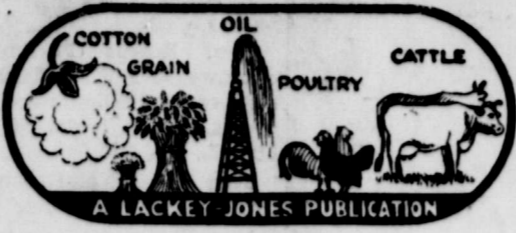

\$3,838 Contributed During Annual Red Cross Drive

John H. Banks, chairman of the 1948 Red Cross Fund Campaign, announced this week that \$3,838.79 was raised in Haskell county during the drive which was launched March 1.

This total exceeds the Chapter's quota of \$2,998 by \$840.79. An authorized 49.4 percent of the amount raised will be retained in the treasury of the Haskell County Chapter, with the remaining 50.6 percent to be sent to National headquarters.

In addition to business concerns and civic organizations, there were 991 individual contributors in the county, the fund chairman said.

Wildcat Try For Ellenberger Due S.E. Of Haskell

A deep wildcat test for oil production from the Ellenberger zone in southeast Haskell county was indicated this week, with Geo. F. Martin, Seismograph Service Corp., Tulsa, Okla., taking a contract to approximately 2,560 acres on which oil and gas leases are held by C. R. Grey, Haskell oil operator. The block includes 1280 acres in the J. F. White Survey, Abst. 414 and all of the R. W. Nabors Survey, Abst. 336.

Location for the test, the Huber Stone Estate No. 1, will be approximately in the center of the southwest 40 acres of the southeast 160 of the north 640 acres in the J. F. White Survey.

Drilling contractors on the test, projected to 5800-6000 feet with rotary, are B. H. Wofford and G. H. Thompson, with drilling due to start not later than July 1, this year.

Location is approximately 15 miles southeast of Haskell. Nearest production is three miles southeast of the wildcat, from shallow sands on the Hendrick Ranch. In addition to Grey's holdings in the area, Crown Central, Humble, and other major oil companies have lease blocks in that section.

Revival At Weinert In Second Week

The third annual observance of "Youth Week" will be held in Haskell April 5 through April 11, with James Foster and Nancy Ratliff as co-chairmen, Betty Oates, secretary, and Glenn Marquette, treasurer. Wanda Dulaney is the director and Gerry Barton, assistant director. The activities of Youth Week are planned entirely by the young people, but are for all age groups.

A cavalcade of youth and adults will leave Haskell Saturday morning, April 3, to extend a special invitation to the citizens in the towns in the area to attend this celebration. Accompanying them on the booster trip will be two members of the Texas State Highway patrol.

Youth Week will be launched with a minstrel entitled "Darktown Jubilee," at the high school auditorium, Monday night, April 5. The show is a musical story and will include blues songs and favorite spirituals in a presentation with a moral in its theme. An all-negro cast, featuring local talent, ranges in ages from seven to fifty. The first performance will be for the white people, with the second on Tuesday, April 6, for colored only.

Wednesday night, April 7, a Hillbilly banquet will be held at the activity building at which the guests are to wear calico and overalls. No woman will be admitted unless her hair is in pigtails, or a bonnet is on her head. Prizes will be awarded the best dressed Hillbillies. The program will include a group sing-song, specialty numbers, a corn shucking contest, Sadie Hawkins race, and a hog calling contest.

Scheduled for Friday night, April 7, is a Colonial Ball at the American Legion hall. The dance will be formal and semi-formal, and will be held in all the atmosphere of a plantation party, with southern gentlemen as hosts. The belle of the ball will be selected by popular vote and she will reign for the evening in the hospitality of the south. All tickets for this activity will be sold in advance.

The closing event of Youth Week will be the Brotherhood Service at the First Christian Church, Sunday night, April 11. All of the churches in Haskell and surrounding towns have been invited to attend. Speakers for the evening will be Father Donald A. Hartnett, Catholic Priest of the Sacred Heart Academy, Wichita Falls; David Earnest, Protestant minister in Texas Christian University, Fort Worth; and Jewish Rabbi Morris Goodman of the House of Jacob synagogue, Wichita Falls. The service to be presented has been approved by the National Conference of Christians and Jews and stresses religious tolerance—"We do not have to believe as our neighbor does, but we can respect that belief."

In addition to the previously named officers, over one hundred young people are serving on the planning committee for Youth Week, and they are being assisted in their preparations by an equal number of adults, thus creating a coordination of all age groups.

Ambitious White Leghorn Hen Lays Half Pound Egg

E. W. Reece, who lives in South Haskell and keeps a flock of 150 White English Leghorns, has one hen that could well set the pace for a flock of turkey hens insofar as size of eggs is concerned. In gathering eggs one day last week, Reece found one which weighed almost one-half pound and measured 9 inches around the longest way, and 7½ inches the other. He has frequently found eggs of exceptional size, but none so large as this before. He believes the oversize models are being laid by one of the largest hens in his flock, a 7¼-pound bird.

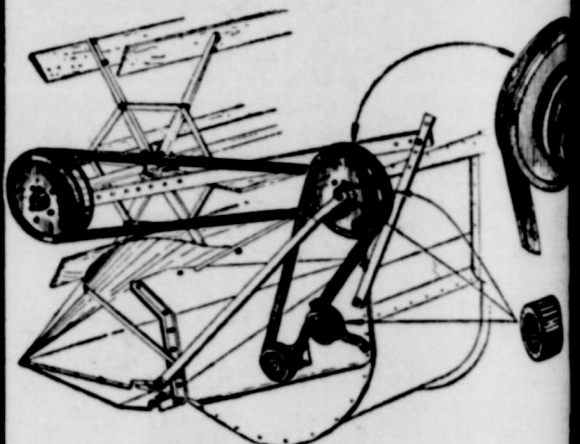

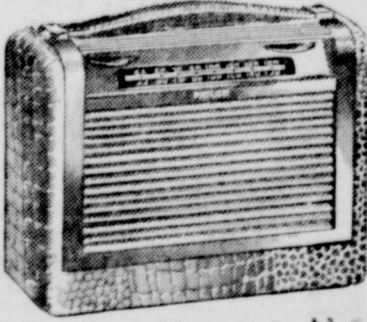

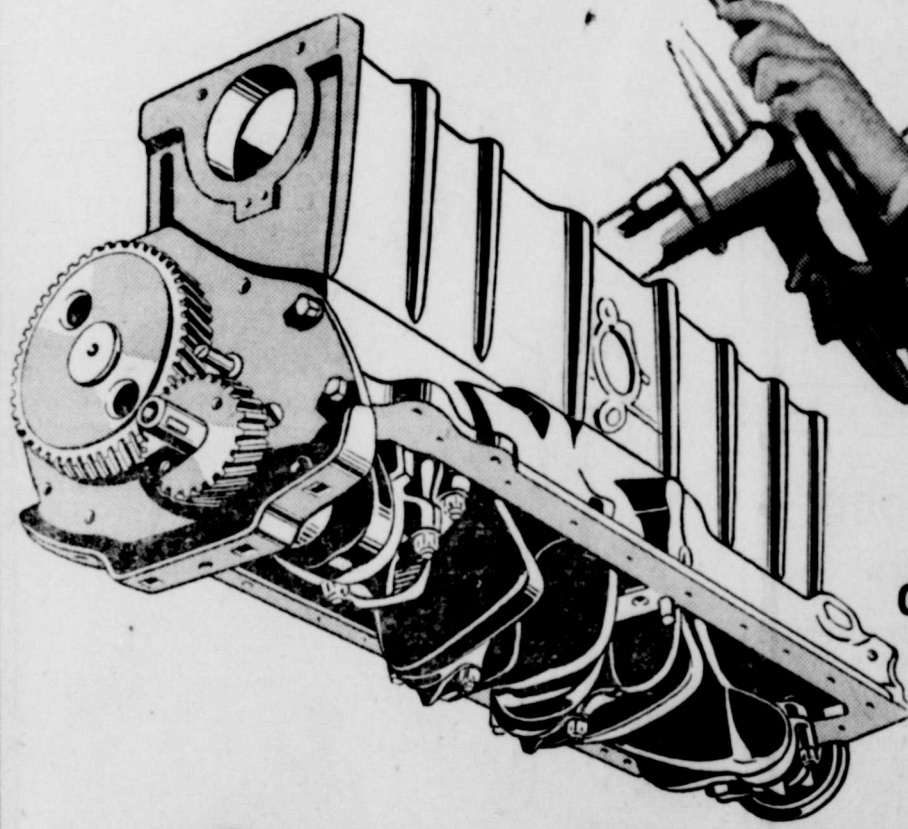
