If the pressure saucepan meets certain requirements, and if correct processing times, which have been scientifically tested. are used, then the pressure ucepan can become a valuable ddition to your canning equipnent, especially for small jobs of home canning. That's the latest word from Louise Newman, Home Demonstration

The question of using the presure saucepan for canning has een brought up by many home kers and two specialists of the USDA's Bureau of Home Nutriion and Home Economics is Washington have been working on the answer. Their report has been published recently.

Be sure that the saucepan is tall enough to hold pint jars on rack with the cover locked in place, and that there is a gauge which allows pressure to be controlled accurately at 10 pounds, Miss Newman says.

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming safety: At least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come to shore; don't re-enter the water;
