The complaint of the Commission is that while the books are called "free," "bonus books," or "book dividends," they are not gifts. The Commission points out that the club member, to get such books, must obligate himself ot buy at least four books a year.

In making this comment upon the advertising of the book clubs we should say that a careful reading of their propositions reveals born Sunday, July 29th. #### Prevent Fire Loss, Cotton Men Told

Cotton producers and ginners throughout the Cotton Belt were warned today by National Cotton Council officials to take all possible precautions to elimate costly cotton fire losses this season,

Last year 20,415 bales of cotton were involved in fires. Although this was a decrease over the \$12,000,000 loss of the previous season, further fire vention steps could have reduced the damage considerably, the Cotton Council reported.

Eighty-one per cent of the total number of cotton fires for the first nine months of last season can be traced to fire-packed

Wet Cotton

Seed cotton which is carried to the gin wet and cotton containing foreign particles such as rocks, matches, and metal are responsible for many of the firepacked bales that cause gin and warehouse fires. Often tiny sparks go undiscovered and are packed into a bale, where they spread slowly until they eat into open air. A single spark may cause a warehouse fire, resulting in the loss of hundreds of bales.





Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
