



Other electrical "dont's" around the house are: Don't hang extension cords over nails, or run them through doors or underneath rugs; don't use worn cords on lamps and appliances; don't let clothing, draperies, or other inflammable materiais come close to light bulbs.

Tabulated in the expenditures are costs for counseling, supplies, equipment, tuition, subsistence allowances and increased payments over pensions due to vocational training for disabled vet-

Care In Harvest Adds to Quality Of Hay Crop

Haskell County farmers can profit by using better methods of harvesting, curing and storing hay, because it could mean a big rise in the quality of hay that is produced on Texas farms at this season every year, according to W. Martin, County Agent.

The time of harvesting a hay rop, says Martin, has more to do with turning out good hay than many producers realize. When the crop is allowed to get too ripe, it becomes coarse and loses a great deal of its feed value, especially rotein. Sudan grass and Johnson grass need cutting as soon as the first seed heads begin to form. or even eariler, to get a bale rich in feed value, Martin pointed out. Producers have found that alfalfa makes the richest hay if cut when the field is about one-tenth to one-fourth in bloom. Sweet clover is best cut before it begins to

Curing has a lot to do with the way hay turns out, too. Grass hay may be left in the swath until fairly well cured, Martin explained, but legume hay, like alfalfa, clovers, and cowpeas, will suffer big loss of leaves through shattering if it is not raked into windrows soon after cutting. The leaves contain most of the feed value, so it's the wise farmer who gets his legume hay shocked before the leaves begin to shatter.

Of the terraces built with the county rig in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service, only two gave way, and one of the mwas on a farm where the terracing system had not been completed.

Shelton Hainey, Flomot farmer, has a "syrup pan" system that catches water from about 700 acres. After the rains, Hainey told County Agent Emmons that the terraces held perfectly: each lister ridge was full of water. He figures that the rainfall he saved with his terraces will make a lot of difference next July when the weather turns hot and dry.
