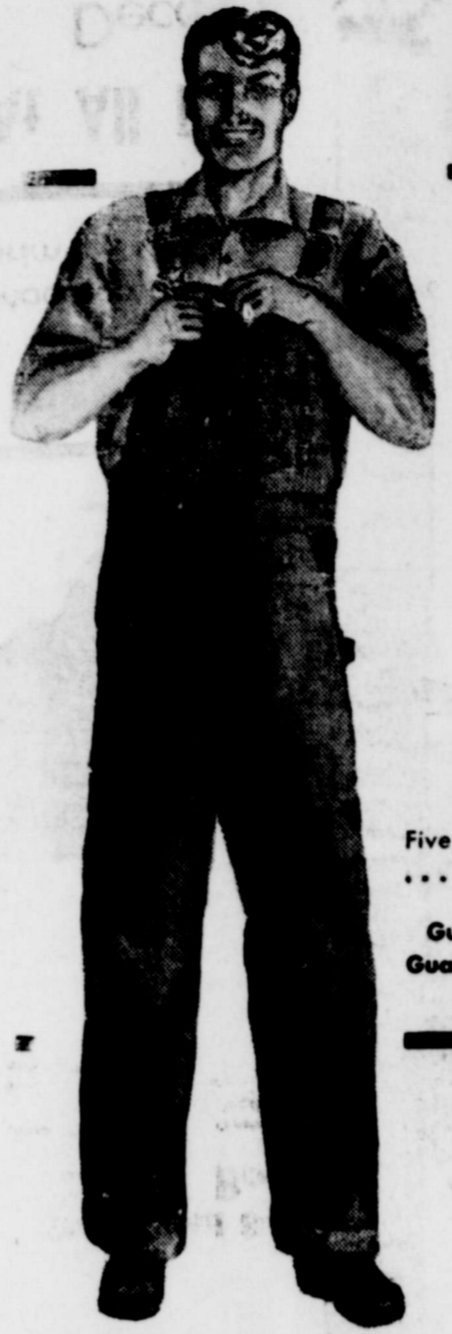
