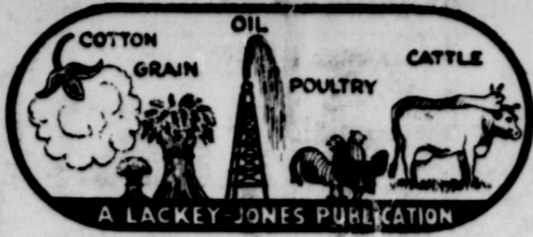

## Haskell County Farmers Invest \$295 In Building Up Soil

Haskell county farmers have invested \$294,259.01 in soil during the last four years, according to John W. Williams, chairman of the county soil conservation district. These figures are the result of a survey by Joe S. Harper, secretary of the Haskell County Soil Conservation District, whose office the district work practices.

Various governmental agencies have contributed to the work. ## Funeral Service for Dean McCoy Wright Held Friday

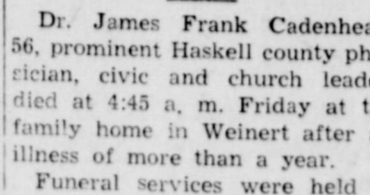

## '47 Cotton Ginnings Show Big Gain

Haskell County's cotton yield this year, which was foreseen as a "short" crop in late summer, is turning out to be one of the best in years on the basis of yield, and definitely the best from a financial standpoint.

Census report shows that 24,814 bales of cotton were ginned in the county from the crop of 1947 prior to Nov. 1, as compared with 9,182 bales for the crop of 1946, according to Virgil A. Brown, special agent for the Department of Commerce.

In Haskell, the five local gins had processed 7,2716 bales up to Wednesday morning, with ginning being resumed this week after a ten day shutdown due to rain.

A quick relish for your Thanksgiving dinner is the orange-cranberry relish. Put four cups of raw cranberries which have been washed through the food chopper with two medium sized oranges which have been quartered and seeded but not peeled. Then mix well with enough sugar to suit your taste — usually about two cups of sugar is required for this amount of cranberries.

Variations of this relish might be the addition of two diced apples added with the oranges; or 1/2 cup each of diced carrots and celery; one cup of fresh grapefruit segments; or crushed pine apple.

Miss Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist for Texas A. & M. College, says that it is easy to get an attractive and interesting garden. The first thing he does to give a garden a new way is planting too close to the house, especially when the shrubs are small. Plants which are planted too near a building will be crowded and have a poor shape. Long limbs will scrape paint from the house or ruin screens. The second mistake is that the amateur will often plant too many shrubs. The well-planned landscape will look rather barren for the first few years. After that the shrub growth will fill out the bare spots. Large growing plants such as Arizona cypress, wax ligustrum, cherry laurel and evergreen privet need ten feet or more feet of space. Other plants and shrubs need space in proportion to their full growth.

"Whom Shall I Send?" Is Theme Picture Of Presbyterian Youth Fellowship

Washington, Nov. 24—Facing squarely what it terms the "moral crisis before us today," the National Education Association's Department of Elementary School Principals released today a 351-page report, "Spiritual Values in the Elementary School," directed toward perfecting the teaching of human values in the nation's elementary schools.

Haskell is represented in the group which published the report by Mrs. L. R. Burkett, a member of the NEA Department of Elementary School Principals.

Defining as "spiritual values" the understanding of responsibility to society, dignity of fellowman, and broader sense of artistic and ethical appreciation, the report strives to inspire elementary schools to emphasize these values.

The report, in the form of a practical case book guide, is developed upon the theme that spiritual values, good or bad, are constantly being developed by the grammar school child. The elementary school must channel this development so that important spiritual values result.

As a guide for educators, the following are cited as responsibilities of the school: (1) Teachers and principal must be aware that some kind of learning is going on constantly either to build up or tear down spiritual values; (2) Those responsible for the school must, therefore, develop an atmosphere that will "help the spirits of children to grow into something fine."

Included are case histories of experiments and experiences of teachers in 20 states dealing with specific problems in the development of spiritual values.

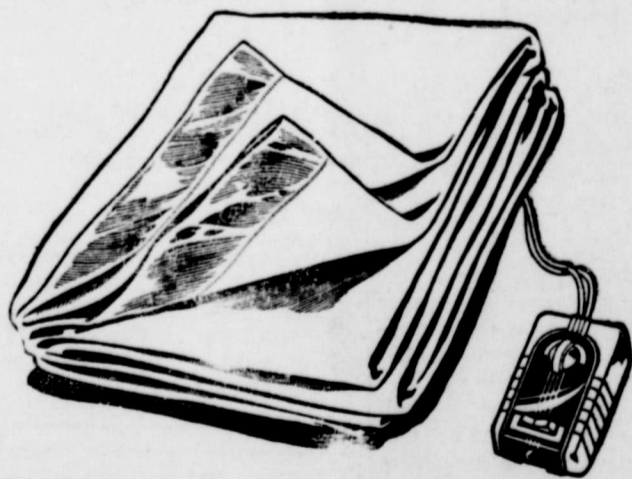

### Johnson, Former Marine Air Gets Awards for 40 Flights

Article is taken from Santa Ana (Calif.) Register. Woodrow Johnson, former Marine Air pilot, has received the Flying Cross, an Air Medal and a second, fifth and sixth Air Medal for his present service.

Johnson, who is now employed in the Huntington Beach oilfields, flew as a radioman-gunner in the Solomon Islands campaigns during World War II. At the time of his participation, according to the citation, the area was patrolled by enemy aircraft and planes flying in that area usually received heavy anti-aircraft fire from enemy Japanese installations.

Johnson said he didn't realize he was eligible for the medals until a former commanding officer informed him application had been made for them by the officer.

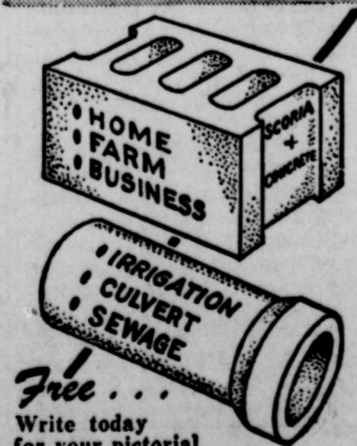
The minimum and maximum height standards have also been changed, he said. Men from 60 inches to 78 inches may now be accepted, Larcom said.

### Federal Land Bank Loans During 1946 Hit Largest Total In 10 Years

A greater volume of Federal Land Bank Loans was closed in Texas during 1946 than in any year since 1935, according to R. O. Carothers, president, and W. H. McCandless, secretary-treasurer of the Haskell County National Farm Loan Association who attended a conference of the National FLA leaders held last week in Lubbock.

"This indicated a desire of land owners to put their financing on long term basis and tie down today's low interest rates," Mr. McCandless said.

At the meeting in Lubbock reports showed that the Land Bank has practically completed its program of decentralizing loan servicing functions began 5 years ago. The result is that today most of the business farmers and ranchers have with the Land Bank can be transacted with their own home association. Operations of local associations and plans for the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston were discussed.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by Texas farmers and ranchers through the 143 local national farm loan association, McCandless said. The Land Bank, with no government funds of any kind invested in it, now has combined capital, surplus and reserves amounting to more than \$43,000,000. This is in addition to the approximately \$6,000,000 in reserves and surplus of the National Farm Loan Associations in their own accounts.



of the day as well as for those "between meal" snacks. They are an important item on winter menus because of the high content of vitamin C.

Miss Newman has several suggestions for the use of these fruits during the day. Chilled orange juice or half a grapefruit are old favorites for breakfast. A salad of orange slices arranged alternately with grapefruit on crisp lettuce is an appetizing touch at lunch. Fruit cup of peeled grapefruit are good desserts for dinner.

Another fruit dessert which is particularly refreshing after a dinner of roast chicken or turkey is ambrosia, made of sliced oranges and coconut.

Oranges are good in the lunch box. They'll be easier for the children to handle if sliced through the middle and then wrapped tightly in waxed paper.

Miss Newman says that citrus fruits should be carefully selected. Good quality fruit is well shaped, firm and springy to the touch. Fruit that is heavy for its size usually has the most juice. Don't worry if there are rust colored spots for they are only skin deep and do not affect the quality of the fruit. Oranges don't have to be "orange" to be good, though often growers give them a harmless treatment to bring out the natural color.

### RURAL BIRTH RATE RISES

The birth rate on farms in 1946 was apparently the highest since 1929. here was an increase of 2,360,000 in farm population in 1946 over 1945, and of this number 773,000 were babies born during the year.

### Incidence of Scarlet Fever Increases

The incidence of scarlet fever is at the present time nearly one-third higher than the seven year median in Texas. One of the most disabling and dangerous of the diseases usually associated with childhood, actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Fifty-five cases were reported in the state during the week ending November 15, bringing the year's total to 1,242.

The Doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive scarlet rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications can result in prolonged disability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling. "A child with any kind of sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment the doctor prescribes will do much to alleviate discomfort, and reduce the possibility of dangerous complications."

There are times when we Americans may have to tighten our belts a notch—but let's remember there are still millions of our neighbors around the world who haven't got a belt other than a piece of string to tighten . . . who haven't had a full course meal in years! Thanksgiving? We've every reason for it so let's enjoy it to the full, and see to it that we give other folks a taste of it as long as they need turn to us for a friendly share of the things we have to spare.

### Ready To Pay For Peace?

The United States occupies a unique position in world affairs, declares Norman Armour, Assistant Secretary of State, who points out that "we are, so to speak, in the position of the 'richest man in town'—a town that has been hard-hit by a series of cataclysmic disasters. We emerged almost unscathed physically and also, by the concentration of our energies and the fate of history, relatively stronger, more productive and more powerful than ever before."

Under these conditions, with human nature being what it is, the diplomat says our position "invites envy and arouses antagonism." It also imposes responsibility and requires us to take a realistic view of the world in which we live.

Mr. Armour thinks that the people of this country are ready to pay their proportionate share of the cost "of achieving a stable and prosperous world on the basis of freedom" and that "we know, as a people, that when the economic boat is rocked by disturbed conditions abroad, our economy rocks with it."

### Prices Move Faster

There has been considerable publicity in connection with figures of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, which reveal that wage increases in manufacturing industries have increased thirty-one per cent since V-J Day.

This is useful information but it does not give a complete picture. Average weekly earnings, according to the same source, were only twenty-one per cent higher and the price index for consumers in large cities had advanced by about twenty-four per cent.

The facts remind us that there are two ways of increasing the workers' incomes. One is by wage increases and the other is by price decreases. Inflation always hits those in the lower income brackets and they should be on the alert to support every proposal designed to stop steadily increasing prices.

### Terrorism In Italy

A wave of violence in Northern Italy, involving attacks and death for some of those opposing Left-wing political parties, leads to the suggestion that the terrorism is part of a communistic plan to intimidate Italian voters before the election next March.

The Italian Government, taking note of the violence, has added 10,000 men to its militarized police. This seems to be a timely move but whenever a desperate minority makes up its mind to resort to terrorism, the forces of law and order face a challenge that is hard to meet.

People can be divided into two classes: (a) those who try to treat others justly and (b) those who wait for others to treat them justly.

Americanism: The belief, held by the people of every state, that they have the best climate, the best people and the greatest opportunity.

A depression, we are warned, is developing in Western Europe; if our exports are affected it will make a difference in the United States.

Nearly everybody will speak the truth when it is profitable; not many will utter a word when they think it will cost money.

## Veterans News

### Questions and Answers

Q. My brother entered the service under the Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act of 1945 and he now wonders if his rights will be affected by the law officially ending the war on July 25, 1947 insofar as veterans benefits are concerned?

A. No, he will lose none of his rights even though his period of enlistment extends beyond July 25, 1947.

Q. Please tell me which non-service connected disability benefits are available to World War veterans and which to peacetime veterans?

A. The law provides that a pension for non-service connected disability may be payable to permanently and totally disabled World War veterans. The law does not provide such a pension for peacetime veterans.

Q. May I change the beneficiary of my insurance policy by a last will or testament?

A. No. A change of beneficiary for your insurance policy must be made by written notice to the Veterans Administration over your signature and it shall not be binding on VA unless received and endorsed on the policy by VA.

Q. I am in receipt of peacetime benefits for disability incurred prior to December 7, 1941. Why am I not entitled to wartime benefits for this period?

A. Since the World War II did not start until December 7, 1941, veterans with disabilities incurred in service prior to that time are not entitled to wartime benefits unless their service falls under the provisions of Public Law 359, 77th Congress, which provides that wartime rates would be authorized if the disability was the direct result of armed conflict or was received while the veterans was engaged in extra hazardous service including such service under conditions simulating war.

### Health Hints

(By Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer)

"Food conservation is an absolute necessity and all Texans are eager to assist in this program; but eliminating needless basic foods will only result in undernourishment and illness, which can be avoided by observing the Texas Food Standard in daily meals," Dr. Cox said. "This food standard will enable Texans to utilize available foods, eliminate waste, cooperate in conserving food and spend their food dollar wisely."

The Texas Food Standard, recommended by Dr. Cox, provides all necessary food elements, and for each individual includes daily servings of: 1 pint to 1 quart milk; 1 egg or substitute; 1 serving meat, poultry or fish; 1 serving potatoes; 1 serving green or yellow vegetables; 1 serving citrus fruit or tomatoes; 1 serving other fruit; 1 serving whole grain products; other enriched cereals or breads; small amount butter or margarine with vitamins added; some sweets or desserts in moderate quantities.

"Good nutrition is based upon the observance of good food habits, practiced every day," Dr. Cox declared. "This is important at any time, but especially now, when it will not only maintain good health but assist in the conservation of food supplies."

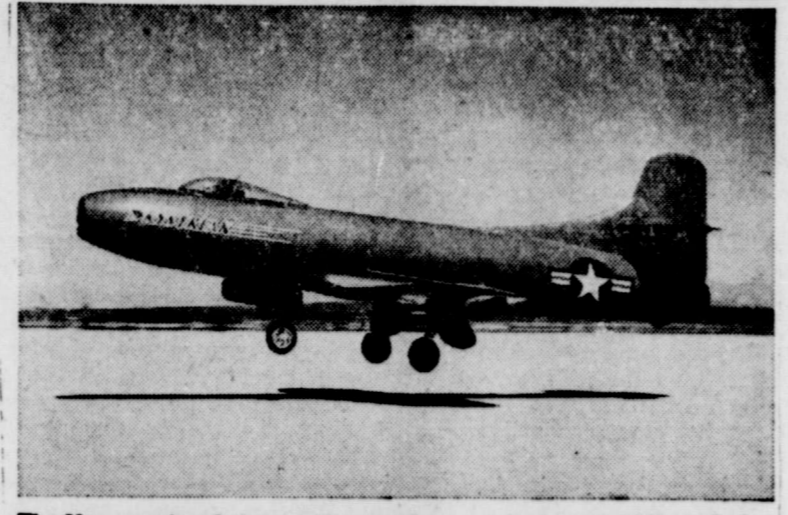

### Credit Buying Seen As Stimulus To Holiday Trade

Santa, through his purchasing agent Mr. and Mrs. America will be using full credit privileges this Christmas for the first time in seven years, Miss Jane Holt, manager of the Retail Merchants Association stated today. She said that the next thirty shopping days may see more merchandise purchased on credit than at any time in this city's history. The reason, she pointed out, is that this is the first Christmas since 1940 that credit buying has been entirely free from Government restrictions. On November 1, the last controls under the war time measure which fixed terms and payments were eliminated. As a result the wave of buying is not confined just to our town but is taking place all over the nation.

Reports Miss Holt has received from the Associated Bureaus of America, the trade association with headquarters in St. Louis which gives the local Bureau a nationwide coverage indicates a general surge of credit buying. While customers can technically "let their conscience be their guide" as far as credit buying is concerned, there isn't much danger of a credit spree according to Miss Holt. Credit bureaus all over the country report an unprecedented number of inquiries from merchants checking up on credit applications. This careful checking should do much to eliminate the danger of inflation that might result from wild credit extension Miss Holt said.

### County Agent Says Use of Fertilizer Profitable

Numerous inquiries have been made in his office about the use of fertilizer on Haskell county lands, County Agent F. W. Martin said this week. There seems to be some doubt in the minds of the people whether fertilizer would pay, due to the fact that we are in a low rainfall area. Martin says there is one fertilizer practice that has been proved in Haskell county and has the endorsement of his office. This practice is distributing 100 to 200 pounds of Super Phosphate (0.20-0) per acre, and planting some winter legume crop. This legume should be planted as early in the fall as weather conditions permit and should be turned under in the spring at a normal growth. After this crop has been let two months or more it is then ready to plant in some other crop. In talking with farmers in the county who have carried out this practice, Martin says he has yet to find anyone that did not get an increase in yields on the next crop by using this practice. There are about two reasons why this practice of turning under legumes that have been fertilized by Super Phosphate is better than applying fertilizer: directly to the cotton, grain sorghum or other crops. The first reason is that through the use of legumes it increases the amount of available Nitrogen in the soil which helps to promote growth of the plant. The Phosphate that has been applied to the soil has not all been used and is available in the next crop to help set fruit. The second reason this is a good practice is the fact that the organic matter has been increased in the soil due to the turning under of this crop and this will increase the water holding capacity of the soil, which is very important in West Texas.

three times before spring, and at 30 day intervals. For the spray, use 7½ pounds of 5% rotenone in 100 gallons of water. Better results have been obtained when 3 pounds of 50% DDT has been added to this mixture to control lice at the same time. For the dust, mix thoroughly one part of 5% rotenone powder with two parts of pyrophyllite (pirofilite) or Tripoli earth. Use about three and a half ounces per animal, rubbing it into the back of the animal thoroughly.
