Hoppers Making Appearance In County Fields

County Agent F. W. Martin this week alerted Haskell county farmers against grasshopper infestation which is likely to be as heavy as last year or possibly worse, posing a serious threat later in the growing season to cotton, grain sorghums and other crops.

A heavy hatch of hoppers has been reported during the past week as a result of the hot weather prevailing after the light rains around the first of May. Particularly heavy infestation has been reported south and east of town, the County Agent said.

Hoppers are expected to appear in large numbers in all sections of the county with warm weather following the light rains received during the first part of the week.

To combat the insects, a poison mixing station will be placed in operation next week at Farmers Co-Op Gin No. 1 in North Haskell, County Agent Martin said, to be operated on the same basis as in previous years. He explained that the Government would furnish poison and one sack of bran, with the farmer furnishing one sack of bran or the required amount of cottonseed hulls, for each batch of poison. A nominal charge is made for mixing. The station is equipped with a mechanical mixer which has a capacity of 3,000 pounds per hour, Martin explained.

The County Agent urges farmers to watch for the appearance of hoppers in their growing crops, and advises application of the poison at the first sign of damage in order to control the insects.

THIEVES HIT FOUR PLACES IN WEINERT SUNDAY NIGHT

Believed the work of professional "knob knockers", three Weinert business establishments were entered by burglars sometime Sunday night and they also made the third entry into the office of the Weinert schools since last December, Sheriff Mart Clifton said Monday after investigating four burglaries committed in Weinert.

Culprits who entered the school office knocked the knob from a safe but were unable to open the strongbox, the sheriff reported.

Office of the R. B. Spencer Lumber Company was broken into and thieves took an estimated \$105 after knocking the knob from the company safe. Entrance was gained through the front of the building at both the lumber yard and the school, officers said.

Mayfield Grocery was also hit by the thieves and the store safe was battered open but no loot was taken, the proprietor having carried Saturday's store receipts to his home for safekeeping.

Biggest haul taken by the burglars was from the Rexall Drug Store, the establishment losing approximately \$300 after thieves gained access to the safe by knocking off the combination knob. Entry into the grocery and drug store was made from the back of the building, officers investigating the burglaries found.

Jacksboro Men are Charged With Car Theft Here

Two brothers, L. L. and M. L. Rummage, were returned to Haskell last week from Jacksboro by Sheriff Mart Clifton to face charges of theft of an automobile in this city.

The car, a 1941 model Ford coupe, was stolen from this city on March 16, this year, while parked on the east side of the square. Owner of the automobile, Max L. Criswell, was a temporary resident here while working for a pipeline company.

The automobile was found burned near Jacksboro several days later, but several weeks elapsed before ownership of the vehicle was established through motor and license numbers, Sheriff Clifton said.

State's General Fund At All Time High

The General Fund of Texas stood at \$64,690,420 on May 4th after Comptroller Geo. H. Shepard transferred over ten million dollars from the clearance funds. The net balance at the end of April was fifty-four million plus. Due to tremendous increases in nearly all sources of revenue to the Available School Fund, Shepard has reduced the amount taken from Omnibus to make up the fifty-five million per capita. This leaves more for General Revenue. Crude Oil tax is running at almost eight million per month, an undreamed-of figure two years ago. Carbon Black, Cement, Sulphur, Natural Gas, Automobile Sales, Cigarette and Insurance Company Occupation Taxes all exceed last years receipts and contribute to the General Revenue surplus.

JAILBREAK TRY IS FAILURE FOR FIVE PRISONERS

An attempted jailbreak by five prisoners in the Haskell county jail last Saturday morning was averted through quick action of Deputy Sheriff Doss Fuller in overpowering one of the prisoners who attacked him, and compelling four other inmates to return to their cells.

The attempted break occurred when Deputy Fuller and a trusty had gone to the "run around" on the second floor carrying breakfast to the five men. When the officer opened the main door, one of the prisoners, John L. Breeson, rushed through the main door and attempted to slug the deputy with a 15-inch iron bar. The officer dodged the blow, and knocked the bar from Breeson's hand. Swinging the heavy jail keys, Fuller forced Breeson to return inside the enclosure, meanwhile ordering the other four inmates to their individual cells. He then summoned Sheriff Mart Clifton and a thorough search disclosed that a resident had been sawed from one of the inside cells. Five hacksaw blades were found, which Sheriff Clifton said had been smuggled in by Clarence W. Green, brought here recently from the State Prison at Huntsville to face burglary charges. Other prisoners confined in the section of the jail where the attempted break occurred, and who officers declared had knowledge of the plan, were L. L. and M. L. Rummage, Lonnie Hutton, Green and Breeson. Several other inmates of the jail had no part in the break, Deputy Fuller said.

First Wheat From 1948 Crop Is Received Here Thursday

First load of 1948 wheat harvested in Haskell County was brought in Thursday morning by R. F. (Riley) Pitman who combined a portion of a 20-acre field near the west city limits.

The grain, although showing some moisture, scaled about 60 bushels and was purchased by Courtney Hunt, local grain dealer, on a \$2.10 per bushel basis.

Pitman said his 20-acre field would average a "good" seven bushels per acre.

Yield for the county's estimated 75,000 acres of wheat is expected to average between six and seven bushels as a whole, although predictions of twenty-bushel yields have been made in sections of the county where the grain has had more favorable weather conditions than the county as a whole.

With continued dry weather, grain harvesting will be underway on a large scale by the end of next week, farmers say.

IRON LUNG FUND IS PAST \$1,000 MARK

Members of the Haskell Fire Department, which is sponsoring the campaign to raise \$1,200 for purchase of a portable iron lung and artificial respirator, were \$200 of their goal, George Neely, chairman of the drive, reported Monday night at the regular meeting of the department. Substantial donations received during the past week, several from out-of-town, boosted the total to above the \$1,000 mark, Neely reported. The portable unit has already been received and is ready for instant use in any emergency. It will be kept at the Fire Station, and firemen are already familiar with operation of the unit.

In expressing his belief that the remaining amount of approximately \$200 will be raised in a matter of days, Neely said that contributions from out of town people had helped in a great measure to making the drive a success. Commissioner Clark, now serving his first term, explained that Precinct road funds and county machinery could only be used in construction work or repair and maintenance of designated roads in the four precincts of the county. He pointed out, however, that farmers and landowners could improve and surface private roads to their homes or premises at their own expense, and that approval of the Commissioners Court was not required for such improvements.

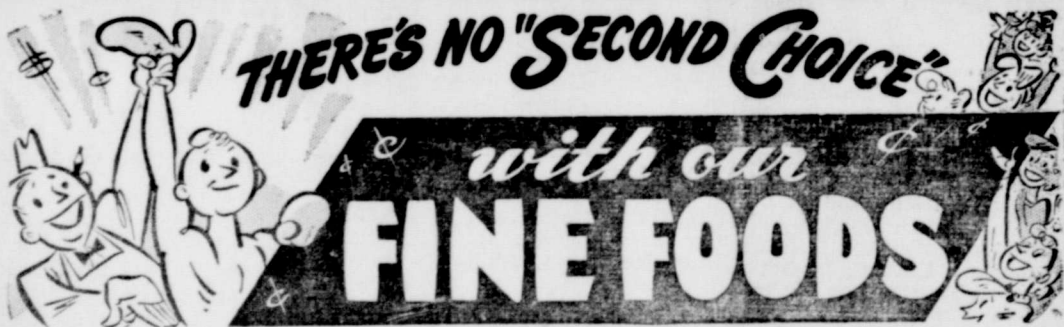

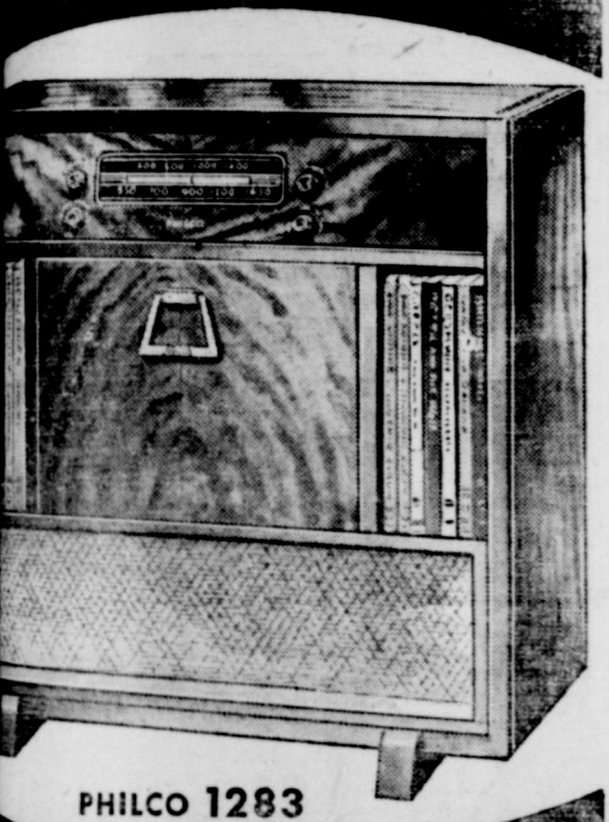

Agent Gives Hints On Canning with Pressure Saucepan

If the pressure saucepan meets certain requirements, and if correct processing times, which have been scientifically tested, are used, then the pressure saucepan can become a valuable addition to your canning equipment, especially for small jobs of home canning. That's the latest word from Louise Newman, county Home Demonstration Agent.

The question of using the pressure saucepan for canning has been brought up by many homemakers and two specialists of the USDA's Bureau of Home Nutrition and Home Economics in Washington have been working on the answer. Their report has been published recently.

Be sure that the saucepan is tall enough to hold pint jars on a rack, with the cover locked in place, and that there is a gauge which allows pressure to be controlled accurately at 10 pounds, Miss Newman says.

The experimental canning report shows that the processing time in the saucepan at 10 pounds pressure must be 20 minutes longer than the time recommended for a pressure canner; less time will not sterilize the vegetables safely.

The pressure saucepan heats quickly, takes only a minute to exhaust its air content, and cools rapidly after the jars of food are processed. As a result, the heat necessary for the safe sterilization of the food must be obtained during the processing time.

A pressure canner requires a longer time to heat, exhausts and cools slowly, and consequently, the necessary heat for sterilization is provided even though the processing time is shorter.

When canning with a pressure saucepan, use the following processing time for pints at 10 pounds pressure: Asparagus, 45 minutes; lima beans, 55 minutes; snapbeans, 40 minutes; beets, 45 minutes; carrots, 40 minutes; cream-style corn, 105 minutes; whole kernel corn, 75 minutes;

okra, 45 minutes; peas, 60 minutes; cubed pumpkin, 75 minutes; strained pumpkin, 80 minutes; spinach, 65 minutes; summer squash, 50 minutes; dry-pack sweet potatoes, 85 minutes; wet-pack sweet potatoes, 75 minutes.

Miss Newman emphasizes that these process times are for use when the canning directions issued by the Texas Extension Service are followed throughout. These times might not be adequate for food preserved by other directions.

Home canning instructions are given in the Extension Service circular C-223, "Can Vegetables in a Pressure Canner." Copies have been ordered by the Home Demonstration Agents and will be available upon request.

Cites Safety Rules For Water Sports

Haskell county people can well afford to consider the seasonal advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports which was released from the State Health Department this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Lakes and ponds of unknown depth, and streams of unfamiliar currents are often the site of picnics and excursions and the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools is, of course, not available in such places.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted. "Nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety are disregarded through carelessness or thoughtlessness."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming safely: At least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come to shore; don't re-enter the water;

if chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float—this is important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; and never swim in water that may be polluted.

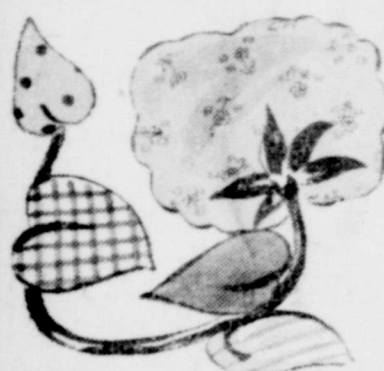

Combine and truck operators planning to follow the harvest should be interested in a special Combine and Labor Guide Pamphlet, now available, covering states in the wheat belt. These guides contain state laws pertaining to Noxious Weeds, moving combines over state highways, truck permits, etc., also the listing of State Employment Offices and other valuable information. Any operator interested in receiving these valuable guides should contact the Stamford office, located at 125 North Swenson avenue, or write to the Texas Employment Commission, box 708, Stamford, Texas. The Pamphlet will be further stated that employment office up and down the line through Texas and other states to our north would be in a position to advise workers and equipment operators as to where the demands exist during the harvest season.

20 Years Ago—May 10, 1928

M. B. Lebo, for the past seven years Vocational Agriculture teacher in Haskell High School has tendered his resignation to the School Board and will accept a position with North Texas Agricultural College. His resignation will take effect June 1.

It is estimated that more than 1,000 people from Haskell and Haskell county attended the big celebration at Throckmorton on Friday when the first train arrived over the new T&P railroad extension into Throckmorton. More than 15,000 people are believed to have attended the celebration.

Four blocks of new paving was opened to traffic the first of the week, and the brick is being laid on the street to the depot and property owners are being signed up for the paving on the street in front of the Methodist Church. An effort will be made to complete this street to the north city limits.

30 Years Ago—May 11, 1918

Haskell county's quota in the Liberty Loan Drive will be exceeded by about 50 per cent, according to the information now available. More than \$150,000 had been subscribed last night.

J. E. McKee has been appointed deputy Food Administrator of Haskell county to assist R. V. (Bob) Robertson, the County Administrator, with the work. A committee has been appointed in Haskell composed of J. E. McKee, O. E. Patterson, J. U. Fields, M. C. Alexander and Mrs. H. S. Wilson, to help in the food conservation campaign.

The Jud community gave a box supper Friday night and raised more than \$250 for the Red Cross fund. The county's quota has been placed at \$3,000. T. J. Sims of Chillicothe, a former Haskell citizen, is here this week visiting his children, Mrs. LeRoy Gamble and Mrs. Mart Clifton.

50 Years Ago—May 14, 1898

The Commissioners Court sat down with a dull thud, by a vote of 3 to 1, on the proposition to put up a windmill on the court house square and provide public watering troughs. It was claimed that the country people, for

whose convenience it would have been mainly, objected to the county incurring the expense. The whole thing would have amounted to only 10 cents on the \$1,000 valuation to the taxpayers. We do know that a good many country people favored it and we do not believe that any sensible man who understood the small cost to each one did or would not oppose it.
