For the first time in the history the United States a President has vetoed a bill passed by Congress for reduction of taxes. Traditionally, it has been considered proper for Congress to hold the purse strings and determine expenditures. Consequently, when Congress has spoken on the subject the President has always accepted the verdict with regard to lowering taxes. This time the bill passed both Houses with a large majority and still was vetoed

by the President-something new. Financial experts are now predicting a considerable surplus in the budget at the end of the fiscal year. Much capital is being held back because of various discouragements including high taxes and uncertain industrial relations. Had these brakes been on during preceding generations they would have prevented the development of the railroads, the automobile industry, the refrigeration industry, and the airplane industry. Our nation would have been much poorer today and we would have been living on a lower income level.

No serious delays in payment of subsistence allowances are anticpated, but VA is advising student veterans to be able to meet personal financial obligations for at least the first six weeks of the fall term.

The time lapse between date of enrollment and receipt of the first check involves two factors. First, a veteran generally is not entitled to receive a subsistence allowance until he has been in training for 30 days. Secondly, all checks are mailed normally on the first of the month, covering the allowance due for the previous month. For that reason, a veteran enrolling in the latter part of September ordinarily would not receive his first check any earlier than the first of

Wages and Baskets

real basket of food, according to the American Federation of La-bor, is a good unit to use in measuring income. That is, how many baskets of food will your wages buy? The Federation's "Monthly Survey" for July has put together some interesting figures comparing wages in America in 1940 with wages in Europe in 1940. These figures are in terms of baskets containing items for adequate nourishment. An American family of five would need about four of these baskets a day

One hour's work by a factory worker in the United States in 1940, according to the A. F. of L., would buy 2.83 baskets. In Britain an hour of work would buy 1.26 baskets. In France, 1.11; in Germany, 1.02; in be at the Wooten Hotel in Abi. These figures are in keeping with personal observations in Europe in 1936 and again in 1946. The amoun of food a worker could buy with his wages was in direct proportion to er enjoyed in his own country. Russia had the least individual freedom and the lowest wages. America had the most freedom and the highest wages.

Taxes must be lowered enough that the ordinary man can keep a larger percentage of his earnings, and so that men will be inspired to invest and venture into business enterprise. We need to overhaul the federal budget, to get rid of wasteful and inflationary government spending. We need firm but friendly industrial relations.

If these things were achieved, they could do much to preserve the essential ingredient of our system of high wages and high standards of living in this land of the free.
