Sidelights From Washington

Congress is scheduled to convene on July 26, one week from the day this is being written. Legislative decisions are now being made rapidly. Tax reduction legislation was killed for the session when the Senate voted to sustain the President's veto on the second tax bill. Very likely in 1948 Congress will pass, and the President will approve, a more equitable tax bill than the one which Congressman Knutson has tried twice to enact into law this year.

It is now a foregone certainty that the Senate will approve the terminal leave bill for enlisted men which we passed in the House sometime ago. This will mean that ex-servicemen can convert their terminal leave bonds to cash if they desire on or after September 2, 1947.

The Presidential Succession bill has now become the law. It provides that Speaker Joe Martin, a Republican, would become President in the event of the death or resignation of Mr. Truman. I was surprised to observe on the final roll call on the bill that I was one of only 11 Members of the House voting against the measure. I feel that when the people

elect a President of one political Party for a four year term that such Party should remain in power under our system of Government until the next Presidential Election. I agree that it would be all right for a Democratic Speaker or for a Republican Speaker to succeed a Democratic President or to succeed a Republican President, but not otherwise.

The so-called Stratton bill to admit into the United States from Europe 400,000 displaced persons has been sidetracked for the session. I have all sympathy for the unfortunate peoples of foreign lands, but I have resisted action by Congress to admit these 400,000 immigrants. We have enough problems without admitting all these people, many of whom would be malcontents and trouble makers. We have fed them and protected them abroad, but we should not be required to share our country with them.

Final action on the Agricultural Appropriations bill will soon be taken. It now appears that substantially all AAA payments which were authorized for the 1947 crop year will be paid.

A few days ago we had our final meeting of the session of the Texas Congressional delegation in Washington. Words of admiration and praise were spoken for the late Congressman Mansfield of the Galveston District, who passed away a short time ago. Judge Mansfield was one of the most amazing men I have ever known. Although he was 86 years of age at the time of his death, and had been confined to a wheel chair for about 20 years, he was remarkably effective as a legislator. Everybody liked him and trusted him. Prior to the last election he was Chairman of one of the important Committees of Congress and performed a great national service in that capacity. The Judge was never heard to complain of his handicap and his ever cheerful disposition won him the title of the most beloved man in the House.

Congressman Ewing Thomason of the El Paso District is retiring from Congress next week to become Federal Judge in the Western District of Texas. He is one of the top Texans in Washington and his influence will be greatly missed. Like the late Judge Mansfield, he is one of the favorites of the Texas delegation.

This leaves Texas with 19 members of the House, but the two vacancies are to be filled in elections in the Districts involved on August 23rd.

Veterans News

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Q. Does my right to obtain a guaranteed loan continue indefinitely?

A. No, but you have until 10 years after the official termination of World War II.

Q. Are there any charges for guaranteeing or insuring a GI loan?

A. No commission, brokerage and similar charges may not be legally made against the veteran for securing a guaranteed or insured loan. Of course, customary out of pocket fees usually borne by the borrower, such as appraisal, title examination fees and other costs and expenses incident thereto, may be charged against the veteran by the lender, the same as against all borrowers.

Q. What will happen if I do not make my loan payments?

A. That depends upon the terms of your loan, the attitude of the lender and the laws of the State where the veteran and security are located. If payments are not made when due, the loan is in default and the lender may take such action as is provided in the loan agreement and is permitted by the state law and by the regulations for guaranty and insurance of loans.

Q. Does Veterans Administration make loans or find a lender for me?

A. Veterans Administration does not make loans, nor does it find a lender for the veteran. VA is not permitted to make loans. Within the limitations established by law, it guarantees or insures the repayment of a part of the loans made by lenders to veterans. In addition, Veterans Administration pays the lender as a credit on the loan 4 per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. The veteran is not required to repay this amount.

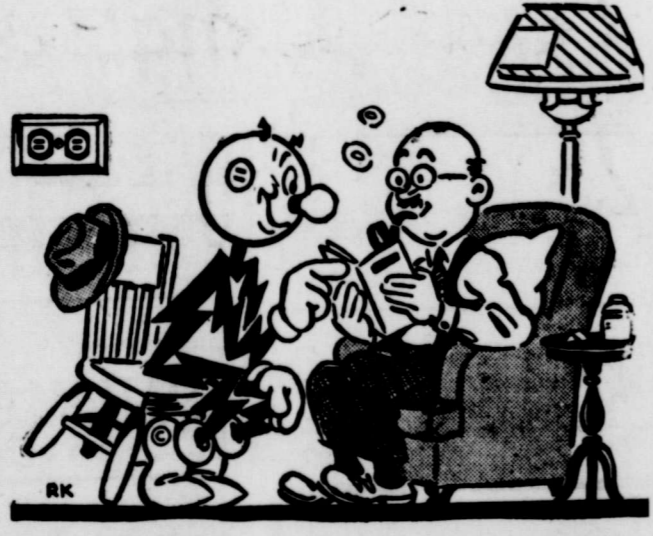

Anson Stock Farmer Will Defer Grazing to Re-Seed Pastures

W. D. Baker of Anson has recently sold all of the cattle on his stock farm located northeast of Anson and plans to defer his pastures the rest of the summer. This will allow the grass to increase in vigor and spread from re-seeding. A few years ago Baker contour furrowed one of the pastures on his farm. He said that this pasture had been overstocked with dairy cattle and was in a very poor condition before he contour furrowed it. The additional moisture held on the pasture was needed to maintain and increase the grass cover. The deferment permitted the grasses to become mature and more vigorous.

Baker also raised vetch and rye this year on his farm south of Lueders. He observed that grazing these crops, which are high in protein, was comparable to corn in increasing the weight of hogs.

New Traffic Code Does Not Prohibit Hitchhiking

Contrary to inaccurate reports, the new Uniform Traffic Code does not prohibit hitchhiking, Geo. Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association, said in Austin.

The code, which goes into effect September 5, was supported by the Texas Safety Association and 58 statewide cooperating groups in the recent session of the legislature as a safety measure.

The two line subsection of the traffic code pertaining to hitchhikers reads:

"No person shall stand in a roadway for the purpose of soliciting a ride from the driver of any vehicle."

A roadway is defined in the bill as "that portion of the highway improved, designed or ordinarily used for vehicular travel."

The bill defines a highway as "the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel."

Clarke emphasized that the bill does not forbid any person to stand on the shoulder of the road for the purpose of soliciting a ride from a driver.

He said that it is a prevalent practice in the state for hitchhikers to stand on the concrete or corrugated surface of the road, and that this action constitutes a definite hazard to the hitchhiker, as well as to traffic.

Daily Attention to Dental Hygiene Is Advised

The fact that dental decay may occur in the mouth of the average person, despite proper home care given the teeth, does not lessen the importance of brushing the teeth and massaging the gums daily, nor does it minimize the need for a cleaning and inspection of the teeth twice a year by the family dentist. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that the lack of these measures gives added power to germs that attack the enamel of the teeth and gum tissues.

"If, despite the practice of proper oral hygiene, decay is suspected or teeth are injured in any way, the thoughtful person will seek the dentist's office promptly for the necessary corrective work," Dr. Cox said.

"It is surprising, though, even in these days of comparatively painless dentistry, that so many persons neglect to have their dental defects corrected, because they foolishly fear the discomfort they might experience in the dentist's chair. There are others who have lost a tooth or several teeth make no effort to obtain replacements. Apparently they believe they can get along without them. Reduced masticating power, the annoyance and sometimes actual discomfort of chewing hard substances on the exposed gums, and crooked teeth are some of the possible consequences of gaps in the teeth."

Young Children Are Most Susceptible To Summer Ills

This is the season when dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint" are most prevalent over the State, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents of young children regarding the prevention of these diseases.

"The chief causes of these intestinal diseases are impure milk, water and food; allowing a child to become overheated; using too much sugar and cream in the diet; and under or overfeeding," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and left over should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox said definitely that when a feeding formula for infants is used, it should be prescribed by a physician and then prepared with extreme care, especially in regard to cleanliness and refrigeration. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule. Their stomach and bowels can become easily upset if they are fed haphazardly whenever they happen to be fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that with dysentery, as with many other diseases, the fly is an agent of transmission, and every home should be well screened and free of flies.

"If diarrhea or dysentery develops, consult a physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so called summer complaint can become a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

Veterans Advised Against Holding Uncashed Checks

Uncashed readjustment allowance checks, outstanding six months or more, will be cancelled August 1, Clay Beaver, manager of the Texas Employment Commission today warned veterans in the Haskell area. Veterans' checks for both unemployment and self employment will be affected by this new order.

The Employment Commission is acting on new orders from the Veterans Administration in Washington. As Texas agent of the VA, the Commission administers Title V of the GI Bill of Rights. Title V provides financial aid to unem-

Beaver has just received notice from the State Office of the Commission in Austin that checks six months old or older will no longer be valid after the first of August. He suggested that all veterans having such checks in their possession immediately cash them.

He said there were no existing records showing how many checks were outstanding in particular localities but that throughout the State more than 2,000 warrants, unless cashed this month, will be affected by the Veterans Administration order.

Beaver said that the Commission was trying to give the veterans a break by giving them advance notice of the August 1 action. It is imperative, he explained, that veterans holding six-months old checks cash them immediately.

Mary Lee Taylor's Snowball Puddings with Peach Sauce
Broadcast: July 26, 1947

½ cup sifted cake flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
few grains salt
3 tablespoons soft shortening
2 cups canned, sliced peaches and juice

½ teaspoon vanilla
½ cup sugar
1 well-beaten egg
2½ tablespoons Pet Milk
1½ tablespoons water

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Mix shortening and vanilla. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Beat in egg. Add flour mixture alternately with mixture of milk and water. Fill 4 greased custard cups ¾ full. Set in pan containing an inch of hot water. Cover cups with waxed paper. Bake 35 min., or until puddings shrink from sides of cups. Serve with drained, sliced peaches and peach sauce made by stirring ½ cup peach juice into mixture of 3 tablesp. sugar, 2 tablesp. cornstarch, ¼ teasp. salt and 1 teasp. grated lemon rind. Boil and stir 10 min.; cool, stir in ½ cup Pet Milk and 1 teasp. butter. Serves 4.
