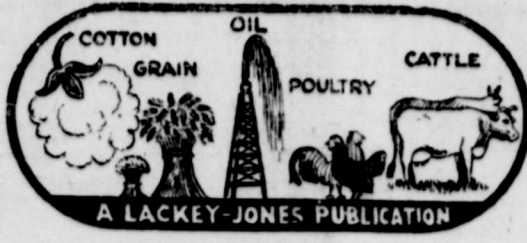

Three Oil Tests Drilling In County

Drilling operations had started this week, or were due to start in the immediate future, on three new Haskell County wildcat wells, two to the Ellenburger and the other to the Palo Pinto.

Most recent location application was for the H. W. Snowden of Dallas No. 1 Joe W. Cloud, the Palo Pinto test, five miles northeast of Rule, 680 feet from the north and west lines of lot 5 Corryell County School Lands league 72 and abstract 99.

Drilling is to start within the next few days on this venture, which is on permit for 4,000 feet with rotary.

In the southeastern part of the county, 15 miles southeast of Haskell, drilling began late last week and was continuing below 2500 feet on the British American Oil Producing Company No. 1 Heber Stone, 330 feet from the west and 990 from the south line of the north half of section 14 James F. White survey.

This test is to go to 5,400 feet with rotary to test the Ellenburger.

Also to test the Ellenburger is the projected 6,000 foot rotary test four miles south of Haskell, the W. P. Carr, trustee, of Dallas No. 1 Mary and Mrs. Maggie Pierson, 3,395 feet south and 500 feet east of the northwest corner of section 15 block 1 H&TC survey.

Last reported drilling below 3,600 feet, the well is one of four for that area.

Farmers Fighting Insects in Area Cotton Fields

The fight on cotton insects is going on strong in the fields of farmers of this area, as they work to protect the cotton from the ravages of various types of cotton insects.

Sale of spray formulas has been brisk for the past two weeks, according to those who handle the poison.

Spraying is being done against the insects that infest local cotton fields, principally the flea hopper, the boll worm and the leaf worm.

Several spraying machines, which spray the fields on a commercial basis, are now in operation in this area. With present prospects very bright for another bumper crop, farmers are doing "everything in the book" to insure a good yield.

A total of 50 fields of cotton have been checked by County Agent F. W. Martin in the past three days to determine damage.

Several of these fields had enough insects to poison, however there were some fields that needed no treatment.

In checking your cotton field go diagonally across the field and check in the terminal bud for insect damage as this is where all damage starts.

It is recommended that where you find 25 cotton flea hoppers on a hundred stalks that some treatment should be given. If 4 or 5 boll worms are found to a 100 stalks some treatment should be given.

Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Lowe of this city were notified Tuesday that the remains of their son, Pfc. Robert Ray Lowe, who was killed in action in the South Pacific on March 30th, 1945, was on the way to the United States.

The parents will be notified on arrival in a U. S. port. The body will be accompanied to Haskell by a military escort and a military funeral will be held.

Grain Sorghum Purchase Agreement At \$2.28 Effective

Information has been received by Joe S. Harper, Secretary of the Haskell County PMA Office, that the Commodity Credit Corporation is now in a position to accept purchase agreements from grain sorghum producers under a program which will assure a producer that he will receive at least \$2.28 per 100 pounds for his grain between now and next April 30th.

Under this plan, a producer can sign an agreement in the Haskell County PMA Office, whereby he agrees that in the event he cannot sell his grain for as much as \$2.28 per 100 pounds between now and next April 30th, 1949, the Commodity Credit Corporation will purchase it at that time for \$2.28 per 100 pounds.

A producer will be required to specify a definite amount of grain sorghum over which he cannot deliver, but may deliver less, or none at all if he is able to dispose of his grain in other ways before April 30th, 1949.

The Secretary advises producers to please notice that before such a procedure can be worked out, the producer must sign the Purchase Agreement at the time he harvests his grain, since the Corporation will not purchase such grain unless the agreement has been signed in advance.

Forms are available in the County PMA Office, and the office personnel will be glad to discuss this matter further with those producers interested in the program.

Under this agreement, the producer is under no obligation to make delivery if he does, he receives at least \$2.28, and if he does not the agreement becomes void.

New County Agent Assumes Duties In Knox County

K. O. Lewis, former County Agent of Kent County, has accepted the position as County Agent of Knox County and assumed the duties of that office Monday morning.

Mr. Lewis, who was reared at Sweetwater, received his B. S. degree from Texas Technological College in June of 1947, majoring in Animal Husbandry.

The new agent spent three years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force, a year of which he served in the European theatre of operations.

He is unmarried, and will make his home in Benjamin.

Haskell Lions Given Facts On Baskin Dam Project

The Haskell Lions Club, in their regular Tuesday noon meeting heard John A. Couch, former Haskell mayor and currently chairman of the Bob Baskin Dam Association of the Brazos River, tell of the progress of that association in reviving the interest in behalf of the construction of a dam on the Brazos River in Haskell county.

Couch pointed out the necessity of such a project that would create a storage of water equal to 290,000 acre feet. Such a project, he further added, would assure this section of an adequate supply of water for human and municipal use, for industrial purposes, irrigation, flood control, reclamation, fish and wildlife, and recreation.

More than 27 area towns are involved in working for the completion of this project, and Couch added that assurance from engineers indicated the project could be completed with the interest and efforts of the people of this section.

The dam site for this project is to be approximately one and a half miles north of Rule—Old Glory Bridge—on State Highway 24 and is some 15 miles north west of Haskell.

Couch told of the recent meeting of this association held in Knox City, and reported on the plans and steps that are to be taken in behalf of the project.

Officers of the Baskin Dam Association are Couch, chairman, S. N. Reed of O'Brien as vice-chairman and Ralph Duncan, secretary-treasurer.

Other Haskell leaders on the Board of Directors of the association are Olen Dotson, Sam A. Roberts, A. C. Pierson and Courtney Hunt.

In completing his talk, the former mayor told of the acute water shortage over the United States, especially in the Southwest and again emphasized the necessity of surface water storage.

Olen Dotson, presiding in the absence of Lion president, Harold Spain, heard various committee reports which included a report from A. C. Pierson, chairman of the sanitation committee, who advised that the drive for funds to purchase the spray machine was about \$500 short of complete.

This committee made plans to begin the spraying of the city Tuesday afternoon. Pierson added that a supply of DDT had been delivered to Haskell late Monday night. Explaining the town would have been sprayed much earlier had this DDT been available.

Some 30 members were present for the noon luncheon.

Illness of Weinert Child Diagnosed As Polio

First case of poliomyelitis to be reported in Haskell County in several years, struck in the Weinert section last week, when an 8-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. R. Burney developed the disease.

The child was brought to the Haskell County Hospital, where physicians found the 8-year-old suffering with infantile paralysis. Upon the advice of physicians, the child was removed to an Abilene hospital for further observation and treatment. Parents of the child had only recently moved to Haskell County.

J. E. Walling, Jr., Buys Haskell Butane Co.

In a deal closed Monday, the Haskell Butane Company, owned and operated by Paul Roberts and Carl Wheatley, was sold to J. E. Walling, Jr., of the Walling Butane Co. of this city, who will merge the two concerns at the location of the Haskell Butane Company just outside of the south city limits.

Plant and equipment of Walling Butane Company will be moved to the new location at an early date. Mr. Roberts and Mr. Wheatley have not announced their plans for the immediate future.

Haskell Schools Will Begin New Term September 6th

Classes for the new school year of the Haskell Public Schools are to begin Monday, September 6, according to an announcement this week by S. H. Vaughter, superintendent of the local schools.

Preceding this formal opening of school, a registration schedule is set with Seniors registering Thursday afternoon, September 2, at 1 P. M. Juniors are to register Friday morning at 9 o'clock, September 3, with the Sophomore classes reporting at 10:30 that morning. All Freshman classes will register Friday September 2nd, at 9 o'clock.

All grade pupils will register Monday morning, September 6th. A general faculty meeting is to be held Thursday morning, September 3, at 9 o'clock.

With the faculty practically complete, a more detailed announcement is to be made through this paper next week.

SAVE YOUR WAR BONDS

In the first quarter of 1948, holders cashed in E bonds to the total value of \$1,008,000,000, which was about \$40,000,000 more than the sum invested by those who bought similar bonds.

We know that it is very often necessary for individuals to cash in their savings, but it might be timely to call attention to the advantage of holding E bonds until maturity. Only in this way does the holder collect full interest.

In addition, every individual will probably find it profitable to hold on to investments, especially those which are as safe as the bonds of the Government. With present high prices, the proceeds of bonds will not buy anything as much as they will when the inevitable economic decline sets in.

CONSUMERS TO PAY

There have been any number of wage increases granted by industrial leaders to labor unions in recent weeks.

The process is termed the third increase in wages and the expectation is that there will follow a third increase in the price of manufactured goods.

It begins to appear that labor and capital will not fight each other too hard for the simple reason that when capital grants a wage increase and increases the price of its product, the result is more money for the laborer and more profits for the manufacturer.

The possibility exists, of course, that the manufacturer will gradually price himself out of the market. In the meanwhile, the sellers' market continues in this country and the consumers pay the increased price, thus providing the money for bigger profits. How long the process can continue we are unable to say, but, in the long run, it means economic disaster.

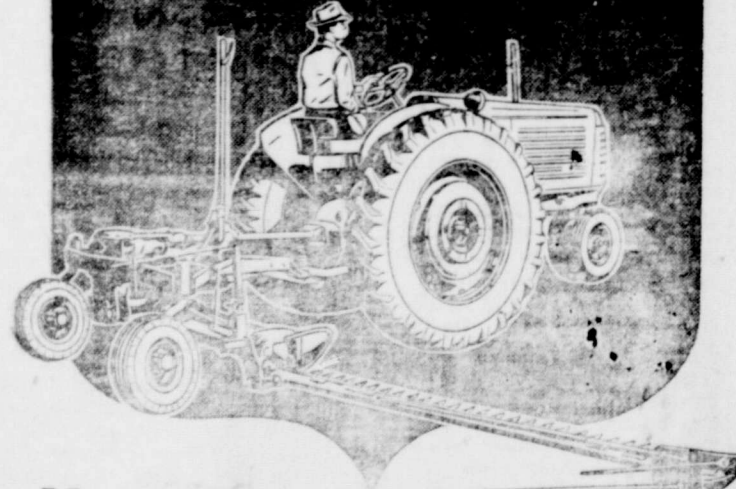

Dove Season Set Sept 1; Limits Given

The dove season in the north part of the state opens Sept 1 and extends through Oct. 15. W. T. St. John, veteran West Texas game warden, announced Monday.

Game Warden St. John also announced the following other shooting seasons for wild game in Texas:

Ducks—Nov. 12 to Dec. 16, with shooting to begin at 12 noon Dec. 12.

Geese—Same season. Pronged horn antelope—Brewster, Jeff Davis, Pecos and Reeves Counties, Oct. 1, 2, and 3; Presidio and Jeff Davis Counties, Oct. 5, 6, and 7; and Hudspeth and Culberson Counties, Oct. 12, 13, and 14.

Deer—Mule (commonly called black tail); Nov. 6 to 11, inclusive; daylight only; white tail, same dates.

Dove Area Defined Warden St. John defined the area in which shooting would be permitted Sept. 1 to Oct. 15, as all that part of the state north and west of a line composed of the following counties:

Val Verde, Kinney, Yvalde, Medina, Kendall, Comal, Hayes, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Chero-

kee, Nacogdoches, and Shelby. Shooting of doves is not permitted from rural lanes.

The bag limit is 10 doves a day, of all kinds. Daily bag limit for ducks is five, with a total possession limit of ten.

The limit on geese is four in any one day, and for the season.

Antelope Season Shooting of pronged-horn antelope is to be permitted only to holders of permits especially issued by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission after Sept. 1.

These antelope shooting permits, said St. John, are neither transferable, nor refundable. Each land owner in areas where hunting is permitted will not be allowed to charge more than \$20 for the privilege of hunting on his land.

Application for antelope hunting permits must be filed with the GFO Commission not later than midnight August 31. Any applications by mail bearing a postmark later than that date will not be considered.

The commission is to denote on which ranch the permit holder shall hunt. A warden of the department is to be assigned to accompany each group of hunters.

\$100,000 Loan Authorized For Farm Homes

\$100,000 has been appropriated again in Texas this year for direct Farm Ownership loans, according to William E. Lawson, County Supervisor, of Farmers Home Administration. The Agency is also authorized to insure farm real estate loans made by private lenders.

Direct or insured farm purchase loans are available to qualified farmers, tenants, sharecroppers, and veterans who can find sound-value farms, and who can't get the credit they need or insured only on farms that will pay out in terms of their long-range earning capacity." Mr. Lawson, County Supervisor, said, "rather than at today's relatively high farm prices."

Changes recently made in the insured mortgage program are designed to broaden opportunities for family-type farmers to become farm owners. Lenders now get 3 percent interest instead of 2 1/2 percent. Borrowers pay 4 per cent interest on both direct and insured loans, with the 1 percent difference in insured loans going to the Farmers Home Administration for insurance charges and administration expenses. The agency services the loan without extra cost to the borrower or to the credit institutions.

Lenders now have an assured market for the mortgages. From now on they may turn over the mortgages to the Government after seven years, and be paid in full. It is felt that these revisions in the Bankhead-Jones Farm Mortgage Act will provide a great help to private lenders.

The Farmers Home Administration also has funds for water facility loans in the 17 Western States. Texas will participate in loans for water facilities in the amount of \$170,000.00.

As formerly, all types of loans will be accompanied by supervision in good farm practices, and veterans will continue to receive preference.

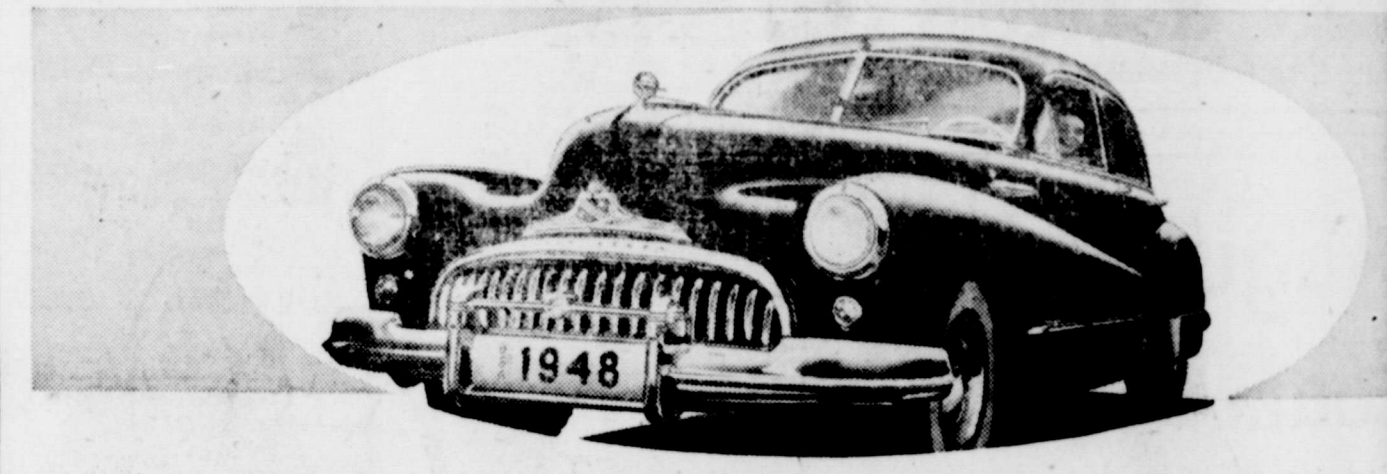

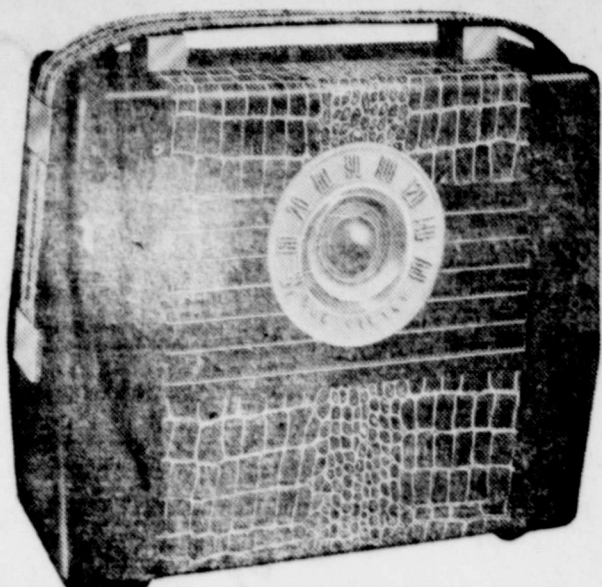
